# A BILL

To encourage visits between the United States and Taiwan at all levels, and for other purposes.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Taiwan Travel Act".

### 5 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

6 Congress finds the following:

7 (1) The Taiwan Relations Act (22 U.S.C. 3301
8 et seq.), enacted in 1979, has continued for 37 years

9 to be a cornerstone of relations between the United

1	States and Taiwan and has served as an anchor for
2	peace and security in the Western Pacific area.
3	(2) The Taiwan Relations Act declares that
4	peace and stability in the Western Pacific area are
5	in the political, security, and economic interests of
6	the United States and are matters of international
7	concern.
8	(3) The United States considers any effort to
9	determine the future of Taiwan by other than peace-
10	ful means, including by boycotts or embargoes, a
11	threat to the peace and security of the Western Pa-
12	cific area and of grave concern to the United States.
13	(4) Taiwan has succeeded in a momentous tran-
14	sition to democracy beginning in the late 1980s and
15	has been a beacon of democracy in Asia, and Tai-
16	wan's democratic achievements inspire many coun-
17	tries and people in the region.
18	(5) Visits to a country by United States cabinet
19	members and other high-ranking officials are an in-
20	dicator of the breadth and depth of ties between the
21	United States and such country.
22	(6) Since the enactment of the Taiwan Rela-
23	tions Act, relations between the United States and
24	Taiwan have suffered from insufficient high-level
25	communication due to the self-imposed restrictions

that the United States maintains on high-level visits
 with Taiwan.

#### **3** SEC. 3. SENSE OF CONGRESS; STATEMENT OF POLICY.

4 (a) SENSE OF CONGRESS.—It is the sense of Con5 gress that the United States Government should encour6 age visits between officials from the United States and
7 Taiwan at all levels.

8 (b) STATEMENT OF POLICY.—It should be the policy9 of the United States to—

(1) allow officials at all levels of the United
States Government, including cabinet-level national
security officials, general officers, and other executive branch officials, to travel to Taiwan to meet
their Taiwanese counterparts;

(2) allow high-level officials of Taiwan to enter
the United States, under conditions which demonstrate appropriate respect for the dignity of such
officials, and to meet with officials of the United
States, including officials from the Department of
State and the Department of Defense and other cabinet agencies; and

(3) encourage the Taipei Economic and Cultural Representative Office, and any other instrumentality established by Taiwan, to conduct business
in the United States, including activities which in-

volve participation by Members of Congress, officials
 of Federal, State, or local governments of the United
 States, or any high-level official of Taiwan.
