AN ACT

Making supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year
ending September 30, 2019, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 That the following sums are hereby appropriated, out of
2 any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated,
3 and out of applicable corporate or other revenues, receipts,
4 and funds, for the several departments, agencies, corpora-
5 tions, and other organizational units of Government for
6 fiscal year 2019, and for other purposes, namely:

7 TITLE I

8 DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

9 AGRICULTURAL PROGRAMS

10 PROCESSING, RESEARCH AND MARKETING

11 OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY

12 For an additional amount for the “Office of the Sec-
13 retary”, \$1,105,442,000 (increased by \$1,900,000,000),
14 which shall remain available until December 31, 2020, for
15 necessary expenses related to losses of crops (including
16 milk and harvested adulterated wine grapes), trees,
17 bushes, and vines, as a consequence of Hurricanes Michael
18 or Florence, other hurricanes, typhoons, volcanic activity,
19 or wildfires occurring in calendar year 2018 under such
20 terms and conditions as determined by the Secretary: *Pro-*
21 *vided*, That the Secretary may provide assistance for such
22 losses in the form of block grants to eligible states and
23 territories and such assistance may include compensation
24 to producers, as determined by the Secretary, for past or
25 future crop insurance premiums, forest restoration, and

1 poultry and livestock losses: *Provided further*, That of the
2 amounts provided under this heading, tree assistance pay-
3 ments may be made under section 1501(e) of the Agricul-
4 tural Act of 2014 (7 U.S.C. 9081(e)) to eligible orchard-
5 ists or nursery tree growers (as defined in such section)
6 of pecan trees with a tree mortality rate that exceeds 7.5
7 percent (adjusted for normal mortality) and is less than
8 15 percent (adjusted for normal mortality), to be available
9 until expended, for losses incurred during the period be-
10 ginning January 1, 2018, and ending December 31, 2018:
11 *Provided further*, That in the case of producers impacted
12 by volcanic activity that resulted in the loss of crop land,
13 or access to crop land, the Secretary shall consider all
14 measures available, as appropriate, to bring replacement
15 land into production: *Provided further*, That the total
16 amount of payments received under this heading and ap-
17 plicable policies of crop insurance under the Federal Crop
18 Insurance Act (7 U.S.C. 1501 et seq.) or the Noninsured
19 Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) under section
20 196 of the Federal Agriculture Improvement and Reform
21 Act of 1996 (7 U.S.C. 7333) shall not exceed 90 percent
22 of the loss as determined by the Secretary: *Provided fur-*
23 *ther*, That the total amount of payments received under
24 this heading for producers who did not obtain a policy or
25 plan of insurance for an insurable commodity for the ap-

1 plicable crop year under the Federal Crop Insurance Act
2 (7 U.S.C. 1501 et seq.) for the crop incurring the losses
3 or did not file the required paperwork and pay the service
4 fee by the applicable State filing deadline for a noninsur-
5 able commodity for the applicable crop year under NAP
6 for the crop incurring the losses shall not exceed 70 per-
7 cent of the loss as determined by the Secretary: *Provided*
8 *further*, That producers receiving payments under this
9 heading, as determined by the Secretary, shall be required
10 to purchase crop insurance where crop insurance is avail-
11 able for the next two available crop years, excluding tree
12 insurance policies, and producers receiving payments
13 under this heading shall be required to purchase coverage
14 under NAP where crop insurance is not available in the
15 next two available crop years, as determined by the Sec-
16 retary: *Provided further*, That, not later than 120 days
17 after the end of fiscal year 2019, the Secretary shall sub-
18 mit a report to the Congress specifying the type, amount,
19 and method of such assistance by state and territory: *Pro-*
20 *vided further*, That such amount is designated by the Con-
21 gress as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to
22 section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and
23 Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

FARM SERVICE AGENCY

EMERGENCY FOREST RESTORATION PROGRAM

For an additional amount for the “Emergency Forest Restoration Program”, for necessary expenses related to the consequences of Hurricanes Michael and Florence and wildfires occurring in calendar year 2018, and other natural disasters, \$480,000,000, to remain available until expended: *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

NATURAL RESOURCES CONSERVATION SERVICE

WATERSHED AND FLOOD PREVENTION OPERATIONS

For an additional amount for “Watershed and Flood Prevention Operations”, for necessary expenses for the Emergency Watershed Protection Program related to the consequences of Hurricanes Michael and Florence and wildfires occurring in calendar year 2018, and other natural disasters, \$125,000,000, to remain available until expended: *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

RURAL DEVELOPMENT

RURAL COMMUNITY FACILITIES PROGRAM ACCOUNT

For an additional amount for the cost of grants for rural community facilities programs as authorized by section 306 and described in section 381E(d)(1) of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act, for necessary expenses related to the consequences of Hurricanes Michael and Florence and wildfires occurring in calendar year 2018, and other natural disasters, \$150,000,000, to remain available until expended: *Provided*, That sections 381E-H and 381N of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act are not applicable to the funds made available under this heading: *Provided further*, That such amount is designated by the Congress as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

GENERAL PROVISIONS—THIS TITLE

SEC. 101. In addition to other amounts made available by section 309 of Public Law 115–72, there is hereby appropriated \$600,000,000 (increased by \$5,000,000) (increased by \$5,000,000) for the Secretary of Agriculture to provide a grant to the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico for disaster nutrition assistance in response to Presidentially declared major disasters and emergencies: *Pro-*

1 *vided*, That the funds made available to the Common-
2 wealth of Puerto Rico under this section shall remain
3 available for obligation by the Commonwealth until Sep-
4 tember 30, 2020, and shall be in addition to funds other-
5 wise made available: *Provided further*, That such amount
6 is designated by the Congress as being for an emergency
7 requirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the
8 Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of
9 1985.

10 SEC. 102. In addition to amounts otherwise made
11 available, out of the funds made available under section
12 18 of Food and Nutrition Act of 2008, \$10,200,000 (in-
13 creased by \$15,000,000) shall be available for the Sec-
14 retary to provide a grant to the Commonwealth of the
15 Northern Mariana Islands for disaster nutrition assistance
16 in response to the Presidentially declared major disasters
17 and emergencies: *Provided*, That funds made available to
18 the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands
19 under this section shall remain available for obligation by
20 the Commonwealth until September 30, 2020: *Provided*
21 *further*, That such amount is designated by the Congress
22 as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to sec-
23 tion 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emer-
24 gency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

1 SEC. 103. For purposes of administering title I of
2 subdivision 1 of division B of the Bipartisan Budget Act
3 of 2018 (Public Law 115–123), losses to agricultural pro-
4 ducers resulting from hurricanes shall also include losses
5 of peach and blueberry crops in calendar year 2017 due
6 to extreme cold: *Provided*, That the amounts provided by
7 this section are designated by the Congress as being for
8 an emergency requirement pursuant to section
9 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency
10 Deficit Control Act of 1985: *Provided further*, That
11 amounts repurposed under this heading that were pre-
12 viously designated by the Congress as an emergency re-
13 quirement pursuant to the Balanced Budget and Emer-
14 gency Deficit Control Act of 1985 are designated by the
15 Congress as an emergency requirement pursuant to sec-
16 tion 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emer-
17 gency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

18 SEC. 104. (a)(1) Except as provided in paragraph
19 (2), a person or legal entity is not eligible to receive a
20 payment under the Market Facilitation Program estab-
21 lished pursuant to the Commodity Credit Corporation
22 Charter Act (15 U.S.C. 714 et seq.) if the average ad-
23 justed gross income of such person or legal entity is great-
24 er than \$900,000.

1 (2) Paragraph (1) shall not apply to a person or legal
 2 entity if at least 75 percent of the adjusted gross income
 3 of such person or legal entity is derived from farming,
 4 ranching, or forestry related activities.

5 (b) A person or legal entity may not receive a pay-
 6 ment under the Market Facilitation Program described in
 7 subsection (a)(1), directly or indirectly, of more than
 8 \$125,000.

9 (c) In this section, the term “average adjusted gross
 10 income” has the meaning given the term defined in section
 11 760.1502 of title 7 Code of Federal Regulations (as in
 12 effect July 18, 2018).

13 (d) The amount provided by this section is designated
 14 by the Congress as being for an emergency requirement
 15 pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budg-
 16 et and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

17 TITLE II

18 DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

19 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ADMINISTRATION

20 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

21 (INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

22 Pursuant to section 703 of the Public Works and
 23 Economic Development Act (42 U.S.C. 3233), for an addi-
 24 tional amount for “Economic Development Assistance
 25 Programs” for necessary expenses related to flood mitiga-

tion, disaster relief, long-term recovery, and restoration of infrastructure in areas that received a major disaster designation as a result of Hurricanes Florence, Michael, and Lane, Typhoons Yutu and Mangkhut, and of wildfires, volcanic eruptions, earthquakes, and other natural disasters occurring in calendar year 2018 under the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 5121 et seq.), \$600,000,000, to remain available until expended: *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985: *Provided further*, That within the amount appropriated, up to 2 percent of funds may be transferred to the “Salaries and Expenses” account for administration and oversight activities: *Provided further*, That within the amount appropriated, \$1,000,000 shall be transferred to the “Office of Inspector General” account for carrying out investigations and audits related to the funding provided under this heading.

NATIONAL OCEANIC AND ATMOSPHERIC

ADMINISTRATION

OPERATIONS, RESEARCH, AND FACILITIES

For an additional amount for “Operations, Research, and Facilities” for necessary expenses related to the con-

1 sequences of Hurricanes Florence and Michael, Typhoon
2 Yutu, and of wildfires, \$120,570,000, to remain available
3 until September 30, 2020, as follows:

4 (1) \$3,000,000 for repair and replacement of
5 observing assets, real property, and equipment;

6 (2) \$11,000,000 for marine debris assessment
7 and removal;

8 (3) \$31,570,000 for mapping, charting, and ge-
9 odesy services;

10 (4) \$25,000,000 to improve: (a) hurricane in-
11 tensity forecasting, including through deployment of
12 unmanned ocean observing platforms and enhanced
13 data assimilation; (b) flood prediction, forecasting,
14 and mitigation capabilities; and (c) wildfire pre-
15 diction, detection, and forecasting; and

16 (5) \$50,000,000 for Title IX Fund grants as
17 authorized under section 906(c) of division O of
18 Public Law 114–113:

19 *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress
20 as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to sec-
21 tion 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emer-
22 gency Deficit Control Act of 1985: *Provided further*, That
23 the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration
24 shall submit a spending plan to the Committees on Appro-
25 priations of the House of Representatives and the Senate

1 for funding provided under subsection (4) of this heading
2 within 45 days after the date of enactment of this Act.

3 PROCUREMENT, ACQUISITION AND CONSTRUCTION

4 For an additional amount for “Procurement, Acquisi-
5 tion and Construction”, \$25,000,000, to remain available
6 until September 30, 2021, for improvements to oper-
7 ational and research weather supercomputing infrastruc-
8 ture and satellite ground services used for hurricane inten-
9 sity and track prediction; flood prediction, forecasting, and
10 mitigation; and wildfire prediction, detection, and fore-
11 casting: *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the
12 Congress as being for an emergency requirement pursuant
13 to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and
14 Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985: *Provided further*,
15 That the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administra-
16 tion shall submit a spending plan to the Committees on
17 Appropriations of the House of Representatives and the
18 Senate within 45 days after the date of enactment of this
19 Act.

20 FISHERIES DISASTER ASSISTANCE

21 For an additional amount for “Fisheries Disaster As-
22 sistance” for necessary expenses associated with the miti-
23 gation of fishery disasters, \$150,000,000, to remain avail-
24 able until expended: *Provided*, That funds shall be used
25 for mitigating the effects of commercial fishery failures

1 and fishery resource disasters declared by the Secretary
 2 of Commerce, including those declared by the Secretary
 3 to be a direct result of Hurricanes Florence and Michael
 4 and Typhoons Yutu and Mangkhut: *Provided further*,
 5 That such amount is designated by the Congress as being
 6 for an emergency requirement pursuant to section
 7 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency
 8 Deficit Control Act of 1985.

9 DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

10 UNITED STATES MARSHALS SERVICE

11 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

12 For an additional amount for “Salaries and Ex-
 13 penses” for necessary expenses related to the con-
 14 sequences of Hurricanes Florence and Michael and Ty-
 15 phoon Yutu, \$1,336,000: *Provided*, That such amount is
 16 designated by the Congress as being for an emergency re-
 17 quirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Bal-
 18 anced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

19 FEDERAL PRISON SYSTEM

20 BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES

21 For an additional amount for “Buildings and Facili-
 22 ties” for necessary expenses related to the consequences
 23 of Hurricanes Florence and Michael and Typhoon Yutu,
 24 \$28,400,000, to remain available until expended: *Pro-*
 25 *vided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress

1 as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to sec-
2 tion 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emer-
3 gency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

4 RELATED AGENCIES

5 LEGAL SERVICES CORPORATION

6 PAYMENT TO THE LEGAL SERVICES CORPORATION

7 For an additional amount for “Payment to the Legal
8 Services Corporation” to carry out the purposes of the
9 Legal Services Corporation Act by providing for necessary
10 expenses related to the consequences of Hurricanes Flor-
11 ence, Michael, and Lane, Typhoons Yutu and Mangkhut,
12 and calendar year 2018 wildfires, volcanic eruptions, and
13 earthquakes, \$15,000,000: *Provided*, That such amount is
14 designated by the Congress as being for an emergency re-
15 quirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Bal-
16 anced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985:
17 *Provided further*, That none of the funds appropriated in
18 this Act to the Legal Services Corporation shall be ex-
19 pended for any purpose prohibited or limited by, or con-
20 trary to any of the provisions of, sections 501, 502, 503,
21 504, 505, and 506 of Public Law 105–119, and all funds
22 appropriated in this Act to the Legal Services Corporation
23 shall be subject to the same terms and conditions set forth
24 in such sections, except that all references in sections 502
25 and 503 to 1997 and 1998 shall be deemed to refer in-

1 stead to 2018 and 2019, respectively, and except that sec-
2 tions 501 and 503 of Public Law 104–134 (referenced by
3 Public Law 105–119) shall not apply to the amount made
4 available under this heading: *Provided further*, That, for
5 the purposes of this Act, the Legal Services Corporation
6 shall be considered an agency of the United States Gov-
7 ernment.

8 TITLE III

9 DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE

10 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, MARINE CORPS

11 For an additional amount for “Operation and Main-
12 tenance, Marine Corps”, \$200,000,000, for necessary ex-
13 penses related to the consequences of Hurricanes Michael
14 and Florence: *Provided*, That such amount is designated
15 by the Congress as being for an emergency requirement
16 pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budg-
17 et and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

18 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, AIR FORCE

19 For an additional amount for “Operation and Main-
20 tenance, Air Force”, \$400,000,000, for necessary ex-
21 penses related to the consequences of Hurricanes Michael
22 and Florence: *Provided*, That such amount is designated
23 by the Congress as being for an emergency requirement
24 pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budg-
25 et and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

1 TITLE IV
2 CORPS OF ENGINEERS—CIVIL
3 DEPARTMENT OF THE ARMY
4 INVESTIGATIONS

5 For an additional amount for “Investigations” for
6 necessary expenses related to the completion, or initiation
7 and completion, of flood and storm damage reduction, in-
8 cluding shore protection, studies which are currently au-
9 thorized or which are authorized after the date of enact-
10 ment of this Act, to reduce risk from future floods and
11 hurricanes, at full Federal expense, \$35,000,000, to re-
12 main available until expended, in States and insular areas
13 that were impacted by Hurricanes Florence and Michael,
14 Typhoon Mangkhut, Super Typhoon Yutu, and Tropical
15 Storm Gita: *Provided*, That such amount is designated by
16 the Congress as being for an emergency requirement pur-
17 suant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget
18 and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985: *Provided fur-*
19 *ther*, That the Assistant Secretary of the Army for Civil
20 Works shall provide a monthly report directly to the Com-
21 mittees on Appropriations of the House and the Senate
22 detailing the allocation and obligation of these funds, in-
23 cluding new studies selected to be initiated using funds
24 provided under this heading, beginning not later than 60
25 days after the enactment of this Act.

CONSTRUCTION

1
2 For an additional amount for “Construction” for nec-
3 essary expenses, \$715,000,000 (increased by
4 \$25,000,000), to remain available until expended, to con-
5 struct flood and storm damage reduction, including shore
6 protection, projects which are currently authorized or
7 which are authorized after the date of enactment of this
8 Act, and flood and storm damage reduction, including
9 shore protection, projects which have signed Chief’s Re-
10 ports as of the date of enactment of this Act or which
11 are studied using funds provided under the heading “In-
12 vestigations” if the Secretary determines such projects to
13 be technically feasible, economically justified, and environ-
14 mentally acceptable, in States and insular areas that were
15 impacted by Hurricanes Florence and Michael, Typhoon
16 Mangkhut, Super Typhoon Yutu, and Tropical Storm
17 Gita: *Provided*, That projects receiving funds provided in
18 Public Law 115–123 shall not be eligible for funding pro-
19 vided under this heading: *Provided further*, That for
20 projects receiving funding under this heading, the provi-
21 sions of Section 902 of the Water Resources Act of 1986
22 shall not apply to these funds: *Provided further*, That the
23 completion of ongoing construction projects receiving
24 funds provided under this heading shall be at full Federal
25 expense with respect to such funds: *Provided further*, That

1 using funds provided under this heading, the non-Federal
2 cash contribution for projects not eligible as ongoing con-
3 struction projects shall be financed in accordance with the
4 provisions of section 103(k) of Public Law 99–662 over
5 a period of 30 years from the date of completion of the
6 project or separable element: *Provided further*, That of
7 this amount \$25,000,000 shall be used for Corps of Engi-
8 neers ecosystem restoration projects: *Provided further*,
9 That up to \$25,000,000 of the funds made available under
10 this heading shall be used for continuing authorities
11 projects to reduce the risk of flooding and storm damage:
12 *Provided further*, That any projects using funds appro-
13 priated under this heading shall be initiated only after
14 non-Federal interests have entered into binding agree-
15 ments with the Secretary requiring, where applicable, the
16 non-Federal interests to pay 100 percent of the operation,
17 maintenance, repair, replacement, and rehabilitation costs
18 of the project and to hold and save the United States free
19 from damages due to the construction or operation and
20 maintenance of the project, except for damages due to the
21 fault or negligence of the United States or its contractors:
22 *Provided further*, That such amount is designated by the
23 Congress as being for an emergency requirement pursuant
24 to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and
25 Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985: *Provided further*,

1 That the Assistant Secretary of the Army for Civil Works
2 shall provide a monthly report directly to the Committees
3 on Appropriations of the House of Representatives and the
4 Senate detailing the allocation and obligation of these
5 funds, beginning not later than 60 days after the date of
6 the enactment of this Act.

7 MISSISSIPPI RIVER AND TRIBUTARIES

8 For an additional amount for “Mississippi River and
9 Tributaries” for necessary expenses to address emergency
10 situations at Corps of Engineers projects and rehabilitate
11 and repair damages to Corps of Engineers projects,
12 caused by natural disasters, \$225,000,000, to remain
13 available until expended: *Provided*, That such amount is
14 designated by the Congress as being for an emergency re-
15 quirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Bal-
16 anced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985:
17 *Provided further*, That the Assistant Secretary of the
18 Army for Civil Works shall provide a monthly report di-
19 rectly to the Committees on Appropriations of the House
20 of Representatives and the Senate detailing the allocation
21 and obligation of these funds, beginning not later than 60
22 days after the enactment of this Act.

23 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE

24 For an additional amount for “Operation and Main-
25 tenance” for necessary expenses to dredge Federal naviga-

1 tion projects in response to, and repair damages to Corps
 2 of Engineers Federal projects caused by, natural disasters,
 3 \$245,000,000, to remain available until expended, of
 4 which such sums as are necessary to cover the Federal
 5 share of eligible operation and maintenance costs for
 6 coastal harbors and channels, and for inland harbors shall
 7 be derived from the Harbor Maintenance Trust Fund:
 8 *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress
 9 as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to sec-
 10 tion 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emer-
 11 gency Deficit Control Act of 1985: *Provided further*, That
 12 the Assistant Secretary of the Army for Civil Works shall
 13 provide a monthly report directly to the Committees on
 14 Appropriations of the House of Representatives and the
 15 Senate detailing the allocation and obligation of these
 16 funds, beginning not later than 60 days after the enact-
 17 ment of this Act.

18 DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR

19 CENTRAL UTAH PROJECT

20 CENTRAL UTAH PROJECT COMPLETION ACCOUNT

21 For an additional amount for “Central Utah Project
 22 Completion Account”, \$350,000, to be deposited into the
 23 Utah Reclamation Mitigation and Conservation Account
 24 for use by the Utah Reclamation Mitigation and Conserva-
 25 tion Commission, to remain available until expended, for

1 expenses necessary in carrying out fire remediation activi-
2 ties related to wildfires in 2018: *Provided*, That such
3 amount is designated by the Congress as being for an
4 emergency requirement pursuant to section
5 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency
6 Deficit Control Act of 1985.

7 BUREAU OF RECLAMATION

8 WATER AND RELATED RESOURCES

9 For an additional amount for “Water and Related
10 Resources”, \$15,500,000, to remain available until ex-
11 pended, for fire remediation and suppression emergency

 2 2002 of the Social Security Act, the distribution of such

 6 appropriated in this paragraph that are used for renova-
 7 tion, repair or construction: *Provided further*, That funds
 8 appropriated in this paragraph are in addition to the enti-
 9 tlement grants authorized by section 2002(a)(1) of the So-
 10 cial Security Act and shall not be available for such enti-
 11 tlement grants: *Provided further*, That in addition to other
 12 uses permitted by title XX of the Social Security Act,
 13 funds appropriated in this paragraph may be used for
 14 health services (including mental health services), and for
 15 costs of renovating, repairing, and construction of health
 16 care facilities (including mental health facilities), child
 17 care centers, and other social services facilities: *Provided*
 18 *further*, That of the amount provided, up to \$1,000,000,
 19 to remain available until expended, shall be transferred to
 20 “Office of the Secretary—Office of Inspector General” for

17 necessary expenses directly related to the consequences of
18 Hurricanes Florence and Michael, Typhoon Mangkhut,
19 Super Typhoon Yutu, and the California wildfires in 2018
20 in those areas for which a major disaster or emergency
21 has been declared under section 401 or 501 of the Robert
22 T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act
23 (42 U.S.C. 5170 and 5191): *Provided*, That none of the
24 funds appropriated in this paragraph shall be included in

19 EDUCATION RECOVERY

20 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

21 For an additional amount for “Education Recovery”
 22 for necessary expenses related to the consequences of Hur-
 23 ricanes Florence and Michael, Typhoon Mangkhut, Super
 24 Typhoon Yutu, the California wildfires in 2018, the No-
 25 vember 2018 Anchorage Earthquake or the volcanic erup-

tion and earthquakes in Hawaii in 2018 in those areas for which a major disaster or emergency has been declared under section 401 or 501 of the Robert T.  23 a detailed expenditure plan for funds provided under this
 24 heading: *Provided further*, That such amount is designated

2 et and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

3 MILITARY CONSTRUCTION, AIR FORCE

4 For an additional amount for “Military Construction,
5 Air Force”, \$700,000,000, to remain available until Sep-
6 tember 30, 2023, for planning and design, and construc-
7 tion expenses related to the consequences of Hurricane
8 Michael: *Provided*, That none of the funds shall be avail-
9 able for obligation until the Committees on Appropriations
10 of the House of Representatives and the Senate receive
11 a basing plan and future mission requirements for instal-
12 lations significantly damaged by Hurricane Michael: *Pro-*
13 *vided further*, That, not later than 60 days after enact-

15 designee, shall submit to the Committees on Appropria-

 3 obligation until the Committees on Appropriations of the
 4 House of Representatives and the Senate receive form
 5 1391 for each specific request: *Provided further*, That, not
 6 later than 60 days after enactment of this Act, the Direc-
 7 tor of the Army National Guard, or his designee, shall
 8 submit to the Committees on Appropriations of the House
 9 of Representatives and the Senate a detailed expenditure
 10 plan for funds provided under this heading: *Provided fur-*
 11 *ther*, That such funds may be obligated or expended for
 12 planning and design and military construction projects not
 13 otherwise authorized by law: *Provided further*, That such
 14 amount is designated by the Congress as being for an
 15 emergency requirement pursuant to section

21 related to the consequences of major declared disasters oc-
22 ccurring in calendar year 2018: *Provided*, That amounts
23 repurposed under this heading that were previously des-

 10 until expended: *Provided*, That such amount is designated
 11 by the Congress as being for an emergency requirement
 12 pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budg-
 13 et and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

14 DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN

15 DEVELOPMENT

16 COMMUNITY PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

17 COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT FUND

18 (INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

19 For an additional amount for “Community Develop-
 20 ment Fund”, \$1,160,000,000 (increased by \$50,000,000),
 21 to remain available until expended, for necessary expenses
 22 for activities authorized under title I of the Housing and
 23 Community Development Act of 1974 (42 U.S.C. 5301 et
 24 seq.) related to disaster relief, long-term recovery, restora-
 25 tion of infrastructure and housing, economic revitalization,

1 and mitigation in the most impacted and distressed areas
2 resulting from a major disaster that occurred in 2018 (ex-
3 cept as otherwise provided under this heading) pursuant
4 to the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency
5 Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 5121 et seq.): *Provided*, That
6 funds shall be awarded directly to the State, unit of gen-
7 eral local government, or Indian tribe (as such term is de-
8 fined in section 102 of the Housing and Community De-
9 velopment Act of 1974) at the discretion of the Secretary:
10 *Provided further*, That of the amounts made available
11 under this heading \$100,000,000 (increased by
12 \$50,000,000) shall be allocated to meet unmet infrastruc-
13 ture needs for grantees that received allocations for disas-
14 ters that occurred in 2017 (excluding disasters specified
15 in section 501(a) of title V of this Act) under this heading
16 of division B of Public Law 115–56 and title XI of Public
17 Law 115–123: *Provided further*, That of the amounts pro-
18 vided in the previous proviso, the Secretary’s unmet infra-
19 structure needs determinations shall not take into account
20 mitigation-specific allocations: *Provided further*, That any
21 funds made available under this heading and under the
22 same heading in Public Law 115–254 that remain avail-
23 able, after the funds under such headings have been allo-
24 cated for necessary expenses for activities authorized
25 under such headings, shall be allocated to grantees, for

1 mitigation activities in the most impacted and distressed
2 areas resulting from a major disaster that occurred in
3 2018: *Provided further*, That such allocations shall be
4 made in the same proportion that the amount of funds

17 to maintain on a public website information containing
18 common reporting criteria established by the Department

21 including copies of all relevant procurement documents,
22 grantee administrative contracts and details of ongoing
23 procurement processes, as determined by the Secretary:
24 *Provided further*, That prior to the obligation of funds a
25 grantee shall submit a plan to the Secretary for approval

1 detailing the proposed use of all funds, including criteria
 2 for eligibility and how the use of these funds will address
 3 long-term recovery and restoration of infrastructure and

 15 *ther*, That a State, unit of general local government, or
 16 Indian tribe may use up to 5 percent of its allocation for
 17 administrative costs: *Provided further*, That the first pro-
 18 viso under this heading in the Supplemental Appropria-
 19 tions for Disaster Relief Requirements Act, 2018 (division
 20 I of Public Law 115–254) is amended by striking “State
 21 or unit of general local government” and inserting “State,
 22 unit of general local government, or Indian tribe (as such
 23 term is defined in section 102 of the Housing and Commu-
 24 nity Development Act of 1974 (42 U.S.C. 5302))”: *Pro-*
 25 *vided further*, That the sixth proviso under this heading

1 in the Supplemental Appropriations for Disaster Relief
2 Requirements Act, 2018 (division I of Public Law 115–
3 254) is amended by striking “State or subdivision thereof”
4 and inserting “State, unit of general local government, or
5 Indian tribe (as such term is defined in section 102 of
6 the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974
7 (42 U.S.C. 5302))”: *Provided further*, That in admin-
8 istering the funds under this heading, the Secretary of
9 Housing and Urban Development may waive, or specify
10 alternative requirements for, any provision of any statute
11 or regulation that the Secretary administers in connection
12 with the obligation by the Secretary or the use by the re-
13 cipient of these funds (except for requirements related to
14 fair housing, nondiscrimination, labor standards, and the
15 environment), if the Secretary finds that good cause exists
16 for the waiver or alternative requirement and such waiver
17 or alternative requirement would not be inconsistent with
18 the overall purpose of title I of the Housing and Commu-
19 nity Development Act of 1974: *Provided further*, That,
20 notwithstanding the preceding proviso, recipients of funds
21 provided under this heading that use such funds to supple-
22 ment Federal assistance provided under section 402, 403,
23 404, 406, 407, 408 (c)(4), or 502 of the Robert T. Staf-
24 ford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (42
25 U.S.C. 5121 et seq.) may adopt, without review or public

1 comment, any environmental review, approval, or permit
2 performed by a Federal agency, and such adoption shall
3 satisfy the responsibilities of the recipient with respect to
4 such environmental review, approval or permit: *Provided*
5 *further*, That, notwithstanding section 104(g)(2) of the
6 Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (42
7 U.S.C. 5304(g)(2)), the Secretary may, upon receipt of
8 a request for release of funds and certification, imme-
9 diately approve the release of funds for an activity or
10 project assisted under this heading if the recipient has
11 adopted an environmental review, approval or permit
12 under the preceding proviso or the activity or project is
13 categorically excluded from review under the National En-
14 vironmental Policy Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.):
15 *Provided further*, That the Secretary shall publish via no-
16 tice in the Federal Register any waiver, or alternative re-
17 quirement, to any statute or regulation that the Secretary
18 administers pursuant to title I of the Housing and Com-
19 munity Development Act of 1974 no later than 5 days be-
20 fore the effective date of such waiver or alternative re-
21 quirement: *Provided further*, That of the amounts made
22 available under this heading, up to \$5,000,000 shall be
23 made available for capacity building and technical assist-
24 ance, including assistance on contracting and procurement
25 processes, to support States, units of general local govern-

1 ment, or Indian tribes (and their subrecipients) that re-
2 ceive allocations pursuant to this heading, received dis-
3 aster recovery allocations under the same heading in Pub-
4 lic Law 115–254, or may receive similar allocations for
5 disaster recovery in future appropriations Acts: *Provided*
6 *further*, That of the amounts made available under this
7 heading and under the same heading in Public Law 115–
8 254, up to \$2,500,000 shall be transferred, in aggregate,
9 to “Department of Housing and Urban Development—
10 Program Office Salaries and Expenses—Community Plan-
11 ning and Development” for necessary costs, including in-
12 formation technology costs, of administering and over-
13 seeing the obligation and expenditure of amounts under
14 this heading: *Provided further*, That the amount specified
15 in the preceding proviso shall be combined with funds ap-
16 propriated under the same heading and for the same pur-
17 pose in Public Law 115–254 and the aggregate of such
18 amounts shall be available for any of the same such pur-
19 poses specified under this heading or the same heading
20 in Public Law 115–254 without limitation: *Provided fur-*
21 *ther*, That such amount is designated by the Congress as
22 being for an emergency requirement pursuant to section
23 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency
24 Deficit Control Act of 1985.

1 GENERAL PROVISION—THIS TITLE

2 SEC. 1001. (a) Amounts previously made available
3 for activities authorized under title I of the Housing and
4 Community Development Act of 1974 (42 U.S.C. 5301 et
5 seq.) related to disaster relief, long-term recovery, restora-
6 tion of infrastructure and housing, economic revitalization,
7 and mitigation in the most impacted and distressed areas
8 resulting from a major disaster, including funds provided
9 under section 145 of division C of Public Law 114–223,
10 section 192 of division C of Public Law 114–223 (as
11 added by section 101(3) of division A of Public Law 114–
12 254), section 421 of division K of Public Law 115–31,
13 and any mitigation funding provided under the heading
14 “Department of Housing and Urban Development—Com-
15 munity Planning and Development—Community Develop-
16 ment Fund” of Public Law 115–123, that were allocated
17 in response to Hurricane Matthew, may be used inter-
18 changeably and without limitation for the same activities
19 in the most impacted and distressed areas related to Hur-
20 ricane Florence. In addition, any funds provided under the
21 heading “Department of Housing and Urban Develop-
22 ment—Community Planning and Development—Commu-
23 nity Development Fund” in this Act or in division I of
24 Public Law 115–254 that are allocated in response to
25 Hurricane Florence may be used interchangeably and

1 without limitation for the same activities in the most im-
2 pacted and distressed areas related to Hurricane Matthew.
3 Until HUD publishes the Federal Register Notice imple-
4 menting this provision, grantees may submit for HUD ap-
5 proval revised plans for the use of funds related to Hurri-
6 cane Matthew that expand the eligible beneficiaries of ex-
7 isting programs contained in such previously approved
8 plans to include those impacted by Hurricane Florence.
9 Approval of any such revised plans shall include the execu-
10 tion of revised grant terms and conditions as necessary.
11 Once the implementing Notice is published, any additional
12 action plan revisions shall follow the requirements con-
13 tained therein.

14 (b) Amounts made available for administrative costs
15 for activities authorized under title I of the Housing and
16 Community Development Act of 1974 (42 U.S.C. 5301 et
17 seq.) related to disaster relief, long-term recovery, restora-
18 tion of infrastructure and housing, economic revitalization,
19 and mitigation in the most impacted and distressed areas
20 under this Act or any future Act, and amounts previously
21 provided under section 420 of division L of Public Law
22 114–113, section 145 of division C of Public Law 114–
23 223, section 192 of division C of Public Law 114–223 (as
24 added by section 101(3) of division A of Public Law 114–
25 254), section 421 of division K of Public Law 115–31,

1 and under the heading “Department of Housing and
2 Urban Development—Community Planning and Develop-
3 ment—Community Development Fund” of division B of
4 Public Law 115–56, Public Law 115–123, and Public
5 Law 115–254, shall be available for eligible administrative
6 costs of the grantee related to any disaster relief funding
7 identified in this subsection without regard to the par-
8 ticular disaster appropriation from which such funds origi-
9 nated.

10 (c) The additional uses pursuant to this section for
11 amounts that were previously designated by the Congress,
12 respectively, as an emergency requirement or as being for
13 disaster relief pursuant to the Balanced Budget and
14 Emergency Deficit Control Act are designated by the Con-
15 gress as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to
16 section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and
17 Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985 or as being for
18 disaster relief pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(D) of the
19 Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of
20 1985.

21 TITLE XI

22 GENERAL PROVISION—THIS ACT

23 SEC. 1101. Each amount designated in this Act by
24 the Congress as being for an emergency requirement pur-
25 suant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget

1 and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985 shall be avail-
2 able (or rescinded or transferred, if applicable) only if the
3 President subsequently so designates all such amounts
4 and transmits such designations to the Congress.

5 SEC. 1102. None of the funds made available by this
6 Act for the Department of Homeland Security may be
7 used for the construction or expansion of immigration de-
8 tention facilities.

9 SEC. 1103. None of the funds appropriated or other-
10 wise made available by this Act for the Army Corps of
11 Engineers or Department of Homeland Security may be
12 obligated or expended to plan, develop, or construct a new
13 physical barrier along the Southwest border.

14 TITLE XII—FURTHER CONTINUING

15 APPROPRIATIONS

16 SEC. 1201. The Continuing Appropriations Act, 2019
17 (division C of Public Law 115–245) is further amended
18 by striking the date specified in section 105(3) and insert-
19 ing “February 8, 2019”.

1 This Act may be cited as the “Supplemental Appro-
2 priations Act, 2019”.
