A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

- 1 To amend Chapter 7 of Title 14 and Chapter 35 of Title 43 of the Official Code of Georgia
- 2 Annotated, relating to professional corporations and podiatry practice, respectively, so as to
- 3 change certain provisions relating to the practice of podiatry; to provide for podiatrists to join
- 4 professional corporations with other physicians; to revise certain definitions; to authorize
- 5 podiatrists to perform certain surgeries utilizing conscious sedation under the direction of
- 6 certain medical professionals; to change certain qualifications related to the licensing of
- 7 podiatrists; to specifically authorize the State Board of Podiatry Examiners to conduct
- 8 fingerprint based criminal background checks; to provide a process for conducting such
- 9 criminal background checks; to limit the use, dissemination, and liability relating to
- 10 information obtained from criminal background checks; to provide for related matters; to
- 11 repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

13 SECTION 1.

- 14 Chapter 7 of Title 14 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to professional
- 15 corporations, is amended by revising subsection (a) of Code Section 14-7-4, relating to
- 16 professional services in which a professional corporation may engage, as follows:
- 17 "(a) A professional corporation may practice only one profession, but for the purpose of
- this chapter, the:

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- 19 (1) The practice of architecture, professional engineering, and land surveying shall be
- considered the practice of only one profession to the extent that existing laws permit
- 21 overlapping practices by members of those specific professions not inconsistent with the
- ethics of the professions involved, and to:
- 23 (2) To the extent not inconsistent with the ethics of the professions involved or otherwise
- prohibited by law, physicians specializing in ophthalmology that are practicing within
- 25 their scope of practice as established by law may organize and jointly own a professional
- 26 corporation with optometrists that are practicing within their scope of practice as

27 established by law; provided, however, that nothing in this paragraph shall authorize 28 optometrists to attach the title 'physician' to such optometrists' names or to the name of 29 the professional corporation; and 30 (3) To the extent not inconsistent with the ethics of the professions involved or otherwise prohibited by law, physicians licensed as podiatrists that are practicing within their scope 31 32 of practice as established by law may organize and jointly own a professional corporation 33 with any physicians that are practicing within their own scope of practice as established 34 by law."

35 **SECTION 2.**

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Chapter 35 of Title 43 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to podiatry practice, is amended by revising paragraphs (5) and (7) of Code Section 43-35-3, relating to definitions, as follows:

- "(5) 'Podiatric medicine,' which includes chiropody, podiatry, and podiatric medicine and surgery, means that portion of the practice of medicine identified by the acts described in any one or more of the following:
 - (A) Charging a fee or other compensation, either directly or indirectly, for: any history or physical examination of a patient in a person's office or in a hospital, clinic, or other similar facility prior to, incident to, and necessary for the diagnosis and treatment, by primary medical care, surgical or other means, of diseases, ailments, injuries, cosmetic conditions, or abnormal conditions of the human foot and leg. As used in this subparagraph, the term 'cosmetic' means a surgical or medical procedure intended to enhance the physical appearance or function of the foot, ankle, or leg, including, but not limited to, skin problems such as blemishes, spider veins, and scar revisions
 - (i) Diagnosing and treating diseases, ailments, injuries, cosmetic conditions, abnormal conditions, or other conditions of the human foot, ankle, and leg using primary medical care, surgery, or other means;
- (ii) Performing any history or physical examination of a patient prior to, incident to, or necessary for the diagnosis and treatment of diseases, ailments, injuries, cosmetic conditions, abnormal conditions, or other conditions of the human foot, ankle, or leg using primary medical care, surgery, or other means;
- (B) Holding oneself out to the public, either directly or indirectly, as being engaged in
 the practice of podiatric medicine;
- (C) Displaying or using a title or abbreviation such as 'Doctor of Podiatric Medicine,'
 'D.P.M.,' 'Foot Doctor,' 'Foot Specialist,' 'Foot Surgeon,' 'Foot and Ankle Surgeon,' or
 other letters, designations, or symbols or signs of any type which expressly or implicitly

indicate to the general public that the user renders treatment to the foot, ankle, and leg

64	(D)(iii) Performing surgery on the foot, ankle, or leg of a patient, except that when
65	such surgery is performed under general:
66	(I) General anesthesia it shall be permissible only when said surgery is performed
67	at a facility permitted and regulated as a hospital or ambulatory surgical treatment
68	center under Article 1 of Chapter 7 of Title 31 and when said general anesthesia is
69	administered under the direction of a duly licensed physician; and
70	(II) Conscious sedation it shall be permissible only when said surgery is performed
71	at a facility permitted and regulated as a hospital or ambulatory surgical treatment
72	center under Article 1 of Chapter 7 of Title 31 and when said conscious sedation is
73	administered by a certified registered nurse anesthetist under the direction of a duly
74	licensed podiatrist or other duly licensed physician;
75	(E)(iv) Performing amputations of the toe; or
76	(F)(v) Performing amputations distal to and including the tarsometatarsal joint of the
77	foot but only when performed in a facility permitted and regulated as a hospital or
78	ambulatory surgical treatment center under Article 1 of Chapter 7 of Title 31 and
79	when performed by a podiatrist who is certified by the board in meeting the
80	requirements which shall be established by regulations of the board which have been
81	jointly approved by the board and the Georgia Composite Medical Board.;
82	(B) Holding oneself out to the public, either directly or indirectly, as being engaged in
83	the practice of podiatric medicine; or
84	(C) Displaying or using a title or abbreviation such as 'Doctor of Podiatric Medicine,'
85	'D.P.M.,' 'Foot Doctor,' 'Foot Specialist,' 'Foot Surgeon,' 'Foot and Ankle Surgeon,' or
86	other letters, designations, or symbols or signs of any type which expressly or implicitly
87	indicate to the general public that the user renders treatment to the foot, ankle, and leg
88	under the provisions of this chapter.
89	As used in this paragraph, the term 'cosmetic' means a surgical or medical procedure
90	intended to enhance the physical appearance or function of the foot, ankle, or leg,
91	including, but not limited to, skin problems such as blemishes, spider veins, and scar
92	revisions."
93	"(7) 'Podiatrist' means a physician and surgeon of the human foot, ankle, and leg who is
94	subject to this chapter."
95	SECTION 3.
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Said chapter is further amended by revising Code Section 43-35-12, relating to qualifications
 for licensing to practice podiatry, as follows:

- 98 "43-35-12.
- A license to practice podiatric medicine shall be issued to any person who:
- 100 (1) Is a graduate of an accredited college of podiatric medicine approved by the board;
- 101 (2) Holds a doctoral degree or its equivalent;
- 102 (3) Satisfactorily passes a board approved examination, if an examination is required by
- the board:
- (4) Successfully completes postdoctoral training of no less than 12 months as a resident
- in podiatric medicine and surgery in a program or institution approved by, and in good
- standing with, the board;
- 107 (5) Has attained the age of 21 years;
- 108 (6) Has satisfactory results, as determined by the board, from a criminal background
- check conducted by the Georgia Crime Information Center and the Federal Bureau of
- 110 <u>Investigation pursuant to Code Section 43-35-12.1</u>
- 111 (6)(7) Is not disqualified to receive a license under the provisions of Code Section
- 112 43-35-16; and
- 113 $\frac{7}{8}$ Pays the any required fee fees to the board.
- 114 SECTION 4.
- 115 Said chapter is further amended by adding a new Code section to read as follows:
- 116 "<u>43-35-12.1.</u>
- 117 (a) As used in this Code section, the term:
- (1) 'Criminal background check' means a search of the criminal records maintained by
- GCIC and the Federal Bureau of Investigation to determine whether an individual has a
- criminal record.
- (2) 'Criminal record' means any of the following:
- 122 (A) A conviction of a crime;
- 123 (B) An arrest, charge, and sentencing for a crime when:
- (i) A plea of nolo contendere was entered to the charge;
- (ii) First offender treatment without adjudication of guilt pursuant to the charge was
- 126 granted; or
- (iii) Adjudication or sentence was otherwise withheld or not entered on the charge;
- 128 <u>or</u>
- (C) An arrest and charge for a crime if the charge is pending, unless the time for
- prosecuting such crime has expired pursuant to Chapter 3 of Title 17.
- (3) 'GCIC' means the Georgia Crime Information Center established under Article 2 of
- 132 Chapter 3 of Title 35.

133	(b) Notwithstanding any other provisions of law to the contrary, the board shall have the
134	authority to require a criminal background check on any person seeking a license or a
135	renewal of license to practice podiatric medicine. Such person shall furnish fingerprints
136	in such form and of such quality as GCIC and the Federal Bureau of Investigation deem
137	acceptable for submission. Upon receipt of such fingerprints, GCIC shall search its own
138	records and promptly transmit such fingerprints to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for
139	a search of the bureau's records. GCIC shall notify the board in writing of any criminal
140	record or if there is no such finding.
141	(c) A person who has submitted fingerprints pursuant to this Code section may request an
142	inspection, modification, correction, or supplementation of his or her criminal record
143	information pursuant to Code Section 35-3-37, if he or she believes such information to be
144	inaccurate, incomplete, or misleading.
145	(d) The board shall perform criminal background checks either under agreement with
146	GCIC or contract with GCIC and the appropriate law enforcement agencies which have
147	access to GCIC and Federal Bureau of Investigation information to have such agencies
148	perform criminal background checks for the board. The board and such appropriate law
149	enforcement agencies may charge reasonable fees for performing criminal background
150	checks.
151	(e) Neither GCIC, the board, any law enforcement agency, the Secretary of State, nor the
152	employees of the office of the Secretary of State, or any such entities shall be responsible
153	for the accuracy of information nor have any liability for defamation, invasion of privacy,
154	negligence, or any other claim provided in connection with any dissemination of
155	information or determination based thereon pursuant to this chapter.
156	(f) All information received from GCIC or the Federal Bureau of Investigation shall be
157	privileged, shall be used exclusively for purposes related to licensure under this chapter,
158	and shall not be released or otherwise disclosed to any other person or agency except to any
159	person or agency which otherwise has a legal right to inspect licensing files. All such
160	information collected by the board shall be maintained pursuant to applicable laws and
161	rules or regulations of GCIC and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Penalties for the
162	unauthorized release or disclosure of any such information shall be as prescribed pursuant
163	to applicable laws and rules or regulations of GCIC and the Federal Bureau of
164	Investigation."

165 **SECTION 5.**

All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
