AN ACT

To direct the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to carry out a pilot program on dog training therapy.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2	This Act may be cited as the "Puppies Assisting						
3	Wounded Servicemembers for Veterans Therapy Act" or						
4	the "PAWS for Veterans Therapy Act".						
5	SEC. 2. FINDINGS.						
6	Congress makes the following findings:						
7	(1) According to the analyses of veteran suicide						
8	published by the Department of Veterans Affairs						
9	August 2016 and titled "Suicide Among Veterans						
10	and Other Americans", and in June 2018, titled						
11	"VA National Suicide Date Report"—						
12	(A) an average of 20 veterans died by sui-						
13	cide each day in 2014;						
14	(B) mental health disorders, including						
15	major depression and other mood disorders,						
16	have been associated with increased risk for sui-						
17	cide;						
18	(C) since 2001, the proportion of users of						
19	the Veterans Health Administration with men-						
20	tal health conditions or substance use disorders						
21	has increased from approximately 27 percent in						
22	2001 to more than 40 percent in 2014; and						
23	(D) overall, suicide rates are highest						
24	among patients with mental health and sub-						
25	stance use disorder diagnoses who are in treat-						
26	ment and lower among those who received a						

- 1 mental health diagnosis but were not at risk 2 enough to require enhanced care from a mental 3 health provider.
- (2) The Department of Veterans Affairs must 5 be more effective in its approach to reducing the 6 burden of veteran suicide connected to mental health 7 disorders, including post-traumatic stress disorder 8 (in this section referred to as "PTSD"), and new, 9 rigorous scientific research provides persuasive 10 weight to the growing anecdotal evidence that serv-11 ice dogs ameliorate the symptoms associated with 12 PTSD, and in particular, help prevent veteran sui-13 cide.
 - (3) Several organizations have proven track records of training service dogs for veterans with severe PTSD and dramatically improving those veterans' quality of life, ability to re-enter society, and, most importantly, their chances of survival.

19 SEC. 3. DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS PILOT PRO-

20 GRAM ON DOG TRAINING THERAPY.

- 21 (a) In General.—Commencing not later than 120 22 days after the date of the enactment of the Act, subject 23 to the availability of appropriations, the Secretary of Vet-24 erans Affairs shall carry out a pilot program under which
- 25 the Secretary shall make grants to one or more appro-

2	ing the effectiveness of addressing post-deployment mental					
3	health and post-traumatic stress disorder (in this section					
4	referred to as "PTSD") symptoms through a therapeut					
5	medium of training service dogs for veterans with disabil-

7	(b) Duration of Pilot Program.—The pilot pro-					
8	gram required by subsection (a) shall be carried out du					
9	ing the 5-year period beginning on the date of the com-					
10	mencement of the pilot program.					
11	(c) Conditions on Receipt of Grants.—As a con-					
12	dition of receiving a grant under this section, a non-gov					
13	ernment entity shall—					
14	(1) submit to the Secretary certification that					
15	the entity is an organization described in section					
16	501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986					
17	that—					
18	(A) provides service dogs to veterans with					
19	PTSD; and					
20	(B) is accredited by, or adheres to stand-					
21	ards comparable to those of, an accrediting or-					
22	ganization with demonstrated experience, na-					
23	tional scope, and recognized leadership and ex-					
24	pertise in the training of service dogs and edu-					
25	cation in the use of service dogs;					

- 1 (2) agree to cover all costs in excess of the 2 grant amount;
 - (3) agree to reaccept or replace the service dog the organization provided to the veteran, if necessary, as determined by the organization and the veteran;
 - (4) provide a wellness certification from a licensed veterinarian for any dog participating in the program;
 - (5) employ at least one person with clinical experience related to mental health;
 - (6) ensure that veterans participating in the pilot program receive training from certified service dog training instructors for a period of time determined appropriate by the organization and the Secretary, including service skills to address or alleviate symptoms unique to veterans' needs;
 - (7) agree to provide both lectures on service dog training methodologies and practical hands-on training and grooming of service dogs;
 - (8) agree that in hiring service dog training instructors to carry out training under the pilot program, the non-government entity will give a preference to veterans who have successfully graduated from PTSD or other residential treatment program

1	and who have received adequate certification in serv-
2	ice dog training;
3	(9) agree not to use shock collars or prong col-
4	lars as training tools and to use positive reinforce-
5	ment training;
6	(10) agree that upon the conclusion of training
7	provided using the grant funds—
8	(A) the veteran who received the training
9	will keep the dog unless the veteran and the
10	veteran's health provider decide it is not in the
11	best interest of the veteran;
12	(B) if the veteran does not opt to own the
13	dog, the entity will be responsible for caring for
14	and appropriately placing the dog;
15	(C) the Department of Veterans Affairs
16	will have no additional responsibility to provide
17	for any benefits under this section; and
18	(D) the Department of Veterans Affairs
19	will have no liability with respect to the dog;
20	(11) provide follow-up support service for the
21	life of the dog, including a contact plan between the
22	veteran and the entity to allow the veteran to reach
23	out for and receive adequate help with the service
24	dog and the organization to communicate with the

1	veteran to ensure the service dog is being properly						
2	cared for; and						
3	(12) submit to the Secretary an applicatio						
4	containing such information, certification, and assur						
5	ances as the Secretary may require.						
6	(d) Veteran Eligibility.—						
7	(1) In general.—For the purposes of this see						
8	tion, an eligible veteran is a veteran who—						
9	(A) is enrolled in the patient enrollment						
10	system in the Department of Veterans Affairs						
11	under section 1705 of title 38, United States						
12	Code;						
13	(B) has been recommended for the pilot						
14	program under this section by a qualified health						
15	care provider or clinical team based on the med-						
16	ical judgment that the veteran may potentially						
17	benefit from participating; and						
18	(C) agrees to successfully complete train-						
19	ing provided by an eligible organization that re-						
20	ceives a grant under this section.						
21	(2) Relationship to participation in						
22	OTHER PROGRAM.—Veterans may participate in the						
23	pilot program in conjunction with the compensated						
24	work therapy program of the Department of Vet-						

erans Affairs.

1	(3) Continuing eligibility requirement.—					
2	To remain eligible to participate in the program,					
3	veteran shall see the health care provider or clinical					
4	team of the Department of Veterans Affairs treating					
5	the veteran for PTSD at least once every 6 month					
6	to determine, based on a clinical evaluation of eff					
7	cacy, whether the veteran continues to benefit from					
8	the program.					
9	(e) Collection of Data.—In carrying out this sec-					
10	tion, the Secretary shall—					
11	(1) develop metrics and other appropriate					
12	means to measure, with respect to veterans partici-					
13	pation in the program, the improvement in psycho-					
14	social function and therapeutic compliance of such					
15	veterans and changes with respect to the dependence					
16	on prescription narcotics and psychotropic medica-					
17	tion of such veterans;					
18	(2) establish processes to document and track					
19	the progress of such veterans under the program in					
20	terms of the benefits and improvements noted as a					
21	result of the program; and					
22	(3) in addition, the Secretary shall continue to					
23	collect these data over the course of 5 years for each					
24	veteran who has continued with the dog he or she

has personally trained.

1 (f) GAO Briefing and Study.—

- (1) Briefing.—Not later than 1 year after the date of the commencement of the pilot program under subsection (a), the Comptroller General of the United States shall provide to the Committees on Veterans' Affairs of the House of Representatives and the Senate a briefing on the methodology established for the program.
 - (2) Report.—Not later than 270 days after the date on which the program terminates, the Comptroller General shall submit to the committees specified in paragraph (1) a report on the program. Such report shall include an evaluation of the approach and methodology used for the program with respect to—
 - (A) helping veterans with severe PTSD return to civilian life;
 - (B) relevant metrics, including reduction in metrics such as reduction in scores under the PTSD check-list (PCL-5), improvement in psychosocial function, and therapeutic compliance; and
 - (C) reducing the dependence of participants on prescription narcotics and psychotropic medication.

- 1 (g) Definition.—For the purposes of this section,
- 2 the term "service dog training instructor" means an in-
- 3 structor who provides the direct training of veterans with
- 4 PTSD and other post-deployment issues in the art and
- 5 science of service dog training and handling.
