A BILL

To require the Secretary of the Interior to establish Tribal Wildlife Corridors, and for other purposes.

1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2	tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4	This Act may be cited as the "Tribal Wildlife Cor-
5	ridors Act of 2019".
6	SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.
7	In this Act:
8	(1) Connectivity.—The term "connectivity"
9	means the degree to which the landscape or seascape
10	facilitates native species movement.
11	(2) Corridor.—The term "corridor" means a
12	distinct component of a landscape or seascape
13	that—
14	(A) provides habitat or ecological connec-
15	tivity; and
16	(B) allows for fish, wildlife, or plant move-
17	ment.
18	(3) Indian Land.—The term "Indian land"
19	means land of an Indian tribe, or an Indian indi-
20	vidual, that is—
21	(A) held in trust by the United States; or
22	(B) subject to a restriction against alien-
23	ation imposed by the United States.
24	(4) Indian tribe.—The term "Indian tribe"
25	has the meaning given the term in section 4 of the

- Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance
 Act (25 U.S.C. 5304).
- (5) SECRETARY.—The term "Secretary" means the Secretary of the Interior, acting through the Director of the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, in consultation with the Bureau of Indian Affairs.
- 8 (6) TRIBAL WILDLIFE CORRIDOR.—The term
 9 "Tribal Wildlife Corridor" means a corridor estab10 lished by the Secretary under section 3(a).

11 SEC. 3. ESTABLISHMENT OF TRIBAL WILDLIFE CORRIDORS.

- 12 (a) IN GENERAL.—
- 13 (1) NOMINATIONS.—An Indian tribe may nomi14 nate a corridor within Indian land of the Indian
 15 tribe as a Tribal Wildlife Corridor by submitting to
 16 the Secretary an application at such time, in such
 17 manner, and containing such information as the Sec18 retary may require.
 - (2) Determination.—Not later than 90 days after the date on which the Secretary receives an application under paragraph (1), the Secretary shall determine whether the nominated Tribal Wildlife Corridor described in the application meets the criteria established under subsection (b).

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1 (3) Publication.—On approval of an applica-2 tion under paragraph (2), the Secretary shall pub-3 lish in the Federal Register a notice of the establishment of the Tribal Wildlife Corridor, which shall include a map and legal description of the land des-5 6 ignated as a Tribal Wildlife Corridor. 7 (b) Criteria.— 8 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 540 days 9 after the date of enactment of this Act, the Sec-10 retary shall establish criteria for determining wheth-11 er a corridor nominated by an Indian tribe under 12 subsection (a)(1) qualifies as a Tribal Wildlife Cor-13 ridor. 14 (2)Inclusions.—The criteria established 15 under paragraph (1) shall include, at a minimum, 16 the following: 17 (A) The restoration of historical habitat 18 for the purposes of facilitating connectivity. 19 (B) The management of land for the pur-20 poses of facilitating connectivity. 21 (C) The management of land to prevent 22 the imposition of barriers that may hinder cur-23 rent or future connectivity. 24 (c) Removal.—

1	(1) IN GENERAL.—An Indian tribe may elect to
2	remove the designation of a Tribal Wildlife Corridor
3	on the Indian land of the Indian tribe by notifying
4	the Secretary.
5	(2) Effect of Removal.—An Indian tribe
6	that elects to remove a designation under paragraph
7	(1) may not receive assistance under section 5 or 6.
8	SEC. 4. COORDINATION OF LAND USE PLANS.
9	Section 202 of the Federal Land Policy and Manage-
10	ment Act of 1976 (43 U.S.C. 1712) is amended—
11	(1) in subsection (b)—
12	(A) by striking "Indian tribes by" and in-
13	serting the following: "Indian tribes—
14	"(1) by";
15	(B) in paragraph (1) (as so designated), by
16	striking the period at the end and inserting ";
17	and"; and
18	(C) by adding at the end the following:
19	"(2) for the purposes of determining whether
20	the land use plans for land in the National Forest
21	System would provide additional connectivity to ben-
22	efit the purposes of a Tribal Wildlife Corridor estab-
23	lished under section 3(a) of the Tribal Wildlife Cor-
24	ridors Act of 2019."; and
25	(2) by adding at the end the following:

"(g) Tribal Wildlife Corridors.—On the estab-1 lishment of a Tribal Wildlife Corridor under section 3(a) of the Tribal Wildlife Corridors Act of 2019, the Secretary 3 4 shall conduct a meaningful consultation with the Indian tribe that administers the Tribal Wildlife Corridor to determine whether, through the revision of one or more existing land use plans, the Tribal Wildlife Corridor can— 8 "(1) be expanded into public lands; or 9 "(2) otherwise benefit connectivity (as defined 10 in section 2 of that Act) between public lands and 11 the Tribal Wildlife Corridor.". 12 SEC. 5. TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE. 13 The Secretary shall provide to Indian tribes technical 14 assistance relating to the establishment, management, and 15 expansion of a Tribal Wildlife Corridor, including assistance with accessing wildlife data and working with private 16 landowners to access Federal and State programs to improve wildlife habitat and connectivity on non-Federal land. 19 SEC. 6. AVAILABILITY OF ASSISTANCE. 21 (a) Conservation Programs Priority.— 22 (1) In general.—In evaluating applications 23 under conservation programs described in paragraph 24 (2), the Secretary of Agriculture may give priority to 25 an application for a project that would enhance

1	connectivity through the expansion of a Tribal Wild-
2	life Corridor.
3	(2) Programs described.—The conservation
4	programs referred to in paragraph (1) are any of the
5	following conservation programs administered by the
6	Secretary of Agriculture:
7	(A) The conservation reserve program es-
8	tablished under subchapter B of chapter 1 of
9	subtitle D of title XII of the Food Security Act
10	of 1985 (16 U.S.C. 3831 et seq.).
11	(B) The environmental quality incentives
12	program established under subchapter A of
13	chapter 4 of subtitle D of title XII of the Food
14	Security Act of 1985 (16 U.S.C. 3839aa et
15	seq.).
16	(C) The conservation stewardship program
17	established under subchapter B of chapter 4 of
18	subtitle D of title XII of the Food Security Act
19	of 1985 (16 U.S.C. 3839aa–21 et seq.).
20	(D) The agricultural conservation ease-
21	ment program established under subtitle H of
22	title XII of the Food Security Act of 1985 (16
23	U.S.C. 3865 et seq.).
24	(b) Wildlife Movements Grant Program.—

- 1 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall establish
 2 a Tribal Wildlife Corridor grant program to encour3 age wildlife movement in accordance with this Act.
 4 (2) GRANTS.—Beginning not later than 3 years
- after the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary shall make grants under the program established under paragraph (1) to one or more Indian tribes to increase connectivity through Tribal Wildlife Corridors.

10 SEC. 7. SAVINGS CLAUSE.

- Nothing in this Act authorizes or affects the use of
- 12 private property or Indian land.

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
