Mr. CASTRO of Texas introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Foreign Affairs

A BILL

- To expedite and expand provision of American Citizen Services worldwide during the COVID-19 pandemic, and for other purposes.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Expanding Vital Amer-
- 5 ican Citizen Services Overseas (EVACS) Act of 2020".

6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

- 7 Congress finds the following:
- 8 (1) There is an unprecedented need for Amer-9 ican Citizen Services from the Department of State

and its posts globally during the COVID-19 pan demic.

3 (2) Consistent intake of new Foreign Service
4 Officers and Foreign Service Specialists is integral
5 to protecting Americans worldwide.

6 (3) American Citizen Services include, among 7 other services, emergency passports, consular reports 8 of birth abroad, virtual or in-person welfare visits of 9 United States citizens who are imprisoned or hos-10 pitalized, emergency financial assistance, and repa-11 triation of United States citizens, as well as repatri-12 ation of remains when deaths occur abroad.

(4) Consular systems worldwide, as well as previously established crisis management task force procedures, are unable to handle the remote workload
and requirements for social distancing simultaneously.

18 (5) The Department of State has increased
19 need for personal protective equipment for its staff
20 worldwide as they fulfill the mission to provide
21 American Citizen Services and perform other essen22 tial diplomatic duties.

(6) Current United States laws and regulations
are not adequate to meet worldwide needs such as
the sudden demand for evacuation of United States

citizens, combined with reduced or nonexistent pri vate airline capacity, and the reduced staffing capa bilities and remote processing of American Citizen
 Services requests.

5 SEC. 3. SENSE OF CONGRESS.

6 The Secretary of State should take steps to ensure
7 the expedited and expanded provision of American Citizen
8 Services from the Department of State during the
9 COVID-19 pandemic and future global emergencies.

10 SEC. 4. DEFINITIONS.

11 In this Act:

(1) ACS; AMERICAN CITIZEN SERVICES.—The
terms "ACS" and "American Citizen Services" refer
to the range of services provided to United States
nationals by the Bureau of Consular Affairs of the
Department of State, and at the Department's overseas posts.

18 (2) APPROPRIATE CONGRESSIONAL COMMIT19 TEES.—The term "appropriate congressional com20 mittees" means—

21 (A) the Committee on Foreign Relations of22 the Senate; and

23 (B) the Committee on Foreign Affairs of24 the House of Representatives.

(3) COVERED INDIVIDUAL.—The term "covered 1 2 individual" means a United States citizen, United 3 States national, lawful permanent resident, or the 4 immediate family members of a United States cit-5 izen, a United States national, or a lawful perma-6 nent resident. 7 (4) Declared Covid–19 Pandemic Period.— 8 The term "declared COVID-19 pandemic period" 9 means the period of the national emergency declared 10 by the President under the National Emergencies 11 Act (50 U.S.C. 1601 et seq.) with respect to the 12 Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID–19). 13 SEC. 5. ASSISTANCE FOR COVERED INDIVIDUALS OVER-14 SEAS. 15 (a) PETITIONING FOR INTRACOUNTRY TRAVEL FOR UNITED STATES PERSONS IN CERTAIN COUNTRIES.— 16 The Secretary of State shall petition the government of 17 any country that closes borders and airspace or places 18 travel restrictions due to COVID-19 to make provisions 19 with the United States embassy, consulate, or other diplo-20 21 matic mission responsible for consular services in that 22 country to assure covered individuals can travel 23 intracountry to United States Government evacuation 24 points or to access commercial travel when possible.

1 (b) WAIVER OR REIMBURSEMENT OF TRAVEL EX-2 PENSES.—

3 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of State shall 4 waive any travel expenses paid by the Department of 5 State on or after December 31, 2019, for any cov-6 ered individual who is evacuated from a foreign 7 country and repatriated to the United States due to 8 travel restrictions implemented in response to 9 COVID–19 or any future pandemic or international 10 crisis, as determined by the Secretary.

(2) PROMISSORY NOTES.—Any promissory note
signed by a covered individual to reimburse the Department of State for travel expenses described in
paragraph (1) shall be null and void.

(3) CONFORMING AMENDMENT.—Section 4 of
the State Department Basic Authorities Act of 1956
(22 U.S.C. 2671) is amended by adding at the end
the following new subsection:

"(e) EXCEPTION FROM REIMBURSEMENT REQUIREMENT FOR CERTAIN COMMUNICABLE DISEASE-RELATED
EXPENSES.—In the case of a communicable disease for
which the Federal Government has issued a travel alert
or travel warning, the reimbursement requirements under
subsections (b)(2)(A)(ii) and (d) shall not apply.".

25 (4) REIMBURSEMENT.—

(A) AUTHORIZATION.—The Secretary of 1 2 State shall reimburse covered individuals who 3 were evacuated from a foreign country on or 4 after December 31, 2019, and repatriated to the United States due to travel restrictions de-5 6 scribed in paragraph (1) for travel expenses as-7 sociated with such evacuation and repatriation, 8 including the costs of commercial or charter 9 flights and any ground transportation expenses 10 associated with travel to the foreign airport and 11 from the domestic airport to their homes in the 12 United States.

13 (B) PROCESS.—The Secretary of State
14 shall develop an online process through which
15 United States citizens may submit claims for
16 reimbursement for travel expenses described in
17 subparagraph (A).

(c) FUNDING.—The Secretary of State may use
amounts appropriated or otherwise made available to the
Department of State in any appropriations Act for paying
expenses related to overseas evacuations to pay for the
travel expenses described in subsection (b)(1).

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1SEC. 6. CONSULAR AFFAIRS, TASK FORCES, AND REGULA-2TIONS.

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3 The Secretary of State shall direct the Assistant Sec4 retary of State for Consular Affairs to immediately—

5 (1) provide United States embassies, consulates,
6 and other diplomatic missions worldwide with ex7 plicit guidance to protect covered individuals and use
8 innovative means to empower officers, specialists,
9 and Locally Employed Staff employees to protect
10 American lives during and immediately after the de11 clared COVID-19 pandemic period;

(2) increase the staffing of Consular Affairs
Task Force 2 in Washington, DC to ensure adequate consular response and improved guidance
from Washington, DC to embassies, consulates, and
missions overseas, including—

(A) augmentation of the Overseas Consular Services (OCS) call center and activation
of the National Passport Information Center
(NPIC) and the National Visa Center (NVC) to
immediately provide improved consular responses; and

23 (B) direct public access to Task Force 2
24 through the OCS call center; and

(3) notify Congress of any additional monetary
 or technical resources needed to carry out the ac tions described in this subsection.

4 SEC. 7. PROTECTING RESPONDERS.

5 Not later than 15 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of State shall submit to 6 7 the appropriate congressional committees a report with a 8 comprehensive plan for COVID–19 infection risk mitiga-9 tion procedures for all persons under chief of mission au-10 thority at overseas posts, including an assessment of availability and adequacy of personal protective equipment at 11 United States embassies, consulates, and other diplomatic 12 missions. 13

14 SEC. 8. PROGRESS REPORTS; YEARLY REMOTE ACS DRILLS

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WORLDWIDE.

16 (a) Comprehensive Progress Report.—

17 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 60 days after 18 the date of the enactment of this Act, and semiannu-19 ally until the Global Health Advisory of Level 4: Do 20 Not Travel is rescinded by the Secretary of State, 21 the Secretary shall provide a comprehensive progress 22 report on the Bureau of Consular Affairs response 23 to the COVID-19 pandemic to the appropriate con-24 gressional committees, including issues such as, but 25 not exclusively, assessment of consular system failures due to lack of resources—personnel, technical,
 system design, or capacity—and resources needed to
 improve current and future performance of Amer ican Citizen Services during this and future global
 health crises.

6 (2) FORM.—The report required under para7 graph (1) shall be submitted in unclassified form,
8 but may include a classified annex.

9 (b) ANNUAL WORLDWIDE REMOTE ACS DRILLS.— 10 The Secretary of State shall direct the Assistant Secretary of State for Consular Affairs to direct an annual world-11 wide consular test of remote processing (including a min-12 13 imum 80-percent remote consular telework worldwide) and systems with reporting of outcomes to Congress within 90 14 15 days after each test. The first test shall be held not later than 60 days after the Secretary of State rescinds the 16 Global Health Advisory of Level 4: Do Not Travel. 17

18 SEC. 9. FOREIGN SERVICE HIRING.

(a) SENSE OF CONGRESS.—It is the sense of Con-20 gress that—

(1) there are no legal constraints preventing the
Department of State and the United States Agency
for International Development from virtual
onboarding of new Foreign Service Officers and Foreign Service Specialists;

(2) hiring of Foreign Service Officers (FSO)
 and Foreign Service Specialists (FSS) must con tinue, while taking all necessary steps to ensure per sonnel safety, at the same pace as determined prior
 to the COVID-19 pandemic; and

6 (3) in-processing of classes of FSOs, FSSs, and 7 Department fellows must resume immediately, re-8 motely as necessary, with the goal of achieving 2020 9 hiring targets and exceeding those targets as author-10 ized under sections 7062 and 7063(d)(1) of the De-11 partment of State, Foreign Operations, and Related 12 Programs Appropriations Act, 2020 (division G of Public Law 116–94). 13

(b) DELAYED FOREIGN SERVICE CLASSES.—The
Secretary of State shall make immediate efforts to ensure
individuals scheduled to enter the Foreign Service who
have been affected by delays of the swearing-in and
onboarding process during the COVID-19 pandemic are
given the full opportunity to join the Foreign Service.

(c) REPORT.—Not later than 30 days after the date
of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of State shall
report to Congress how the Department of State will, remotely as necessary, onboard FSO and FSS classes that
were postponed indefinitely during the COVID-19 pan-

demic after many were already issued orders and inbound
 to Washington, DC, or their training locations.

3 (d) EXTENSION OF HIRING REGISTRY TIME LIM4 ITS.—To ensure a robust Foreign Service Officer and For5 eign Service Specialist staffing pipeline during the pan6 demic and more generally, the Secretary of State shall im7 mediately extend hiring registry time limits by the entirety
8 of the declared COVID-19 pandemic period.

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
