Mr. McCaul (for himself, Mr. Engel, Mr. Kinzinger, and Mr. Keating) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Foreign Affairs

A BILL

To provide support to Ukraine to defend its independence, sovereignty, and territorial integrity, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- This Act may be cited as the "U.S.—Ukraine Secu-
- 5 rity Cooperation Enhancement Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 Congress finds the following:
- 8 (1) In fiscal year 2019, the United States pro-
- 9 vided Ukraine with \$423,400,000 in security assist-
- ance under chapter 5 of part II of the Foreign As-

- sistance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2347 et seq.) and section 23 of the Arms Export Control Act (22 U.S.C. 2763).
- 4 (2) Ukraine has been a longstanding NATO-as-5 pirant country and the United States has consist-6 ently welcomed Ukraine's NATO aspirations, re-7 affirmed by the 2008 Bucharest Declaration.
- 8 (3) Ukraine has contributed substantially to
 9 Euro-Atlantic peace and security through participa10 tion in missions for the Resolute Support Mission in
 11 Afghanistan and with the multinational NATO
 12 forces in Kosovo.

13 SEC. 3. SENSE OF CONGRESS.

- 14 It is the sense of Congress that United States assist-15 ance to Ukraine under chapter 5 of part II of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 and the Arms Export Control Act 16 17 should be increased to provide opportunities to establish 18 and build long-term bilateral defense relationships and to 19 achieve important goals, including the effective use, security, and storage of United States-origin defense articles. 20 21 SEC. 4. STATEMENT OF POLICY.
- 22 It shall be the policy of the United States to—
- 23 (1) support Ukraine's sovereignty, independ-24 ence, and territorial integrity within its internation-25 ally recognized borders;

- 1 (2) support the right of the people of Ukraine
 2 to freely determine their future and make inde3 pendent, sovereign choices on foreign and security
 4 policy, including with respect to their country's rela5 tionship with other nations and international organi6 zations, without interference, intimidation, or coer7 cion by other countries;
 - (3) support Ukraine's right to defend itself against Russian aggression through the delivery of United States security assistance;
 - (4) support Ukraine's Euro-Atlantic and European integration;
 - (5) reject any territorial changes effected by force, including the illegal invasions and occupations of Crimea and the Donbass by the Russian Federation and Russian-backed separatists;
 - (6) condemn the ongoing detentions of the 24 Ukrainian sailors taken during the November 25, 2018, attack by Russia in the Kerch Strait;
 - (7) urge Russia to fully implement the Minsk II process of February 11, 2015, support the establishment of international security mechanisms in the Donbass, and ensure the safe and dignified return of internally displaced persons and refugees, all of

- which are important for lasting peace and security on the ground;
- 3 (8) support continued development of demo-4 cratic values in Ukraine, including strengthening 5 rule of law, public sector transparency and account-6 ability, as well as anticorruption efforts; and
- 7 (9) in consultation with the Government of 8 Ukraine, enhance Ukraine's deterrence, resilience, 9 and self-defense, including through appropriate arms transfers and sales of lethal defense articles for 10 11 Ukraine's armed forces, well as as improve 12 Ukraine's ability to respond to Russian-supported 13 cyber attacks, so that it can defend against threats 14 to its people, territorial integrity, or national secu-15 rity.

16 SEC. 5. MAJOR NON-NATO ALLY STATUS FOR UKRAINE.

During the period beginning on the date of the enactment of this Act and ending on the date on which Ukraine
accedes to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization as referenced in the 2008 Bucharest Summit Declaration, the
President may determine that, for purposes of the transfer
or possible transfer of defense articles or defense services
under the Arms Export Control Act (22 U.S.C. 2751 et
seq.), the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2151
et seq.), or any other provision of law, Ukraine shall be

- treated as a major non-NATO ally, as defined in section 644(q) of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 3 2403 (q)). SEC. 6. MODIFICATION TO AUTHORITY TO PROVIDE SECU-5 RITY ASSISTANCE TO UKRAINE. 6 Section 1250(b)(2) of the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2016 (Public Law 114–92; 129 8 Stat. 1086) is amended— (1) by striking "and small arms" and inserting 9 "small arms"; and 10 11 (2) by striking the period at the end and inserting the following: ", anti-tank weapons systems, 12 anti-ship weapons systems, and anti-aircraft weap-13 14 ons systems.". 15 SEC. 7. REPORT RELATING TO SECURITY ASSISTANCE FOR 16 UKRAINE. 17 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days after the 18 date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of State, in consultation with the heads of other appropriate United 19 20 States departments and agencies, shall submit to Congress
- 22 Government of Ukraine that includes each of the fol-23 lowing:

a report reviewing United States security assistance to the

24 (1) A detailed review of all United States secu-25 rity assistance programs to the Government of

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- 1 Ukraine, from fiscal year 2014 to the date of the 2 submission of the report.
 - (2) An assessment of threats to Ukrainian independence, sovereignty, and territorial integrity.
 - (3) An assessment of Ukraine's needs for lethal defense articles for offensive and defensive needs.
 - (4) An assessment of Ukraine's asymmetric capabilities to counter Russian hybrid warfare and aggression.
- 10 (5) An assessment of the international military 11 education and training programs offered to Ukraine 12 by the United States and options for increasing 13 these programs.
- 14 (b) FORM.—The report required by subsection (a)
 15 shall be submitted in unclassified form but may contain
 16 a classified annex.

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
