A BILL

To prohibit States from imposing a tax on the retail sale of menstrual products.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Stop Taxes Against
5 Menstrual Products Act of 2024” or the “STAMP Act
6 of 2024”.

1 **SEC. 2. PROHIBITION.**

2 It shall be unlawful for a State, or unit of local gov-
3 ernment of a State, to impose a tax on the retail sale of
4 a menstrual product.

5 **SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.**

6 For purposes of this Act:

7 (1) **MENSTRUAL PRODUCT.**—The term “men-
8 strual product” means a sanitary napkin, or tam-
9 pon, menstrual cups, menstrual discs, period under-
10 wear, and that conforms to industry standards.

11 (2) **STATE.**—The term “State” means any of
12 the several States or the District of Columbia.

13 **SEC. 4. EFFECTIVE DATE.**

14 This Act shall take effect 120 days after the date of
15 the enactment of this Act.
