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1 A JOINT RESOLUTION directing the Cabinet for Health and Family Services to

- 2 implement an in-home-drug disposal pilot program.
- 3 Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:
- 4 → Section 1. (1) As used in this section:
- 5 (a) "Eligible patient" means an individual receiving a prescription for a Schedule
- 6 II controlled substance, including patients:
- 7 1. Who are at risk of experiencing an opioid-related overdose;
- 8 2. With an initial Schedule II controlled substance prescription;
- 9 3. With an acute Schedule II controlled substance prescription for a short-term
- 10 illness or condition; or
- 11 4. Who have received a change in dosage of an acute or chronic Schedule II
- 12 prescription;
- 13 (b) "In-home drug disposal system" means a site-of-use drug disposal system
- 14 that:
- 15 1. Changes the physical integrity of the formulation of the drug; and
- 16 2. Renders the active ingredients of a drug unusable for all practical purposes so
- 17 that it:
- a. Is nontoxic and nonhazardous;
- b. Poses no threat to the consumer;
- c. Reduces drug exposure to the environment; and
- d. Acts as a deterrent for misuse of the drug or drug formulation; and
- 22 (c) "Medication safety information" means any data tailored to meet the needs of
- 23 the patient population that is stored, processed, transmitted, or shared in person or in an
- 24 electronic format, including email, text message, image files, document files, or program
- 25 files, that includes but is not limited to:
- 26 1. In-home disposal of prescription drug medications;
- 27 2. Medication storage; and

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3. In-home risks associated with keeping unused, unwanted, expired, or off
therapy drugs or prescription medications in the home.

- 3 (2) The Cabinet for Health and Family Services shall:
- 4 (a) In consultation with the Board of Pharmacy, implement a pilot program to
- 5 study the effectiveness of in-home prescription drug disposal in Kentucky. The pilot
- 6 program shall:
- 7 1. Operate from January 1, 2026, to November 1, 2027;
- 8 2. Track the number of in-home drug disposal systems distributed by
- 9 participating pharmacies; and
- 10 3. Monitor local health data for a reduction in opioid-related overdoses and
- 11 deaths;
- 12 (b) Submit a report by December 1, 2027, to the Legislative Research
- 13 Commission for referral to the Interim Joint Committee on Health Services, which:
- 1. Lists the number of pharmacy locations participating in the pilot program;
- Describes the activities undertaken by the cabinet to supply eligible patients
- 16 with:
- a. In-home drug disposal systems; and
- b. Medication safety information;
- 19 3. Surveys pharmacies to collect demographic information on:
- 20 a. Participating eligible patients;
- b. Types of medication prescribed; and
- c. The effective use of in-home drug disposal systems; and
- 23 4. Contains performance measures relating to the effectiveness of the program,
- 24 including but not limited to:
- 25 a. Changes in the participation rate of eligible patients; and
- b. Engagement with pharmacists; and
- 27 (c) Develop a plan for cooperation between the cabinet and the Board of

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- 1 Pharmacy to:
- 2 1. Outline an effective implementation strategy;
- 3 2. Establish a pharmacy reimbursement of \$4.88 per distribution of medication
- 4 safety information and an in-home drug disposal system to eligible patients; and
- 5 3. If necessary, summarize any specialized outside training and assistance
- 6 needed to facilitate the pilot program.
- 7 (3) This section shall not be construed to preclude pharmacists who are not
- 8 participating in the pilot program from dispensing or distributing:
- 9 (a) Controlled substances;
- 10 (b) In-home drug disposal systems; or
- 11 (c) Medication safety information to patients in accordance with KRS 218A.170.
