CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

Establishing a Joint Committee on the Organization of
Congress.

1 *Resolved by the House of Representatives (the Senate*
2 *concurring),*

3 **SECTION 1. ESTABLISHMENT OF COMMITTEE.**

4 (a) ESTABLISHMENT AND MEMBERSHIP.—There is
5 established an ad hoc Joint Committee on the Organiza-

1 tion of the Congress (referred to as the “Committee”) to
2 be composed of—

3 (1) 12 members of the Senate—

4 (A) 6 to be appointed by the majority lead-
5 er; and

6 (B) 6 to be appointed by the minority lead-
7 er; and

8 (2) 12 members of the House of Representa-
9 tives—

10 (A) 6 to be appointed by the Speaker; and

11 (B) 6 to be appointed by the minority lead-
12 er.

13 (b) EX OFFICIO MEMBERS.—The majority leader
14 and the minority leader of the Senate and the majority
15 leader and the minority leader of the House of Represent-
16 atives shall be ex officio, voting members of the Com-
17 mittee, but shall not be counted for the purpose of
18 ascertaining the presence of a quorum of the Committee.

19 (c) ORGANIZATION OF COMMITTEE.—(1) A chairman
20 from each House shall be designated from among the
21 members of the Committee by the majority leader of the
22 Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

23 (2) A vice chairman from each House shall be des-
24 ignated from among the members of the Committee by

1 the minority leader of the Senate and the minority leader
2 of the House of Representatives.

3 (3) The Committee may establish subcommittees
4 comprised of only members from one House, who may con-
5 sider only matters related solely to that House.

6 (4)(A) No recommendation shall be made by the
7 Committee except upon a majority vote of the members
8 representing each House, respectively.

9 (B) Notwithstanding subparagraph (A), any rec-
10 ommendation with respect to the rules and procedures of
11 one House which only affects matters related solely to that
12 House may only be made and voted on by the members
13 of the committee from that House, and upon its adoption
14 by a majority of such members shall be considered to have
15 been adopted by the full Committee as a recommendation
16 of the Committee. Once such recommendation is adopted,
17 the full Committee may vote to make an interim or final
18 report containing any such recommendation.

19 **SEC. 2. STUDY OF ORGANIZATION AND OPERATION OF THE**
20 **CONGRESS.**

21 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Committee shall make a full
22 and complete study of the organization, operations, func-
23 tions, and relevant interactions of the Members of Con-
24 gress and make recommendations that serve the following
25 objectives:

1 (1) Making the operations and the organization
2 of the Congress more effective and more efficient.

3 (2) Making the Congress and its members more
4 accountable to the citizens they serve.

5 (3) Improving the relationships between the
6 Houses of Congress.

7 (4) Improving the relationships between and
8 among other branches of the Government, particu-
9 larly relative to the congressional oversight of those
10 branches.

11 (5) Improving the orderly, timely, and effective
12 consideration and disposal of legislation.

13 (6) Improving the relationships among both
14 elected Members of the Congress and the staff of
15 those Members, particularly relating to relationships
16 between the minority and majority Members.

17 (7) Improving the relationship between mem-
18 bers and the citizens they serve, especially in the op-
19 portunities citizens have to participate in the process
20 of governing.

21 (b) ADDITIONAL MATTER TO BE STUDIED.—The
22 Committee shall also include in its study the role of the
23 standing, select, and special committees and their effec-
24 tiveness in addressing legislative responsibilities, particu-
25 larly those involving the authorization of Federal pro-

1 grams and agencies and the future fiscal impact of entitle-
2 ment programs.

3 **SEC. 3. AUTHORITY AND EMPLOYMENT AND COMPENSA-**
4 **TION OF STAFF.**

5 (a) **AUTHORITY OF COMMITTEE.**—The Committee or
6 any of its subcommittees may—

7 (1) sit and act at such places and times as the
8 Committee, or any duly authorized subcommittee
9 thereof, determines are appropriate during the ses-
10 sions, recesses, and adjourned periods of Congress;
11 and

12 (2) require the attendance of witnesses and the
13 production of books, papers, and documents, admin-
14 ister oaths, take testimony, and procure printing and
15 binding.

16 (b) **APPOINTMENT AND COMPENSATION OF STAFF.**—

17 (1) The Committee may appoint and fix the compensation
18 of such experts, consultants, technicians, and clerical per-
19 sonnel as it deems necessary, but shall utilize existing staff
20 to the extent possible. Staff shall be compensated and re-
21 imbursed in accordance with current rules, statutes, prac-
22 tices, and procedures under which congressional staff are
23 currently compensated and reimbursed for their official
24 expenses.

1 (2) The Committee may utilize such voluntary and
2 uncompensated services as it deems necessary and may
3 utilize the services, information, facilities, and personnel
4 of other agencies of the legislative branch.

5 (c) WITNESSES.—Witnesses requested to appear be-
6 fore the Committee shall be reimbursed for travel, subsist-
7 ence, and other necessary expenses incurred in traveling
8 to and from Committee proceedings.

9 (d) EXPENSES.—

10 (1) SENATE.—(A) The Senate members of the
11 Committee shall submit a budget of expenses allo-
12 cable to the Senate to the Committee on Rules and
13 Administration of the Senate. The Committee may
14 expend for expenses allocable to the Senate not to
15 exceed \$_____ from the contingent fund of the
16 Senate subject to approval by the Committee on
17 Rules and Administration until a Committee funding
18 resolution is approved by the Senate or, if no fund-
19 ing resolution is approved, until the conclusion of
20 the 115th Congress.

21 (B) The expenses of the Committee allocable to
22 the Senate shall be paid from the contingent fund of
23 the Senate, upon vouchers signed by the Senate
24 chairman.

1 (2) HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.—There shall
2 be paid out of the applicable accounts of the House
3 of Representatives such sums as may be necessary
4 for one-half of the expenses of the Committee. Such
5 payments shall be made on vouchers signed by the
6 chairman or vice chairman of the Committee who is
7 a Member of the House of Representatives, as the
8 case may be, and approved in the manner directed
9 by the Committee on House Administration of the
10 House of Representatives. Amounts made available
11 under this paragraph shall be expended in accord-
12 ance with regulations prescribed by the Committee
13 on House Administration of the House of Represent-
14 atives.

15 **SEC. 4. COMMITTEE REPORT.**

16 The Committee shall report its findings to the House
17 of Representatives and the Senate not later than the con-
18 clusion of each session of Congress during which the Com-
19 mittee is authorized. The report at the conclusion of each
20 session shall include recommendations of the Committee
21 for its continuation or designation of a similar entity to
22 continue the pursuit of improvements in the congressional
23 process.

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
