5	eligibility that the applicant is a child with a disability, as required by G.S. 115C-591(3)c., by
6	having the child assessed by a local education agency and the local education agency determining
7	the child to be a child with a disability with that outcome verified by the local education agency
8	on an eligibility determination form provided to the Authority.

10	(a) Establishment of Initial Eligibility. – In order to receive a scholarship pursuant to
11	G.S. 115C-592(b1), an applicant shall demonstrate that the applicant is a child with a disability
12	by completing an assessment through a local education agency. The local education agency shall
13	determine that the child is a child with a disability and verify this information on an eligibility
14	determination form provided to the Authority.
15	(b) <u>Continuing Eligibility.</u> – After the initial disbursement of <del>funds, funds pursuant to</del>
16	G.S. 115C-592(b1), the Authority shall ensure that the student's continuing eligibility as a child
17	with a disability is assessed at least every three years by one of the following:
18	(1) The local education agency. – The local education agency shall assess if the
19	student continues to be a child with a disability and verify the outcome on a
20	form to be provided to the Authority.
21	(2) A licensed psychologist with a school psychology focus or a psychiatrist. –
22	Except for eligible students whose primary disability is developmental delay,
23	the psychologist or psychiatrist shall assess, after review of appropriate
24	medical and educational records, if the education and related services received
25	by the student in the nonpublic school setting have improved the child's
26	educational performance and if the student would continue to benefit from
27	placement in the nonpublic school setting. The psychologist or psychiatrist
28	shall verify the outcome of the assessment on a form to be provided to the
29	Authority.
