## **Constitutional Amendment – Gaming – Expansion**

3 FOR the purpose of proposing an amendment to the Maryland Constitution to repeal a 4 certain prohibition on the authority of the General Assembly to authorize additional  $\mathbf{5}$ forms or the expansion of commercial gaming; repealing the authority of the General 6 Assembly to authorize, through the use of a certain referendum, additional forms or 7 the expansion of commercial gaming; conforming certain provisions of the Maryland 8 Constitution to changes made by a certain referendum; making a certain conforming 9 change; and submitting this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of 10 Maryland for their adoption or rejection.

33 the vote on the proposed amendment to the Constitution shall be by ballot, and on each 34 ballot there shall be printed the words "For the Constitutional Amendment" and "Against 35 the Constitutional Amendment", as now provided by law. Immediately after the election,

1 all returns shall be made to the Governor of the vote for and against the proposed 2 amendment, as directed by Article XIV of the Maryland Constitution, and further 3 proceedings had in accordance with Article XIV.
