## A BILL

- To examine the extent of the reliance of the United States on foreign producers for personal protective equipment during the COVID-19 pandemic and produce recommendations to secure the supply chain of personal protective equipment.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### **1** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "PPE Supply Chain3 Transparency Act of 2020".

4 SEC. 2. REPORT.

5 (a) DEFINITION.—In this section, the terms "per-6 sonal protective equipment" and "PPE" means protective 7 clothing, helmets, gloves, face shields, goggles, facemasks, 8 and other equipment designed to protect the wearer from 9 injury or the spread of infection or illness, as determined 10 by the Commissioner of Food and Drugs.

(a) PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT DEFINED.—
In this section, the terms "personal protective equipment"
and "PPE" mean any protective equipment required to
prevent the wearer from contracting COVID-19, including
gloves, N-95 respirator masks, gowns, goggles, face shields,
and other equipment required for safety.

17 (b) REPORT.—Not later than 90 days after the date of enactment of this Act, the Administrator of the Federal 18 19 Emergency Management Agency shall, in consultation 20 with the Secretary of Health and Human Services, submit to the Committee on Homeland Security and Govern-21 22 mental Affairs of the Senate and the Committee on Home-23 land Security of the House of Representatives, and make 24 publicly available, a report examining the security and resilience of the supply chain for personal protective equip-25 26 ment during the COVID-19 pandemic.

1 (c) CONTENTS.—The report required under sub-2 section (a) (b) shall—

3 (1) detail the volume and percentage of each
4 type of PPE distributed by, or at the direction of,
5 the Federal Emergency Management Agency for
6 COVID-19 response efforts purchased or otherwise
7 acquired or controlled in the delivery from a pro8 ducer located outside the United States;

9 (2) detail the volume and percentage of each 10 type of PPE distributed by, or at the direction of, 11 the Federal Emergency Management Agency for 12 COVID-19 response efforts purchased or otherwise 13 acquired or controlled in the delivery from a pro-14 ducer located in the United States;

(3) detail the volume and percentage of PPE
imports acquired or controlled by the Federal Emergency Management Agency from a producer located
in the People's Republic of China, which may include any relevant information collected on defective
PPE acquired from Chinese producers;

(4) detail any challenges and obstacles related
to procuring PPE from a producer not located in the
United States during the COVID-19 pandemic, including export controls by foreign nations;

1	(5) forecast domestic demand for PPE on a
2	monthly basis over the 1-year period beginning on
3	the date of enactment of this Act;
4	(6) analyze whether domestic production of
5	each type of PPE is sufficient to meet demand fore-
6	casted under paragraph (5); and
7	(7) include legislative recommendations to se-
8	cure the supply chain of PPE, including rec-
9	ommendations to—
10	(A) improve resiliency in the supply chain
11	of PPE;
12	(B) increase domestic production of PPE;
13	and
14	(C) reduce the reliance of the United
15	States on foreign producers of PPE-;
16	(8) summarize the use of authorities provided
17	under the Defense Production Act of 1950 (50 U.S.C.
18	4501 et seq.) in COVID-19 response efforts as of the
19	date of the report; and
20	(9) report on additional options to use such au-
21	thorities that could be used to increase production of
22	and access to critical medical supplies and equip-
23	ment, including N95 respirator masks and other
24	PPE.
