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8 Section 127 of title 23, United States Code, is9 amended by adding at the end the following:

1 "(v) Vehicles Hauling Perishable Commod-2 ITIES OR PRODUCTS.— 3 "(1) IN GENERAL.—A State may waive the ap-4 plication of any vehicle weight limit established 5 under this section with respect to a covered vehicle 6 hauling a perishable commodity or product. 7 "(2) DEFINITIONS.—In this subsection: "(A) COVERED VEHICLE HAULING A PER-8 9 ISHABLE COMMODITY OR PRODUCT.—The term 10 'covered vehicle hauling a perishable commodity 11 or product' means a vehicle that— 12 "(i) is carrying— 13 "(I) a perishable agricultural 14 commodity (as defined in section 15 1(b)(4) of the Perishable Agricultural Commodities Act, 1930 (7 U.S.C. 16 17 499a(b)(4));18 "(II) concrete in an unhardened 19 state; "(III) live poultry; 20 "(IV) raw or unfinished forest 21 22 products, including logs, pulpwood, 23 biomass, or wood chips; "(V) livestock feed; or 24

2	ities that could be deemed not useful
3	after a specified amount of time in ac-
4	cordance with industry standards and
5	practices, as defined by a State;
6	"(ii) meets the weight tolerances (or
7	weight limits) and vehicle configurations of
8	the State in which the vehicle is operating
9	and, if applicable, point of origin radius
10	distances within the State boundaries in
11	which the vehicle is operating; and
12	"(iii) is equipped with speed-limiting
13	technology that is turned on and set at a
14	speed not greater than the lesser of—
15	"(I) the posted speed limit; or
16	"(II) 65 miles per hour.
17	"(B) Speed-limiting technology.—The
18	term 'speed-limiting technology' means a tech-
19	nology that prevents a commercial motor vehicle
20	from exceeding a preprogramed maximum
21	speed.".

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
