A BILL

To address the importation and proliferation of machinegun conversion devices.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Preventing Illegal
- 5 Weapons Trafficking Act of 2023".
- 6 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.
- 7 In this Act—

1	(1) the term "machinegun" has the meaning
2	given the term in section 5845 of the Internal Rev-
3	enue Code of 1986; and
4	(2) the term "machinegun conversion device"
5	means any part designed and intended solely and ex-
6	clusively, or combination of parts designed and in-
7	tended, for use in converting a weapon into a ma-
8	chinegun.
9	SEC. 3. PREVENTION AND INTERCEPTION STRATEGY.
10	(a) Strategy.—
11	(1) In general.—Not later than 120 days
12	after the date of enactment of this Act, the Attorney
13	General, the Secretary of Homeland Security, and
14	the Secretary of the Treasury shall develop and im-
15	plement a strategy to prevent or intercept the impor-
16	tation or trafficking of machinegun conversion de-
17	vices.
18	(2) Contents.—The strategy described in
19	paragraph (1) shall include plans to optimize—
20	(A) the capacity of Federal law enforce-
21	ment agencies to detect, intercept, and seize
22	machinegun conversion devices;
23	(B) the coordination between State and
24	local law enforcement agencies and Federal law

enforcement agencies, including the Bureau of

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- Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Homeland Security Investigations, and U.S. Customs and Border Protection, when machinegun conversion devices are seized at ports of entry;
 - (C) efforts by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives to collaborate with State and local law enforcement agencies to identify and trace machinegun conversion devices used in crimes, including identifying the source of the device, whether from a foreign country or the United States;
 - (D) training programs provided by Federal law enforcement agencies to aid State and local law enforcement agencies in identifying machinegun conversion devices;
 - (E) the investigation and collection of data regarding the origins of machinegun conversion devices that are seized at ports of entry or recovered by law enforcement agencies in the United States in order to identify patterns and detect vulnerabilities; and
 - (F) the capacity of Federal law enforcement agencies, including the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, the Federal

1	Bureau of Investigation, and Homeland Secu-
2	rity Investigations, to detect, intercept, and
3	seize domestically produced machinegun conver-
4	sion devices, including machinegun conversion
5	devices produced using 3D printing technology.
6	(b) Reports.—
7	(1) Initial report.—Not later than 120 days
8	after the date of enactment of this Act, the Attorney
9	General, the Secretary of Homeland Security, and
10	the Secretary of the Treasury shall submit a report
11	on the strategy developed and implemented under
12	subsection (a), which shall include relevant statis-
13	tical information, to—
14	(A) the Committee on the Judiciary of the
15	Senate;
16	(B) the Committee on Homeland Security
17	and Governmental Affairs of the Senate;
18	(C) the Committee on the Judiciary of the
19	House of Representatives; and
20	(D) the Committee on Homeland Security
21	of the House of Representatives.
22	(2) Periodic updates.—Not less frequently
23	than once every 2 years, the Attorney General, the
24	Secretary of Homeland Security, and the Secretary
25	of the Treasury shall submit to the congressional

1	committees described in paragraph (1) an update to
2	the report submitted under that paragraph that de-
3	scribes progress made on the implementation of the
4	strategy developed under subsection (a).
5	SEC. 4. FORFEITURE OF PROCEEDS FROM MACHINEGUN
6	VIOLATIONS.
7	Section 5872 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986
8	is amended—
9	(1) in subsection (a), by inserting ", and any
10	proceeds derived from the illegal trafficking of a ma-
11	chinegun," after "provisions of this chapter"; and
12	(2) by adding at the end the following:
13	"(c) Illegal Trafficking of a Machinegun.—
14	For purposes of subsection (a), the term 'illegal trafficking
15	of a machinegun' means the making, manufacture, impor-
16	tation, exportation, or transfer of a machinegun in viola-
17	tion of the provisions of this chapter or any regulations
18	prescribed under this chapter.".
19	SEC. 5. GUN TRAFFICKING REPORT.
20	The Attorney General shall include information about
21	machinegun conversion devices in the annual firearms
22	trafficking report announced by the President on April 7,
23	2021, including—
24	(1) the number of crimes in which machinegun
25	conversion devices are used; and

1 (2) whether the machinegun conversion devices 2 recovered from crimes described in paragraph (1) 3 are manufactured in the United States or a foreign 4 country.

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
