A BILL

To establish a commission to ensure a suitable observance of the centennial of the passage and ratification of the 19th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States providing for women's suffrage, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE; TABLE OF CONTENTS.
- 4 (a) Short Title.—This Act may be cited as the
- 5 "Women's Suffrage Centennial Commission Act".

3 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

- 4 Congress finds the following:
- 5 (1) From 1919 to 1920, the Sixty-Sixth United
- 6 States Congress debated, and State legislatures con-
- 7 sidered, an amendment to the Constitution of the
- 8 United States to provide suffrage for women.
- 9 (2) A proposed women's suffrage amendment
- was first introduced in the United States Senate in
- 11 1878 and was brought to a vote, unsuccessfully, in
- 12 1887, 1914, 1918, and 1919. Finally, on May 21,
- 13 1919, the House of Representatives approved a pro-
- posed amendment, followed by the Senate a few
- weeks later on June 4. Within days, the legislatures
- of Wisconsin, Illinois, and Michigan had voted to
- 17 ratify the amendment.
- 18 (3) On August 18, 1920, Tennessee became the
- 19 36th State to ratify the amendment, providing the
- support of three-fourths of States necessary under
- 21 article V of the Constitution of the United States.

- 1 (4) The introduction, passage, and ultimate 2 ratification of the 19th Amendment to the Constitu-3 tion of the United States were the culmination of 4 decades of work and struggle by advocates for the 5 rights of women across the United States and world-6 wide.
 - (5) Ratification of the 19th Amendment ensured women could more fully participate in their democracy and fundamentally changed the role of women in the civic life of our Nation.
 - (6) The centennial offers an opportunity for people in the United States to learn about and commemorate the efforts of the women's suffrage movement and the role of women in our democracy.
 - (7) Commemorative programs, activities, and sites allow people in the United States to learn about the women's suffrage movement and to commemorate and honor the role of the ratification of the 19th Amendment in further fulfilling the promise of the Constitution of the United States and promoting the core values of our democracy.

22 SEC. 3. ESTABLISHMENT OF WOMEN'S SUFFRAGE CENTEN-

23 NIAL COMMISSION.

24 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established a com-25 mission to be known as the "Women's Suffrage Centennial

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1	Commission" (referred to in this Act as the "Centennial
2	Commission").
3	(b) Membership.—
4	(1) The Centennial Commission shall be com-
5	posed of 14 members, of whom—
6	(A) 2 shall be appointed by the President;
7	(B) 2 shall be appointed by the Speaker of
8	the House of Representatives;
9	(C) 2 shall be appointed by the minority
10	leader of the House of Representatives;
11	(D) 2 shall be appointed by the majority
12	leader of the Senate;
13	(E) 2 shall be appointed by the minority
14	leader of the Senate;
15	(F) 1 shall be the Librarian of Congress,
16	or the designee of the Librarian;
17	(G) 1 shall be the Archivist of the United
18	States, or the designee of the Archivist;
19	(H) 1 shall be the Secretary of the Smith-
20	sonian Institution, or the designee of the Sec-
21	retary; and
22	(I) 1 shall be the Director of the National
23	Park Service, or the designee of the Director.
24	(2) Persons eligible.—

- (A) IN GENERAL.—The members of the Commission shall be individuals who have knowledge or expertise, whether by experience or training, in matters to be studied by the Commission. The members may be from the public or private sector, and may include Fed-eral, State, or local employees, former Members of Congress, members of academia, nonprofit organizations, or industry, or other interested individuals.
 - (B) DIVERSITY.—It is the intent of Congress that persons appointed to the Commission under paragraph (1) be persons who represent diverse economic, professional, and cultural backgrounds.

(3) Consultation and appointment.—

(A) IN GENERAL.—The President, Speaker of the House of Representatives, minority leader of the House of Representatives, majority leader of the Senate, and minority leader of the Senate shall consult among themselves before appointing the members of the Commission in order to achieve, to the maximum extent practicable, fair and equitable representation of var-

1	ious points of view with respect to the matters
2	to be studied by the Commission.
3	(B) Completion of appointments; va-
4	CANCIES.—The President, Speaker of the
5	House of Representatives, minority leader of
6	the House of Representatives, majority leader
7	of the Senate, and minority leader of the Sen-
8	ate shall conduct the consultation under sub-
9	paragraph (A) and make their respective ap-
10	pointments not later than 60 days after the
11	date of enactment of this Act.
12	(4) Vacancies.—A vacancy in the membership
13	of the Commission shall not affect the powers of the
14	Commission and shall be filled in the same manner
15	as the original appointment not later than 30 days
16	after the vacancy occurs.
17	(c) Meetings.—

(1) Initial meeting.—Not later than 30 days after the date on which all members of the Centennial Commission have been appointed, the Centennial Commission shall hold its first meeting.

(2) Subsequent meetings.—

(A) IN GENERAL.—The Centennial Commission shall meet at the call of the Chair.

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1	(B) Frequency.—The Chair shall call a
2	meeting of the members of the Centennial Com-
3	mission not less frequently than once every 6
4	months.
5	(3) Quorum.—Seven members of the Centen-
6	nial Commission shall constitute a quorum, but a
7	lesser number may hold hearings.
8	(4) CHAIR AND VICE CHAIR.—The Centennia
9	Commission shall select a Chair and Vice Chair from
10	among its members.
11	SEC. 4. DUTIES OF CENTENNIAL COMMISSION.
12	(a) In General.—The duties of the Centennia
13	Commission are as follows:
14	(1) To encourage, plan, develop, and execute
15	programs, projects, and activities to commemorate
16	the centennial of the passage and ratification of the
17	19th Amendment.
18	(2) To encourage private organizations and
19	State and local governments to organize and partici-
20	pate in activities commemorating the centennial or
21	the passage and ratification of the 19th Amendment
22	(3) To facilitate and coordinate activities
23	throughout the United States relating to the center-
24	nial of the passage and ratification of the 19th

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Amendment.

- 1 (4) To serve as a clearinghouse for the collec-2 tion and dissemination of information about events 3 and plans for the centennial of the passage and rati-4 fication of the 19th Amendment.
- 5 (5) To develop recommendations for Congress 6 and the President for commemorating the centennial 7 of the passage and ratification of the 19th Amend-8 ment.
- 9 (b) Consultation.—In conducting its work, the
 10 Centennial Commission shall consult the Historian of the
 11 Senate and the Historian of the House of Representatives
 12 when appropriate.

(c) Reports.—

- 14 (1) PERIODIC REPORT.—Not later than the last
 15 day of the 6-month period beginning on the date of
 16 the enactment of this Act, and not later than the
 17 last day of each 3-month period thereafter, the Cen18 tennial Commission shall submit to Congress and
 19 the President a report on the activities and plans of
 20 the Centennial Commission.
 - (2) Recommendations.—Not later than 2 years after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Centennial Commission shall submit to Congress and the President a report containing specific recommendations for commemorating the centennial of

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- 1 the passage and ratification of the 19th Amendment
- 2 and coordinating related activities.

3 SEC. 5. POWERS OF CENTENNIAL COMMISSION.

- 4 (a) Hearings.—The Centennial Commission may
- 5 hold such hearings, sit and act at such times and places,
- 6 take such testimony, and receive such evidence as the Cen-
- 7 tennial Commission considers appropriate to carry out its
- 8 duties under this Act.
- 9 (b) Powers of Member and Agents.—If author-
- 10 ized by the Centennial Commission, any member or agent
- 11 of the Centennial Commission may take any action which
- 12 the Centennial Commission is authorized to take under
- 13 this Act.
- (c) Information From Federal Agencies.—The
- 15 Centennial Commission shall secure directly from any
- 16 Federal department or agency such information as the
- 17 Centennial Commission considers necessary to carry out
- 18 the provisions of this Act. Upon the request of the Chair
- 19 of the Centennial Commission, the head of such depart-
- 20 ment or agency shall furnish such information to the Cen-
- 21 tennial Commission.
- 22 (d) Administrative Support Services.—Upon
- 23 the request of the Centennial Commission, the Adminis-
- 24 trator of the General Services Administration shall provide
- 25 to the Centennial Commission, on a reimbursable basis,

the administrative support services necessary for the Centennial Commission to carry out its responsibilities under this Act. 3 4 (e) Contract Authority.— (1) In General.—Except as provided in para-5 6 graph (2), the Centennial Commission is author-7 ized— 8 (A) to procure supplies, services, and prop-9 erty; and 10 (B) to make or enter into contracts, leases, 11 or other legal agreements. 12 (2) Limitation.—The Centennial Commission 13 may not enter into any contract, lease, or other legal 14 agreement that extends beyond the date of the ter-15 mination of the Centennial Commission under sec-16 tion 7(a). 17 (f) Postal Services.—The Centennial Commission may use the United States mails in the same manner and 18 under the same conditions as other departments and agen-19 20 cies of the Federal Government. 21 (g) GIFTS, BEQUESTS, AND DEVISES.—The Centennial Commission is authorized to solicit, accept, use, and 23 dispose of gifts, bequests, or devises of money, services,

or property, both real and personal, for the purpose of

1	covering the costs incurred by the Centennial Commission
2	to carry out its duties under this Act.
3	(h) Grants.—The Centennial Commission is author-
4	ized to award grants to States and the District of Colum-
5	bia to support programs and activities related to com-
6	memorating the centennial of the passage and ratification
7	of the 19th Amendment.
8	SEC. 6. CENTENNIAL COMMISSION PERSONNEL MATTERS.
9	(a) Compensation of Members.—Members of the
10	Centennial Commission shall serve without compensation
11	for such service.
12	(b) TRAVEL EXPENSES.—Each member of the Cen-
13	tennial Commission shall be allowed travel expenses, in
14	cluding per diem in lieu of subsistence, in accordance with
15	the applicable provisions of title 5, United States Code
16	(c) Staff.—
17	(1) In General.—The Chair of the Centennia
18	Commission shall, in consultation with the members
19	of the Centennial Commission, appoint an executive
20	director and such other additional personnel as may
21	be necessary to enable the Centennial Commission to
22	perform its duties.
23	(2) Compensation.—
24	(A) In General.—Subject to subpara-
25	graph (B), the Chair of the Centennial Commis-

- sion may fix the compensation of the executive director and any other personnel appointed under paragraph (1).
- 4 (B) LIMITATION.—The Chair of the Cen5 tennial Commission may not fix the compensa6 tion of the executive director or other personnel
 7 appointed under paragraph (1) at a rate that
 8 exceeds the rate payable for level IV of the Ex9 ecutive Schedule under section 5315 of title 5,
 10 United States Code.
- 11 (d) Detail of Government Employees.—Upon 12 request of the Centennial Commission, the head of any 13 Federal department or agency may detail, on a reimburs-14 able basis, any employee of that department or agency to 15 the Centennial Commission to assist it in carrying out its 16 duties under this Act.
- 17 (e) PROCUREMENT OF TEMPORARY AND INTERMIT-18 TENT SERVICES.—The Chair of the Centennial Commis-19 sion may procure temporary and intermittent services 20 under section 3109(b) of title 5, United States Code.
- 21 (f) ACCEPTANCE OF VOLUNTARY SERVICES.—Not-22 withstanding section 1342 of title 31, United States Code, 23 the Centennial Commission may accept and use voluntary 24 and uncompensated services as the Centennial Commis-25 sion deems necessary.

1 SEC. 7. TERMINATION OF CENTENNIAL COMMISSION.

- 2 (a) In General.—The Centennial Commission shall
- 3 terminate on the earlier of—
- 4 (1) the date that is 30 days after the date the
- 5 completion of the activities under this Act honoring
- 6 the centennial observation of the passage and ratifi-
- 7 cation of the 19th Amendment; or
- 8 (2) April 15, 2021.
- 9 (b) Application of Federal Advisory Com-
- 10 MITTEE ACT.—
- 11 (1) In general.—Except as provided in para-
- graph (2), the provisions of the Federal Advisory
- 13 Committee Act (5 U.S.C. App.) shall apply to the
- activities of the Centennial Commission under this
- 15 Act.
- 16 (2) EXCEPTION.—Section 14(a)(2) of such Act
- 17 (5 U.S.C. App.) shall not apply to the Centennial
- 18 Commission.
- 19 SEC. 8. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.
- 20 (a) In General.—There are authorized to be appro-
- 21 priated to carry out this Act such sums as may be nec-
- 22 essary for the period of fiscal years 2017 through 2021.
- 23 (b) Amounts Available.—Amounts appropriated
- 24 in accordance with this section for any fiscal year shall

- 1 remain available until the termination of the Centennial
- 2 Commission.

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
