# FIRST REGULAR SESSION HOUSE BILL NO. 1117

## 99TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY

### AN ACT

To repeal section 589.400, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof one new section relating to the sexual offender registry.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Section 589.400, RSMo, is repealed and one new section enacted in lieu 2 thereof, to be known as section 589.400, to read as follows:

589.400. 1. Sections 589.400 to 589.425 shall apply to:

(1) Any person who, since July 1, 1979, has been or is hereafter convicted of, been found 2 3 guilty of, or pled guilty or nolo contendere to committing, attempting to commit, or conspiring to commit a felony offense of chapter 566, including sexual trafficking of a child and sexual 4 trafficking of a child under the age of twelve, or any offense of chapter 566 where the victim is 5 a minor, unless such person is exempted from registering under subsection 8 of this section; or 6 7 (2) Any person who, since July 1, 1979, has been or is hereafter convicted of, been found guilty of, or pled guilty or nolo contendere to committing, attempting to commit, or conspiring 8 to commit one or more of the following offenses: kidnapping or kidnapping in the first degree 9 10 when the victim was a child and the defendant was not a parent or guardian of the child; abuse 11 of a child under section 568.060 when such abuse is sexual in nature; felonious restraint or kidnapping in the second degree when the victim was a child and the defendant is not a parent 12 or guardian of the child; sexual contact or sexual intercourse with a resident of a nursing home 13 14 or sexual conduct with a nursing facility resident or vulnerable person in the first or second degree; endangering the welfare of a child under section 568.045 when the endangerment is 15 16 sexual in nature; genital mutilation of a female child, under section 568.065; promoting prostitution in the first degree; promoting prostitution in the second degree; promoting 17

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prostitution in the third degree; sexual exploitation of a minor; promoting child pornography in the first degree; promoting child pornography in the second degree; possession of child pornography; furnishing pornographic material to minors; public display of explicit sexual material; coercing acceptance of obscene material; promoting obscenity in the first degree; promoting pornography for minors or obscenity in the second degree; incest; use of a child in a sexual performance; or promoting sexual performance by a child; or

(3) Any person who, since July 1, 1979, has been committed to the department of mentalhealth as a criminal sexual psychopath; or

(4) Any person who, since July 1, 1979, has been found not guilty as a result of mental
disease or defect of any offense listed in subdivision (1) or (2) of this subsection; or

(5) Any juvenile certified as an adult and transferred to a court of general jurisdiction who has been convicted of, found guilty of, or has pleaded guilty or nolo contendere to committing, attempting to commit, or conspiring to commit a felony under chapter 566 which is equal to or more severe than aggravated sexual abuse under 18 U.S.C. Section 2241, which shall include any attempt or conspiracy to commit such offense;

(6) Any juvenile fourteen years of age or older at the time of the offense who has been
adjudicated for an offense which is equal to or more severe than aggravated sexual abuse under
18 U.S.C. Section 2241, which shall include any attempt or conspiracy to commit such offense;

36 (7) Any person who is a resident of this state who has, since July 1, 1979, or is hereafter 37 convicted of, been found guilty of, or pled guilty to or nolo contendere in any other state, or 38 foreign country, or under federal, tribal, or military jurisdiction to committing, attempting to 39 commit, or conspiring to commit an offense which, if committed in this state, would be a 40 violation of chapter 566, or a felony violation of any offense listed in subdivision (2) of this 41 subsection or has been or is required to register in another state or has been or is required to 42 register under tribal, federal, or military law; or

(8) Any person who has been or is required to register in another state or has been or is required to register under tribal, federal, or military law and who works or attends an educational institution, whether public or private in nature, including any secondary school, trade school, professional school, or institution of higher education on a full-time or on a part-time basis or has a temporary residence in Missouri. "Part-time" in this subdivision means for more than seven days in any twelve-month period.

49 2. Any person to whom sections 589.400 to 589.425 apply shall, within three days of 50 conviction, release from incarceration, or placement upon probation, register with the chief law 51 enforcement official of the county or city not within a county in which such person resides unless 52 such person has already registered in that county for the same offense. Any person to whom 53 sections 589.400 to 589.425 apply if not currently registered in their county of residence shall

register with the chief law enforcement official of such county or city not within a county within three days. The chief law enforcement official shall forward a copy of the registration form required by section 589.407 to a city, town, village, or campus law enforcement agency located within the county of the chief law enforcement official, if so requested. Such request may ask the chief law enforcement official to forward copies of all registration forms filed with such official. The chief law enforcement official may forward a copy of such registration form to any city, town, village, or campus law enforcement agency, if so requested.

61 3. The registration requirements of sections 589.400 through 589.425 are lifetime 62 registration requirements unless:

(1) All offenses requiring registration are reversed, vacated or set aside;

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(2) The registrant is pardoned of the offenses requiring registration;

65 (3) The registrant is no longer required to register and his or her name shall be removed 66 from the registry under the provisions of subsection 6 of this section; or

67 (4) The registrant may petition the court for removal or exemption from the registry
68 under subsection 7 [or], 8, or 9 of this section and the court orders the removal or exemption
69 of such person from the registry.

4. For processing an initial sex offender registration the chief law enforcement officer
of the county or city not within a county may charge the offender registering a fee of up to ten
dollars.

5. For processing any change in registration required pursuant to section 589.414 the chief law enforcement official of the county or city not within a county may charge the person changing their registration a fee of five dollars for each change made after the initial registration.

Any person currently on the sexual offender registry for being convicted of, found 77 guilty of, or pleading guilty or nolo contendere to committing, attempting to commit, or 78 conspiring to commit, felonious restraint when the victim was a child and he or she was the 79 parent or guardian of the child, nonsexual child abuse that was committed under section 568.060, 80 or kidnapping when the victim was a child and he or she was the parent or guardian of the child shall be removed from the registry. However, such person shall remain on the sexual offender 81 82 registry for any other offense for which he or she is required to register under sections 589.400 to 589.425. 83

7. Any person currently on the sexual offender registry for having been convicted of, found guilty of, or having pleaded guilty or nolo contendere to committing, attempting to commit, or conspiring to commit promoting prostitution in the second degree, promoting prostitution in the third degree, public display of explicit sexual material, statutory rape in the second degree, and no physical force or threat of physical force was used in the commission of the crime may file a petition in the civil division of the circuit court in the county in which the

Effective August 28, 2009, any person on the sexual offender registry for having been 95 convicted of, found guilty of, or having pled guilty or nolo contendere to an offense included 96 under subsection 1 of this section may file a petition after two years have passed from the date the offender was convicted or found guilty of or pled guilty or nolo contendere to the offense or 97 98 offenses in the civil division of the circuit court in the county in which the offender was 99 convicted or found guilty of or pled guilty or nolo contendere to the offense or offenses for removal of his or her name from the registry if such person was nineteen years of age or younger 100 101 and the victim was thirteen years of age or older at the time of the offense and no physical force 102 or threat of physical force was used in the commission of the offense, unless such person meets 103 the qualifications of this subsection, and such person was eighteen years of age or younger at the 104 time of the offense, and is convicted or found guilty of or pleads guilty or nolo contendere to a 105 violation of section 566.068, 566.090, 566.093, or 566.095 when such offense is a misdemeanor, 106 in which case, such person may immediately file a petition to remove or exempt his or her name 107 from the registry upon his or her conviction or finding or pleading of guilty or nolo contendere to such offense. 108

(1) Any person on the sexual offender registry who is not able to file a petition 110 under subsection 7 or 8 of this section may file a petition under this subsection in the 111 division of the circuit court in the county or city not within a county in which the offense requiring registration was adjudicated, or if such offense was adjudicated outside the state 112 113 of Missouri, in the division of the circuit court in the county or city not within a county in 114 which such person resides, to have his or her name and information removed from the 115 sexual offender registry as long as twenty years have passed since the date of the conviction 116 for such sex offense.

(2) A petition under this subsection shall include the following information:

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(a) The petitioner's:

- a. Full name;
- 120 **b.** Sex;
- 121 c. Race;
- 122 **d.** Date of birth;
- 123 e. Last four digits of the Social Security number;
- 124 **f. Address;**
- 125 g. Place of employment, school, or volunteer status;

- 126 **(b)** The offense that required the petitioner to register;
- 127 (c) The date the petitioner pled to, was convicted of, or was adjudicated for the128 offense;
- 129 (d) The date the petitioner was required to register;
- 130 (e) The date the petitioner actually registered;
- (f) The case number and court, including county, that entered the original orderfor the adjudicated sex offense;
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(g) The petitioner's fingerprints on an applicant fingerprint card;

(h) If the petitioner was pardoned or an offense requiring registration was
 reversed, vacated, or set aside, an authenticated copy of the order;

(i) That the petitioner is currently registered under applicable law and has not been
 adjudicated for failure to register in any jurisdiction and does not have any charges
 pending for failure to register; and

(j) A successfully completed sex offender risk assessment report completed by a
mental health professional on the sex offender mental health providers list approved by the
department of mental health and completed within the six months immediately preceding
the date of the filing of the petition.

143 (3) The court shall deny the petition for removal under this subsection if the court
144 finds that the petitioner is a high risk to reoffend.

(4) Such petition shall name as respondents the Missouri state highway patrol, the
prosecuting or circuit attorney in the county or city not within a county in which the
petition is filed, and the chief law enforcement official in the county or city not within a
county where the petitioner resides.

(5) All proceedings under this subsection shall be governed under the Missouri
supreme court rules of civil procedure. The prosecuting or circuit attorney in the circuit
court in which the petition is filed shall be given an opportunity to present evidence in
opposition to the facts alleged in the petition.

(6) The prosecuting or circuit attorney in the circuit court in which the petition is
filed shall have access to all applicable records concerning the petitioner including, but not
limited to, criminal history records under section 43.530, mental health records, juvenile
records, and records of the department of corrections and probation and parole.

157 (7) If the petition to be removed from the sexual offender registry is granted, the 158 court shall enter an order directing the removal of the petitioner's name and information 159 from the sexual offender registry and from any corresponding state or local law 160 enforcement registry or website.

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**10.** (1) The court may grant such relief under subsection 7 or 8 of this section if such person demonstrates to the court that he or she has complied with the provisions of this section and is not a current or potential threat to public safety. The prosecuting attorney in the circuit court in which the petition is filed must be given notice, by the person seeking removal or

exemption from the registry, of the petition to present evidence in opposition to the requested relief or may otherwise demonstrate the reasons why the petition should be denied. Failure of the person seeking removal or exemption from the registry to notify the prosecuting attorney of the petition shall result in an automatic denial of such person's petition. If the prosecuting attorney is notified of the petition he or she shall make reasonable efforts to notify the victim of the crime for which the person was required to register of the petition and the dates and times of any hearings or other proceedings in connection with that petition.

(2) If the petition is denied, such person shall wait at least twelve months before petitioning the court again. If the court finds that the petitioner is entitled to relief, which removes or exempts such person's name from the registry, a certified copy of the written findings or order shall be forwarded by the court to the chief law enforcement official having jurisdiction over the offender and to the Missouri state highway patrol in order to have such person's name removed or exempted from the registry.

[10] 11. Any nonresident worker or nonresident student shall register for the duration of such person's employment or attendance at any school of higher education and is not entitled to relief under the provisions of subsection [9] 10 of this section. Any registered offender from another state who has a temporary residence in this state and resides more than seven days in a twelve-month period shall register for the duration of such person's temporary residency and is not entitled to the provisions of subsection [9] 10 of this section.

Any person whose name is removed or exempted from the sexual offender 185 registry under subsection 7 or 8 of this section shall no longer be required to fulfill the 186 registration requirements of sections 589.400 to 589.425, unless such person is required to 187 register for committing another offense after being removed from the registry.
