## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

- 1 To amend Title 20 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to education, so as to
- 2 establish the Center for Rural Prosperity and Innovation; to provide for a director; to provide
- 3 for the incorporation of the Centers of Innovation Agribusiness administered by the
- 4 Department of Economic Development; to provide for the incorporation and structure of a
- 5 new Georgia Rural Development Council; to provide for members and duties; to provide for
- 6 conditions related to appropriations; to provide for legislative findings; to amend Article 6
- 7 of Chapter 8 of Title 50 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to the Office of
- 8 Rural Development and State Advisory Committee on Rural Development, so as to repeal
- 9 the Georgia Rural Development Council; to provide for related matters; to repeal conflicting
- 10 laws; and for other purposes.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

SECTION 1.

- 13 The General Assembly finds that:
- 14 (1) Since 2010 the State of Georgia has experienced tremendous job growth, adding more
- than 500,000 new private sector jobs;
- 16 (2) Georgia's economic successes during this period have resulted from a favorable tax
- 17 structure and regulatory environment and aggressive economic development initiatives;
- 18 (3) Georgia has been declared by several industry publications, including Site Selection
- 19 *Magazine*, to be the best state in the nation for business for the previous four years;
- 20 (4) This economic success has not extended into all of Georgia's rural areas to a desired
- 21 level;

- 22 (5) As a result, Georgia's rural areas face with challenges distinct from other regions of this
- 23 state, including loss of population, insufficient health care access, poor infrastructure,
- 24 diminished opportunity for quality education, scarcity of employment opportunities, and
- 25 overall lack of economic growth;

26 (6) A thorough, intensive, and systematic study of the existing issues in Georgia's rural areas

- 27 is necessary and appropriate; and
- 28 (7) The objective of such study should be to identify policies and ideas to enhance economic
- 29 opportunity across the entire state, particularly in rural areas.

30 **SECTION 2.** 

- 31 Title 20 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to education, is amended by
- 32 adding a new chapter to read as follows:
- 33 "<u>CHAPTER 18</u>
- 34 <u>20-18-1.</u>
- 35 (a) There is created at and in connection with the University System of Georgia, the Center
- 36 <u>for Rural Prosperity and Innovation to be physically located within a college or institution</u>
- 37 of the University System of Georgia which awards Bachelor of Science degrees in rural
- 38 <u>community development.</u>
- 39 (b)(1) The director of the Center for Rural Prosperity and Innovation shall be appointed
- 40 by the president of the college or institution in which said center is physically located,
- 41 provided that such appointment shall be subject to approval by a majority vote of the
- 42 Georgia Rural Development Council. The director shall continue to serve in such
- position until his or her resignation or until the appointment of a new director by the
- 44 president of the college or institution in which said center is physically located and such
- 45 appointment is approved by a majority vote of such council.
- 46 (2) Subject to appropriations, the director shall be authorized to employ such personnel
- 47 <u>as are necessary to carry out the provisions of this chapter.</u>
- 48 <u>20-18-2.</u>
- 49 The Center for Rural Prosperity and Innovation shall assume the business and
- 50 <u>responsibilities of the Centers of Innovation Agribusiness administered by the Department</u>
- of Economic Development.
- 52 <u>20-18-3.</u>
- 53 (a) The Center for Rural Prosperity and Innovation shall include a council, to be known
- 54 and designated as the Georgia Rural Development Council, that shall offer guidance to the
- 55 <u>Center for Rural Prosperity and Innovation.</u>
- 56 (b) The Georgia Rural Development Council shall be composed of 12 members who shall
- 57 <u>be appointed as follows:</u>

58 (1) Six members shall be appointed by the Governor who, by majority vote, shall appoint

- one of such members to serve as the chairperson of the council. Each of the six shall be
- selected to represent one of the following areas:
- 61 (A) Leadership management;
- 62 (B) Business development and entrepreneurship;
- 63 (C) Finance and taxes;
- 64 (D) Logistics of rural industries;
- 65 (E) Health care; and
- 66 (F) Education
- 67 (2) Three members who live in different geographic areas of the state from each other
- shall be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
- 69 (3) Three members who live in different geographic areas of the state from each other
- shall be appointed by the President of the Senate.
- 71 (c)(1) Legislative members who are appointed to the council shall serve for two-year
- 72 <u>terms. Nonlegislative members shall serve four-year terms, provided that three of the</u>
- initial six members to be appointed by the Governor shall serve initial terms of two years
- and thereafter such appointments shall be for four-year terms.
- 75 (2) Members may serve consecutive terms without limit.
- 76 (d)(1) The council shall study the conditions, needs, issues, and problems affecting rural
- economic development and shall examine related policy areas as it may deem necessary
- and appropriate, including, but not limited to, population studies, access to health care,
- 79 <u>infrastructure</u>, education, unemployment, and economic growth incentives.
- 80 (2) All departments and agencies of the state shall provide upon request of the council
- 81 <u>services, information, and other support for the council and its work.</u>
- 82 (e) The chairperson shall call all meetings of the council. The council shall meet at least
- 83 once per quarter and each such meeting shall be at a different location within the state,
- 84 particularly in rural areas of this state, for the purpose of interacting with local government
- 85 <u>officials, educational leaders, health care providers, business leaders, civic groups, and all</u>
- 86 other citizens who desire to offer input, so as to enable the council to exercise fully and
- 87 <u>effectively its powers, perform its duties, and accomplish the objectives and purposes of</u>
- 88 this resolution.
- 89 (f)(1) Legislative members of the council shall receive the allowances provided for in
- 90 <u>Code Section 28-1-8 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated.</u>
- 91 (2) Members of the council who are state officials, other than legislative members, or
- 92 <u>state employees shall receive no compensation for their services on the council, but they</u>
- 93 may be reimbursed for expenses incurred by them in the performance of their duties as

members of the council in the same manner as they are reimbursed for expenses in their
 capacities as state officials or employees.

- 96 (3) Citizen members of the council shall receive a daily expense allowance in an amount
- 97 <u>the same as that specified in subsection (b) of Code Section 45-7-21 of the Official Code</u>
- 98 <u>of Georgia Annotated, as well as the mileage or transportation allowance authorized for</u>
- 99 <u>state employees.</u>
- 100 (4) The allowances and expenses authorized by this resolution shall not be received by
- the chairperson for more than fifteen days and any other member of the council for more
- than ten days per year. Funds necessary to carry out the provisions of this Code section
- shall come from appropriated funds; provided, however, that funds for the reimbursement
- of the expenses of state officials, other than legislative members, and state employees
- shall come from funds appropriated to or otherwise available to their respective agencies.
- 106 <u>20-18-4.</u>
- 107 (a) It shall be the duty of the Center for Rural Prosperity and Innovation to provide a
- central information and research hub for rural leadership training and best practices which
- 109 <u>may include:</u>
- (1) Community planning models for proactively identifying value added gaps or
- strengths;
- 112 (2) Industry-specific assistance; and
- (3) Cooperative efforts with nonprofit organizations, religious organizations, and other
- higher education partners.
- (b) The Center for Rural Property and Innovation may establish such satellite offices as
- are necessary to accomplish its mission.
- 117 <u>20-18-5.</u>
- All funds appropriated by the General Assembly for the establishment and operation of the
- 119 <u>Center for Rural Prosperity and Innovation, together with any funds which may be</u>
- appropriated by the United States Congress or apportioned to this state from the United
- States Department of the Treasury for purposes substantially the same as specified in this
- chapter, shall be paid to the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia and then
- forwarded to the Center for Rural Prosperity and Innovation for its work, provided that the
- Board of Regents formally presents to the Governor its acceptance of the conditions of this

In the event that the United States Congress appropriates funds to this state for the conduct of work similar to that which is specified in this chapter, such work of the Center for Rural Prosperity and Innovation shall conform to the requirements imposed as conditions for such federal appropriations and as may be accepted by the General Assembly in order that such scientific, engineering, and industrial research work may be aided and extended by means of such federal appropriations.

134 (a) The Center for Rural Prosperity and Innovation shall annually prepare and submit to

the General Assembly, for review by the House of Representatives' and the Senate's 135

standing committees on agriculture and economic development, a ten-year strategic plan

that outlines the use of the Center for Rural Prosperity and Innovation's resources for the

upcoming fiscal years. 138

139 (b) Said committees may, by majority vote, approve the plan and submit recommendations

140 to the Senate Appropriations Committee and the House Committee on Appropriations for

their consideration in developing the budget." 141

142 **SECTION 3.** 

Article 6 of Chapter 8 of Title 50 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to the 143

144 Office of Rural Development and State Advisory Committee on Rural Development, is

145 amended in Part 2, relating to the Rural Development Council, as follows:

"Part 2 146

50-8-150. 147

(a) There is created the Georgia Rural Development Council. The council shall advise the 148 149 Governor on matters related to rural development and the preparation of a biennial rural 150 economic development plan and any other such matters requested by the Governor. The council shall be composed of elected officials of municipalities, elected officials of 151 152 counties, members of the General Assembly, and other persons knowledgeable about the 153 community and economic development of rural areas appointed by the Governor. In 154 making appointments to the council, the Governor shall ensure that members include 155

representatives from throughout rural Georgia.

156 (b) Members of the council shall serve terms of office of two years and until their

157 successors are appointed by the Governor and qualified.

158	(c) The officers of the council shall consist of the Governor, who shall serve as the
159	chairperson, a vice chairperson, and a secretary. Except for the chairperson, the council
160	shall elect officers at its July meeting or, if there is no July meeting, at the next scheduled
161	meeting. The vice chairperson and secretary shall serve one-year terms until their
162	replacements are selected and qualified.
163	(d) The council shall meet at least twice a year; however, the Governor may call additional
164	special meetings.
165	(e) Membership on the council shall not preclude the member from holding other public
166	office. Each member of the council shall receive the same per diem expense allowance as
167	that received by members of the General Assembly for each day a councilmember is in
168	attendance at a meeting of the council, plus reimbursement for actual transportation costs
169	incurred while traveling by public carrier or the mileage allowance authorized for certain
170	state officials and employees for the use of a personal automobile in connection with such
171	attendance. The above shall be paid in lieu of any other per diem, allowance, or
172	remuneration.
173	(f) The council shall adopt bylaws for the regulation of its affairs and conduct of its
174	business Reserved."

175 **SECTION 4.** 

176 All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
