AN ACT

Making emergency supplemental appropriations to respond to the attacks in Israel for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2024, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 That the following sums are appropriated, out of any
2 money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the
3 fiscal year ending September 30, 2024, and for other pur-
4 poses, namely:

5 TITLE I

6 DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE

7 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE

8 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, DEFENSE-WIDE

9 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

10 For an additional amount for “Operation and Main-
11 tenance, Defense-Wide”, \$4,400,000,000, to remain avail-
12 able until September 30, 2025, to respond to the attacks
13 in Israel: *Provided*, That such amounts may be transferred
14 to accounts under the headings “Operation and Mainte-
15 nance” and “Procurement” for replacement of defense ar-
16 ticles from the stocks of the Department of Defense, and
17 for reimbursement for defense services of the Department
18 of Defense and military education and training, provided
19 to Israel or identified and notified to Congress for provi-
20 sion to Israel: *Provided further*, That funds transferred
21 pursuant to the previous proviso shall be merged with and
22 available for the same purposes and for the same time pe-
23 riod as the appropriations to which the funds are trans-
24 ferred: *Provided further*, That the Secretary of Defense
25 shall notify the congressional defense committees of the

1 details of such transfers not less than 15 days before any
2 such transfer: *Provided further*, That upon a determina-
3 tion that all or part of the funds transferred from this
4 appropriation are not necessary for the purposes provided
5 under this heading, such amounts may be transferred back
6 and merged with this appropriation: *Provided further*,
7 That any transfer authority provided under this heading
8 is in addition to any other transfer authority provided by
9 law: *Provided further*, That such amount is designated by
10 the Congress as an emergency requirement pursuant to
11 section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and
12 Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, as amended.

13 PROCUREMENT

14 PROCUREMENT OF AMMUNITION, ARMY

15 For an additional amount for “Procurement of Am-
16 munition, Army”, \$801,400,000, to remain available until
17 September 30, 2026, to respond to the attacks in Israel:
18 *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress
19 as an emergency requirement pursuant to section
20 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency
21 Deficit Control Act of 1985, as amended.

22 WEAPONS PROCUREMENT, NAVY

23 For an additional amount for “Weapons Procure-
24 ment, Navy”, \$10,000,000, to remain available until Sep-
25 tember 30, 2026, to respond to the attacks in Israel: *Pro-*

1 *vided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress
2 as an emergency requirement pursuant to section
3 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency
4 Deficit Control Act of 1985, as amended.

5 MISSILE PROCUREMENT, AIR FORCE

6 For an additional amount for “Missile Procurement,
7 Air Force”, \$38,600,000, to remain available until Sep-
8 tember 30, 2026, to respond to the attacks in Israel: *Pro-*
9 *vided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress
10 as an emergency requirement pursuant to section
11 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency
12 Deficit Control Act of 1985, as amended.

13 PROCUREMENT, DEFENSE-WIDE

14 For an additional amount for “Procurement, De-
15 fense-Wide”, \$4,000,000,000, to remain available until
16 September 30, 2026, for the Secretary of Defense to pro-
17 vide to the Government of Israel for the procurement of
18 the Iron Dome and David’s Sling defense systems to
19 counter short-range rocket threats: *Provided*, That such
20 funds shall be transferred pursuant to an exchange of let-
21 ters and are in addition to funds provided pursuant to the
22 U.S.-Israel Iron Dome Procurement Agreement, as
23 amended: *Provided further*, That nothing under this head-
24 ing shall be construed to apply to amounts made available
25 in prior appropriations Acts for the procurement of the

1 Iron Dome and David’s Sling defense systems: *Provided*
2 *further*, That such amount is designated by the Congress
3 as an emergency requirement pursuant to section
4 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency
5 Deficit Control Act of 1985, as amended.

6 RESEARCH, DEVELOPMENT, TEST AND
7 EVALUATION

8 RESEARCH, DEVELOPMENT, TEST AND EVALUATION,
9 DEFENSE-WIDE

10 (INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

11 For an additional amount for “Research, Develop-
12 ment, Test and Evaluation, Defense-Wide”,
13 \$1,350,000,000, to remain available until September 30,
14 2025, to respond to the attacks in Israel, of which
15 \$1,200,000,000 shall be for the Secretary of Defense to
16 provide to the Government of Israel for the development
17 of the Iron Beam defense system to counter short-range
18 rocket threats: *Provided*, That such funds shall be trans-
19 ferred pursuant to an exchange of letters: *Provided fur-*
20 *ther*, That nothing in the preceding proviso shall be con-
21 strued to apply to amounts made available in prior appro-
22 priations Acts for the development of the Iron Beam de-
23 fense system: *Provided further*, That such amounts may
24 be transferred to “Procurement, Defense-Wide” for the
25 production of such system: *Provided further*, That the Sec-

1 retary of Defense shall notify the congressional defense
2 committees of the details of such transfers not less than
3 15 days before any such transfer: *Provided further*, That
4 upon a determination that all or part of the funds trans-
5 ferred from this appropriation are not necessary for the
6 purposes provided under this heading, such amounts may
7 be transferred back and merged with this appropriation:
8 *Provided further*, That any transfer authority provided
9 under this heading is in addition to any other transfer au-
10 thority provided by law: *Provided further*, That such
11 amount is designated by the Congress as an emergency
12 requirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the
13 Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of
14 1985, as amended.

15 GENERAL PROVISIONS—THIS TITLE

16 SEC. 101. Section 12001 of the Department of De-
17 fense Appropriations Act, 2005 (Public Law 108–287), as
18 amended by Public Law 115–141, is amended as follows:

19 (1) In paragraph (2) of subsection (a), by strik-
20 ing “armor” and all that follows through the end of
21 the paragraph and inserting “defense articles that
22 are in the inventory of the Department of Defense
23 as of the date of transfer, are intended for use as
24 reserve stocks for Israel, and are located in a stock-
25 pile for Israel as of the date of transfer”;

1 (2) In subsection (b), by striking “at least
2 equal to the fair market value of the items trans-
3 ferred” and inserting “in an amount to be deter-
4 mined by the Secretary of Defense”; and

5 (3) In subsection (c), by striking “30” and in-
6 serting “15”, and by inserting “Appropriations,”
7 after “Committees on” in both places it occurs.

8 SEC. 102. During fiscal year 2024, section 514(b) of
9 the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2321h(b))
10 shall not apply to defense articles to be set aside, ear-
11 marked, reserved, or intended for use as reserve stocks
12 in stockpiles in the State of Israel.

13 SEC. 103. Not later than 30 days after the date of
14 enactment of this Act, and every 30 days thereafter
15 through fiscal year 2025, the Secretary of Defense, in co-
16 ordination with the Secretary of State, shall provide a
17 written report to the Committees on Appropriations,
18 Armed Services, and Foreign Affairs of the House of Rep-
19 resentatives and the Committees on Appropriations,
20 Armed Services, and Foreign Relations of the Senate de-
21 scribing United States security assistance provided to
22 Israel since the October 7, 2023, terrorist attack on Israel,
23 including a comprehensive list of the defense articles and
24 services provided to Israel and the associated authority
25 and funding used to provide such articles and services:

1 *Provided*, That such report shall be submitted in unclassi-
2 fied form, but may be accompanied by a classified annex.

3 SEC. 104. Concurrent with any notification of assist-
4 ance made pursuant to section 506(b)(1) of the Foreign
5 Assistance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2318(b)(1)), the Sec-
6 retary of Defense shall submit a written notification to
7 the congressional defense committees that contains a de-
8 scription of the defense articles and defense services to
9 be furnished, including the quantity, approximate value,
10 and an estimate of the cost to replace such article or an
11 equivalent capability; and a timeline for the delivery of
12 such defense articles and defense services.

14 DEPARTMENT OF STATE AND RELATED

15 AGENCY

16 DEPARTMENT OF STATE

17 ADMINISTRATION OF FOREIGN AFFAIRS

18 DIPLOMATIC PROGRAMS

19 For an additional amount for “Diplomatic Pro-
20 grams”, \$150,000,000, to remain available until Sep-
21 tember 30, 2025, for responding to the attacks in Israel
22 and areas impacted by the attacks in Israel, including for
23 crisis response and relocation support for Mission Israel,
24 of which \$100,000,000 shall be available until expended
25 for Worldwide Security Protection to sustain requirements

1 heading in this Act and prior Acts making appropriations
2 for the Department of State, foreign operations, and re-
3 lated programs for fiscal year 2024, in addition to funds
4 otherwise available for such purposes, may be used by the
5 Department of State for necessary expenses for the gen-
6 eral costs of administering military assistance and sales,
7 including management and oversight of such programs
8 and activities: *Provided further*, That, to the extent that
9 the Government of Israel requests that funds be used for
10 such purposes, grants made available for Israel under this
11 heading shall, as agreed by the United States and Israel,
12 be available for advanced weapons systems, of which up
13 to \$3,500,000,000 may be available for the procurement
14 in Israel of defense articles and defense services: *Provided*
15 *further*, That any congressional notification requirement
16 applicable to funds made available under this heading for
17 Israel may be waived if a determination is made that ex-
18 traordinary circumstances exist that impact the national
19 security of the United States: *Provided further*, That such
20 amount is designated by the Congress as an emergency
21 requirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the
22 Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of
23 1985, as amended.

1 GENERAL PROVISIONS—THIS TITLE

2 SEC. 201. (a) During fiscal year 2024, and subject
3 to subsection (b), section 506(a)(1) of the Foreign Assist-
4 ance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2318(a)(1)) shall be applied
5 by substituting “\$2,500,000,000” for “\$100,000,000”.

6 (b) Subsection (a) shall not take effect unless the
7 Secretary of State determines and reports to the appro-
8 priate congressional committees that the exercise of the
9 authority of such subsection is necessary to respond to the
10 situation in Israel.

11 SEC. 202. Not later than 30 days after the date of
12 enactment of this Act, the Secretary of State shall submit
13 to the Committees on Appropriations a report on the pro-
14 posed uses of funds appropriated by this title to respond
15 to the situation in Israel: *Provided*, That such report shall
16 be updated and submitted to such Committees every 60
17 days thereafter until September 30, 2025, and every 180
18 days thereafter until all funds have been expended, and
19 shall include information detailing how estimates and as-
20 sumptions contained in previous reports have changed, in-
21 cluding obligations and expenditures.

TITLE III

GENERAL PROVISIONS—THIS ACT

SEC. 301. Each amount appropriated or made available by this Act is in addition to amounts otherwise appropriated for the fiscal year involved.

SEC. 302. No part of any appropriation contained in this Act shall remain available for obligation beyond the current fiscal year unless expressly so provided herein.

SEC. 303. Unless otherwise provided for by this Act, the additional amounts appropriated by this Act to appropriations accounts shall be available under the authorities and conditions applicable to such appropriations accounts for fiscal year 2024.

SEC. 304. Each amount designated in this Act by the Congress as an emergency requirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, as amended, shall be available (or rescinded or transferred, if applicable) only if the President subsequently so designates all such amounts and transmits such designations to the Congress.

SEC. 305. Any amount appropriated by this Act, designated by the Congress as an emergency requirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, as amended, and subsequently so designated by the President, and

1 transferred pursuant to transfer authorities provided by
2 this Act shall retain such designation.

3 BUDGETARY OFFSETS

4 SEC. 306. (a) RESCISSION OF CERTAIN BALANCES
5 MADE AVAILABLE TO THE INTERNAL REVENUE SERV-
6 ICE.—Of the unobligated balances of amounts appro-
7 priated or otherwise made available for activities of the
8 Internal Revenue Service by paragraphs (1)(A)(ii),
9 (1)(A)(iii), (1)(B), (2), (3), (4), and (5) of section 10301
10 of Public Law 117–169 (commonly known as the “Infla-
11 tion Reduction Act of 2022”) as of the date of the enact-
12 ment of this Act, \$14,300,000,000 are hereby rescinded.

13 (b) CLASSIFICATION OF BUDGETARY EFFECTS.—
14 Notwithstanding Rule 3 of the Budget Scorekeeping
15 Guidelines set forth in the joint explanatory statement of
16 the committee of conference accompanying Conference Re-
17 port 105–217 and section 250(c)(8) of the Balanced
18 Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, the
19 budgetary effects of this section shall not be estimated—

20 (1) for purposes of section 251 of such act;

21 (2) for purposes of an allocation to the Com-
22 mittee on Appropriations pursuant to section 302(a)
23 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974; and

24 (3) for purposes of paragraph (4)(C) of section
25 3 of the Statutory Pay-As-You-Go Act of 2010 as
26 being included in an appropriation Act.

1 This Act may be cited as the “Israel Security Supple-
2 mental Appropriations Act, 2024”.
