1 AN ACT concerning

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Public Information Act – Motor Vehicle Administration – Warrant for Personal Information and Reporting

4 FOR the purpose of requiring a custodian of records for the Motor Vehicle Administration $\mathbf{5}$ to deny inspection by United States Immigration and Customs Enforcement of the 6 part of a public record that contains personal information unless the custodian is 7 provided with a valid warrant issued by a federal court or a court of this State; 8 requiring the Motor Vehicle Administration to annually report certain information 9 to the General Assembly on a certain date; making conforming changes; and 10 generally relating to the disclosure of Motor Vehicle Administration records under 11 the Public Information Act.

SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

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Article – General Provisions

 $20 \quad 4-320.$

(a) (1) In this section, "telephone solicitation" means the initiation of a
telephone call to an individual or to the residence or business of an individual to encourage
the purchase or rental of or investment in property, goods, or services.

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(2) "Telephone solicitation" does not include a telephone call or message:

6 (b) Except as provided in subsections (c) through (f) of this section, a custodian 7 may not knowingly disclose a public record of the Motor Vehicle Administration containing 8 personal information.

9 (c) A custodian shall disclose personal information when required by federal law.

10 (d) (1) This subsection applies only to the disclosure of personal information 11 for any use in response to a request for an individual motor vehicle record.

12 (2) The custodian may not disclose personal information without written 13 consent from the person in interest.

14 (3) (i) At any time the person in interest may withdraw consent to 15 disclose personal information by notifying the custodian.

16 (ii) The withdrawal by the person in interest of consent to disclose 17 personal information shall take effect as soon as practicable after it is received by the 18 custodian.

19 (e) (1) This subsection applies only to the disclosure of personal information 20 for inclusion in lists of information to be used for surveys, marketing, and solicitations.

21 (2) The custodian may not disclose personal information for surveys, 22 marketing, and solicitations without written consent from the person in interest.

(3) (i) At any time the person in interest may withdraw consent to

(ii) The withdrawal by the person in interest of consent to disclose
personal information shall take effect as soon as practicable after it is received by the
custodian.
