# A BILL

To establish a Federal Task Force to Support Grandparents Raising Grandchildren.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Supporting Grand-
- 5 parents Raising Grandchildren Act".

### SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

2 <del>Cor</del>	<del>igress</del>	<del>finds</del>	the	following	÷
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- (1) More than 80 percent of Americans over the age of 65 are grandparents and more than 2,500,000 grandparents in the United States are the primary caretaker of their grandchildren. Experts report that such numbers are increasing as the opioid epidemic expands.
- (2) Grandparents' lives are enhanced by earing for their grandchildren; the overwhelming majority of grandparents report experiencing significant benefits in serving as their grandchildren's primary earegivers.
- (3) Providing full-time care to their grand-children may increase grandparents' likelihood of experiencing physical illness and mental health problems and decrease their ability to save for retirement.
- (4) Grandparents raising grandchildren may face difficulty enrolling their grandchildren in school, medical care, and Federal assistance services.
- (5) The Older Americans Act of 1965 (42 U.S.C. 3001 et seq.) includes services that support grandfamilies, including the National Family Caregiver Support Program.

2	ordination and information about resources available
3	to support them in their earegiving responsibilities.
4	SEC. 3. FEDERAL TASK FORCE TO SUPPORT GRAND-
5	PARENTS RAISING GRANDCHILDREN.
6	(a) Establishment. There is established a Fed-
7	eral Task Force to Support Grandparents Raising Grand-
8	children (referred to in this section as the "Task Force").
9	(b) Membership.—
10	(1) In General.—The Task Force shall be
11	composed of the following members, or their des-
12	<del>ignee:</del>
13	(A) The Secretary of Health and Human
14	Services.
15	(B) The Attorney General.
16	(C) The Administrator of the Administra-
17	tion for Community Living.
18	(D) The Director of the Centers for Dis-
19	ease Control and Prevention.
20	(E) The Assistant Secretary for Mental
21	Health and Substance Use.
22	(F) The Assistant Secretary for the Ad-
23	ministration for Children and Families.
24	(G) The head of each Federal department,
25	agency, or other governmental entity identified

by the Secretary of Health and Human Services
as having responsibilities, or administering programs, relating to current issues affecting
grandparents or other relatives raising children
in their care.

- (2) LEAD AGENCY.—The Department of Health and Human Services shall be the lead agency for the Task Force.
- (3) REQUIREMENT.—Each member of the Task
  Force shall be an officer or employee of the Federal
  Government.

### 12 (e) <del>Duties.—</del>

### (1) In General.—

(A) Information.—The Task Force shall identify, promote, coordinate, and disseminate information publicly about Federal information, resources, and best practices available, on the date of the determination, to help grandparents or other relatives raising children in their care meet the health, educational, nutritional, and other needs of the children in their care as well as maintain their own physical and mental health and emotional well-being, including those raising children in their care as a result of the opioid epidemic.

1	(B) NATIVE AMERICANS.—In carrying out
2	the duties described in subparagraph (A), the
3	Task Force shall ensure that the needs of mem-
4	bers of Native American tribes are addressed.
5	(2) Report.—
6	(A) In General. Not later than 180
7	days after the date of enactment of this Act,
8	the Task Force shall submit a report to the
9	Special Committee on Aging and the Committee
10	on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions of
11	the Senate that includes—
12	(i) best practices, resources, and other
13	useful information for grandparents and
14	other relatives raising children in their
15	eare; and
16	(ii) an identification of the gaps in
17	needs of grandparents and other relatives
18	raising children in their care.
19	(B) FOLLOW-UP REPORT.—Not later than
20	the date that is 2 years after the date the re-
21	port under subparagraph (A) is submitted, the
22	Task Force shall submit a follow-up report to
23	the Special Committee on Aging and the Com-
24	mittee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pen-

- 3 (3) Process for public input.—The Task
- 4 Force shall establish a process for public input to in-
- 5 form the development of, and updates to, the best

- 9 ommendations to the Task Force and an opportunity
- 10 for public comment.
- 11 (d) Sunser.—The Task Force shall terminate on the
- 12 date that is 5 years after the date of enactment of this
- 13 Act.
- 14 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 15 This Act may be cited as the "Supporting Grand-

- 17 SEC. 2. FEDERAL TASK FORCE TO SUPPORT GRAND-
- 18 PARENTS RAISING GRANDCHILDREN.
- 19 (a) Establishment.—There is established a Federal
- 20 Task Force to Support Grandparents Raising Grand-
- 21 children (referred to in this section as the "Task Force").
- 22 (b) OLDER RELATIVE CAREGIVER.—In this section,
- 23 the term "older relative caregiver" has the meaning given
- 24 the term under section 372(a)(3) of the National Family
- 25 Caregiver Support (42 U.S.C. 3030s(a)(3)).

1	(c) Membership.—
2	(1) In general.—The Task Force shall be com-
3	posed of the following members, or their designee:
4	(A) The Secretary of Health and Human
5	Services.
6	(B) The Attorney General.
7	(C) The Administrator of the Administra-
8	tion for Community Living.
9	(D) The Director of the Centers for Disease
10	Control and Prevention.
11	(E) The Assistant Secretary for Mental
12	Health and Substance Use.
13	(F) The Assistant Secretary for the Admin-
14	istration for Children and Families.
15	(G) The Director of the Indian Health Serv-
16	ice.
17	(H) The Administrator of the Centers for
18	Medicare & Medicaid Services.
19	(I) The head of each Federal department,
20	agency, or other governmental entity identified
21	by the Secretary of Health and Human Services
22	as having responsibilities, or administering pro-
23	grams, relating to the current health, edu-
24	cational, nutritional, and other needs and cur-
25	rent issues affecting older relative caregivers, in-

1	cluding grandparents, raising children in their
2	care.
3	(I) A grandparent raising a grandchild on
4	grandchildren as well as another older relative
5	caregiver of children.
6	(2) Lead agency.—The Department of Health
7	and Human Services shall be the lead agency for the
8	Task Force.
9	(d) Duties.—
10	(1) In general.—
11	(A) Information.—The Task Force shall
12	identify, coordinate, and disseminate informa
13	tion publicly about Federal information, re-
14	sources, and best practices available, on the date
15	of the determination, to help older relative care
16	givers, including grandparents, raising children
17	in their care, including those raising children in
18	their care as a result of the opioid crisis, meet
19	the health, educational, nutritional, and other
20	needs of the children in their care as well as
21	maintain their own physical and mental health
22	and emotional well-being.
23	(B) Native americans.—In carrying ow
24	the duties described in subparagraph (A), the

Task Force shall ensure that the needs of Native

4	(2) Report.—
5	(A) In general.—Not later than 360 days
6	after the date of enactment of this Act, the Task
7	Force shall submit a report to the Special Com-
8	mittee on Aging, the Committee on Health, Edu-
9	cation, Labor, and Pensions, and the Committee
10	on Finance of the Senate and the Committee on
11	Education and the Workforce, the Committee on
12	Energy and Commerce, and the Committee on
13	Ways and Means of the House of Representatives
14	that includes—
15	(i) best practices, resources, and other
16	useful information for older relative care-
17	givers, including grandparents, raising chil-
18	dren in their care; and
19	(ii) an identification of the gaps in
20	needs of older relative caregivers, including
21	grandparents, raising children in their care.
22	(B) Final report.—Not later than 4 years
23	after the date of enactment of this Act, the Task
24	Force shall submit a final report to the Special
25	Committee on Aging, the Committee on Health,

1 Education, Labor, and Pensions, and the Com-2 mittee on Finance of the Senate and the Committee on Education and the Workforce, the 3 4 Committee on Energy and Commerce, and the 5 Committee on Ways and Means of the House of 6 Representatives that includes the final findings 7 of the Task Force, recommendations for future 8 actions to address issues faced by older relative 9 caregivers, including grandparents, raising chil-10 dren in their care, and any other useful informa-11 tion.

- (3) PROCESS FOR PUBLIC INPUT.—The Task

  Force shall establish a process for public input to inform the identification of, and updates to, the best
  practices, resources, and other useful information and
  the gaps in needs described in paragraph (2), including a process for the public to submit recommendations to the Task Force and an opportunity for public
  comment.
- 20 (e) SUNSET.—The Task Force shall terminate on the 21 date that is 5 years after the date of enactment of this Act.
- 22 (f) Nonapplicability of FACA.—The Federal Advi-23 sory Committee Act (5 U.S.C. App.) shall not apply to the

24 Task Force.

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- 1 (g) Funding.—No additional funds are authorized to
- 2 be appropriated to carry out this section. The Task Force
- 3 shall be carried out with funds otherwise appropriated.

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
