## A BILL

- To amend the Homeland Security Act of 2002 to establish the Office for Bombing Prevention to address terrorist explosive threats, and for other purposes.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

### **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Bombing Prevention

5 Act of 2022".

### 6 SEC. 2. OFFICE FOR BOMBING PREVENTION.

7 (a) IN GENERAL.—Title XXII of the Homeland Se8 curity Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 651 et seq.) is amended by
9 adding at the end the following new subtitle:

### **"Subtitle D—Bombing Prevention**

### 2 "SEC. 2241. OFFICE FOR BOMBING PREVENTION.

3 "(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established within
4 the Department an Office for Bombing Prevention (in this
5 section referred to as the 'Office').

6 "(b) ACTIVITIES.—The Office shall have the primary 7 responsibility within the Department for enhancing the 8 ability and coordinating the efforts of the United States 9 to deter, detect, prevent, protect against, mitigate, and re-10 spond to terrorist explosive threats and attacks in the 11 United States, including by carrying out the following:

12 "(1) Advising the Secretary on matters related
13 to terrorist explosive threats and attacks in the
14 United States.

15 "(2) Coordinating the efforts of the Depart16 ment to counter terrorist explosive threats and at17 tacks in the United States, including by carrying out
18 the following:

"(A) Developing, in coordination with the
Under Secretary for Strategy, Policy, and
Plans, the Department's strategy against terrorist explosives threats and attacks, including
efforts to support the security and preparedness
of critical infrastructure and the public sector
and private sector.

"(B) Leading the prioritization of the Department's efforts against terrorist explosive threats and attacks, including preparedness and operational requirements.

"(C) Ensuring, in coordination with the 5 6 Under Secretary for Science and Technology 7 and the Administrator of the Federal Emer-8 gency Management Agency, the identification, 9 evaluation, and availability of effective tech-10 nology applications through field pilot testing 11 and acquisition of such technology applications 12 by the public sector to deter, detect, prevent, 13 protect against, mitigate, and respond to ter-14 rorist explosive threats and attacks in the 15 United States.

"(D) Providing advice and recommendations to the Administrator of the Federal Emergency Management Agency regarding the effective use of grants authorized under section
2002.

21 "(E) In coordination with the Assistant
22 Secretary for Countering Weapons of Mass De23 struction, aligning Department efforts related
24 to terrorist explosive threats and attacks in the
25 United States and weapons of mass destruction.

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"(3) Engaging other Federal departments and
 agencies, including Sector Risk Management Agen cies, regarding terrorist explosive threats and at tacks in the United States.

"(4) Facilitating information sharing and deci-5 6 sion support of the public and private sector involved 7 in deterrence. detection. prevention. protection 8 against, mitigation of, and response to terrorist ex-9 plosive threats and attacks in the United States. 10 Such sharing and support may include the following:

"(A) Operating and maintaining a secure
information sharing system that allows the
sharing of critical information and data relating
to terrorist explosive attack tactics, techniques,
procedures, and security capabilities, including
information and data described in paragraph
(6) and section 2242.

"(B) Working with international partners,
in coordination with the Office for International
Affairs of the Department, to develop and share
effective practices to deter, prevent, detect, protect against, mitigate, and respond to terrorist
explosive threats and attacks in the United
States.

"(5) Promoting security awareness among the
 public and private sector and the general public re garding the risks posed by the misuse of explosive
 precursor chemicals and other bomb-making mate rials.

6 "(6) Providing training, guidance, assessments, 7 and planning assistance to the public and private 8 sector, as appropriate, to help counter the risk of 9 terrorist explosive threats and attacks in the United 10 States.

11 "(7) Conducting analysis and planning for the 12 capabilities and requirements necessary for the pub-13 lic and private sector, as appropriate, to deter, de-14 tect, prevent, protect against, mitigate, and respond 15 to terrorist explosive threats and attacks in the 16 United States by carrying out the following:

"(A) Maintaining a database on capabilities and requirements, including capabilities
and requirements of public safety bomb squads,
explosive detection canine teams, special tactics
teams, public safety dive teams, and recipients
of services described in section 2242.

23 "(B) Applying the analysis derived from
24 the database described in subparagraph (A)
25 with respect to the following:

1	"(i) Evaluating progress toward clos-
2	ing identified gaps relating to national
3	strategic goals and standards related to de-
4	terring, detecting, preventing, protecting
5	against, mitigating, and responding to ter-
6	rorist explosive threats and attacks in the
7	United States.
8	"(ii) Informing decisions relating to
9	homeland security policy, assistance, train-
10	ing, research, development efforts, testing
11	and evaluation, and related requirements
12	regarding deterring, detecting, preventing,
13	protecting against, mitigating, and re-
14	sponding to terrorist explosive threats and
15	attacks in the United States.
16	"(8) Promoting secure information sharing of
17	sensitive material and promoting security awareness,
18	including by carrying out the following:
19	"(A) Operating and maintaining a secure
20	information sharing system that allows the
21	sharing among and between the public and pri-
22	vate sector of critical information relating to ex-
23	plosive attack tactics, techniques, and proce-
24	dures.

1	"(B) Educating the public and private sec-
2	tors about explosive precursor chemicals.
3	"(C) Working with international partners,
4	in coordination with the Office for International
5	Affairs of the Department, to develop and share
6	effective practices to deter, detect, prevent, pro-
7	tect against, mitigate, and respond to terrorist
8	explosive threats and attacks in the United
9	States.
10	"(D) Executing national public awareness
11	and vigilance campaigns relating to terrorist ex-
12	plosive threats and attacks in the United
13	States, preventing explosive attacks, and activi-
14	ties and measures underway to safeguard the
15	United States.
16	"(E) Working with relevant stakeholder or-
17	ganizations.
18	"(9) Providing any other assistance the Sec-
19	retary determines necessary.
20	"SEC. 2242. COUNTERING EXPLOSIVE DEVICES TECHNICAL
21	ASSISTANCE.
22	"(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—Upon request, the Secretary
23	shall, to the extent practicable, provide to the public and
24	private sector technical assistance services to support the
25	security and preparedness of such sectors, as appropriate,

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to counter terrorist explosive threats and attacks that pose
 a risk in certain jurisdictions, including vulnerable and
 disadvantaged communities, to critical infrastructure fa cilities, or to special events, as appropriate.

5 "(b) ELEMENTS.—Technical assistance services pro6 vided pursuant to subsection (a) shall—

"(1) support the planning and implementation
of effective measures to deter, detect, prevent, protect against, mitigate, and respond to terrorist explosive threats and attacks in the United States, including effective strategic risk management and
emergency operations plans;

"(2) support the security of explosive precursor
chemicals and other bomb-making materials outside
of regulatory control;

"(3) support efforts to prepare for and respond 16 17 to bomb threats or other acts involving the malicious 18 conveyance of false information concerning terrorist 19 explosive threats and attacks in the United States; "(4) make available resources to enhance deter-20 21 rence, prevention, detection, protection, mitigation, 22 and response capabilities for terrorist explosive 23 threats and attacks in the United States, including 24 coordination and communication, to better integrate 25 State, local, Tribal, and territorial and private sector 1

2 operations; "(5) make available augmenting resources, as 3 4 appropriate, to enable State, local, Tribal, and terri-5 torial governments to sustain and refresh their capa-6 bilities: "(6) track performance in meeting the goals 7 8 and associated plans of the provision of such tech-9 nical assistance; and "(7) include any other assistance the Secretary 10 11 determines necessary. 12 "SEC. 2243. RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER DEPARTMENT COM-13 PONENTS AND FEDERAL AGENCIES. 14 "(a) IN GENERAL.—The authority of the Secretary 15 under this subtitle shall not affect or diminish the authority or the responsibility of any officer of any other Federal 16 17 agency with respect to the command, control, or direction of the functions, personnel, funds, assets, or liabilities of 18 19 any other such Federal agency. "(b) DEPARTMENT COMPONENTS.—Nothing in this 20 21 subtitle or any other provision of law may be construed 22 to affect or reduce the responsibilities of— "(1) the Countering Weapons of Mass Destruc-23

tion Office or the Assistant Secretary of the Office,including with respect to any asset, function, or mis-

sion of the Office or the Assistant Secretary, as the
 case may be;

3 "(2) the Federal Emergency Management
4 Agency or the Administrator of the Agency, includ5 ing the diversion of any asset, function, or mission
6 of the Agency or the Administrator as the case may
7 be; or

8 "(3) the Transportation Security Administra-9 tion or the Administrator of the Administration, in-10 cluding the diversion of any asset, function, or mis-11 sion of the Administration or the Administrator, as 12 the case may be.".

(b) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of contents
in section 1(b) of the Homeland Security Act of 2002 is
amended by inserting after the item relating to section
2238 the following new items:

cies.".

(a) IN GENERAL.—Title III of the Homeland Security Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 181 et seq.) is amended by
adding at the end the following new section:

### 1 "SEC. 323. EXPLOSIVES RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT.

2 "(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary, acting through 3 the Under Secretary for Science and Technology, and in coordination with the head of the Office for Bombing Pre-4 5 vention and the Assistant Secretary for the Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction Office, and in consultation 6 7 with the Attorney General, the Secretary of Defense, and 8 the head of any other relevant Federal department or 9 agency, including Sector Risk Management Agencies, shall 10 ensure coordination and information sharing regarding 11 nonmilitary research, development, testing, and evaluation activities of the Federal Government relating to the deter-12 13 rence, detection, prevention, protection against, mitigation of, and response to terrorist explosive threats and attacks 14 15 in the United States.

16 "(b) LEVERAGING MILITARY RESEARCH.—The Secretary, acting through the Under Secretary for Science 17 and Technology, and in coordination with the head of the 18 19 Office for Bombing Prevention and the Assistant Secretary for the Countering of Weapons of Mass Destruction 20 21 Office, shall consult with the Secretary of Defense and the 22 head of any other relevant Federal department or agency, 23 including Sector Risk Management Agencies, to ensure 24 that, to the maximum extent possible, military policies and procedures, and research, development, testing, and eval-25 26 uation activities relating to the deterrence, detection, prevention, protection against, mitigation of, and response to
 terrorist explosive threats and attacks in the United
 States are adapted to nonmilitary uses.".

4 (b) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of contents
5 in section 1(b) of the Homeland Security Act of 2002 is
6 amended by inserting after the item relating to section
7 322 the following new item:

"Sec. 323. Explosives research and development.".

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
