A BILL

To authorize the location of a memorial on the National Mall to commemorate and honor the members of the Armed Forces that served on active duty in support of the Global War on Terrorism, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Global War on Ter-
- 5 rorism Memorial Location Act".

1	SEC. 2. NATIONAL GLOBAL WAR ON TERRORISM MEMO-
2	RIAL.
3	(a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds that—
4	(1) approaching 2 decades after the September
5	11, 2001, attacks against the United States, the
6	United States continues the Global War on Ter-
7	rorism, at great personal cost to—
8	(A) the men and women serving on active
9	duty in the Armed Forces; and
10	(B) the individuals on whose support those
11	men and women depend to fulfill their duties;
12	(2) civil servants from Federal departments and
13	agencies, the intelligence community, local emer-
14	gency responders, and other civilian support per-
15	sonnel have made significant sacrifices in service in
16	the Global War on Terrorism;
17	(3) honoring the losses endured by the individ-
18	uals described in paragraphs (1) and (2), together
19	with their families, Congress in 2017 unanimously
20	passed, and the President signed, the Global War on
21	Terrorism War Memorial Act (Public Law 115–51;
22	40 U.S.C. 8903 note), which allowed the Global War
23	on Terrorism Memorial Foundation to establish on
24	Federal land in the District of Columbia a memorial
25	to the fallen of that conflict; and

(4) given the significance of the Global War on Terrorism as the longest-running conflict in United States history and the magnitude of the sacrifice in-volved in operations in that conflict, it is appropriate to locate the National Global War on Terrorism Me-morial within the Reserve alongside existing memo-rials to the major armed conflicts of the United States.

(b) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

- (1) Memorial.—The term "Memorial" means the National Global War on Terrorism Memorial authorized by subsection (c)(1).
- (2) RESERVE.—The term "Reserve" has the meaning given the term in section 8902(a) of title 40, United States Code.

(c) Location of Memorial.—

- (1) AUTHORIZATION.—Notwithstanding section 8908(c) of title 40, United States Code, the Global War on Terrorism Memorial Foundation may establish the National Global War on Terrorism Memorial within the Reserve.
- (2) LOCATION.—The Memorial shall be located at 1 of the following sites, as identified in, and in accordance with, the document commonly known as the "Memorials and Museums Master Plan":

1	(A) Potential Site 1—Constitution Gar-
2	dens, Prime Candidate Site 10 in The Memo-
3	rials and Museums Master Plan.
4	(B) Potential Site 2—JFK Hockey Fields,
5	Prime Candidate Site 18 in The Memorials and
6	Museums Master Plan.
7	(C) Potential Site 3—West Potomac Park,
8	Candidate Site 70 in The Memorials and Muse-
9	ums Master Plan.
10	(3) Commemorative works act.—Except as
11	otherwise provided in paragraphs (1) and (2), chap-
12	ter 89 of title 40, United States Code (commonly
13	known as the "Commemorative Works Act"), shall
14	apply to the Memorial.
