A BILL

- To direct the Secretary of Commerce to establish a jobtraining grant program for workers displaced by automation and to establish an Innovation Corps to enable recent college graduates to volunteer in job-training programs for workers displaced by automation, and for other purposes.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Innovation Corps Act5 of 2017".

1 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

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Congress finds the following:

3 (1) The acceleration of artificial intelligence is
4 enabling the automation of jobs that have tradition5 ally required human labor.

6 (2) Such automation opens up new opportuni-7 ties for individuals, the economy, and society, but 8 such automation also has the potential to disrupt the 9 employment landscape for millions of people in the 10 United States.

(3) The potential for artificial intelligence to
improve the livelihoods and quality of life for the
United States workforce over the long run depends
on the institutions and policies in place.

(4) Job training for dislocated workers in the
skills needed in the innovation economy will be critical to maintaining the stability of the larger economy and individual families.

19 (5) Young people are often well equipped to
20 adapt to changes in technology and may be able to
21 provide unique expertise in retraining dislocated
22 workers.

(6) The outstanding balance of Federal student
loans now exceeds \$1 trillion. This debt burden is
limiting the ability of recent graduates to fully participate in the economy.

1SEC. 3. JOB-TRAINING GRANT PROGRAM FOR WORKERS2DISPLACED BY AUTOMATION.

3 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Secretary of Commerce, in consultation with the Chief Executive Officer of the 4 5 Corporation for National and Community Service, shall establish a competitive program to make grants to institu-6 7 tions of higher education to establish or enhance education 8 programs that retrain workers displaced from their jobs 9 by automation to provide such workers with skills needed for jobs in the STEM fields. 10

11 (b) MANAGEMENT PLAN.—Not later than 90 days 12 after the date of the enactment of this Act, and not less 13 frequently than every 5 years thereafter, the Secretary shall submit to the Committee on Energy and Commerce 14 and the Committee on Appropriations of the House of 15 16 Representatives and the Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation and the Committee on Appro-17 18 priations of the Senate a management plan for the grant 19 program established under this section. The plan shall in-20 clude the organization, structure, and funding profiles of the grant program for the 6 years following the submission 21 22 of the plan.

(c) ELIGIBILITY.—The Secretary may only make a
grant under this section to an institution of higher education that submits an application at such time, in such

1 form, and accompanied by such information and assur-2 ances as the Secretary may require.

3 (d) USE OF FUNDS.—An institution of higher edu-4 cation that receives a grant under this section shall use 5 the grant funds for one or more education programs that 6 retrain workers displaced, or at risk of future displace-7 ment, from their jobs by automation in order to enable 8 such workers to reenter the workforce in jobs in the 9 STEM fields.

(e) CONDITIONS FOR RECEIPT OF GRANT FUNDS.—
An institution of higher education may not receive grant
funds under this section unless the institution meets the
following requirements:

(1) The institution certifies that each education
program for which the institution receives grant
funds provides workers with training in skills needed
for jobs in the STEM fields.

18 (2) The institution uses graduate volunteers to
19 assist with the education program for which the in20 stitution receives grant funds.

21 (f) MAXIMUM AMOUNT OF GRANT.—A grant under22 this section may not exceed \$5,000,000.

(g) RULES PRESCRIBING SELECTION CRITERIA.—
Not later than 180 days after the date of the enactment
of this Act, after a public comment period of not less than

60 days, the Secretary shall issue rules prescribing the cri teria for selection of an institution of higher education to
 receive a grant under this section. Such criteria shall in clude performance requirements for an education program
 for which an institution of higher education receives grant
 funds. The Secretary shall update such rules as necessary.

(h) RULES FOR GRANT ADMINISTRATION.—Not later
8 than 180 days after the date of the enactment of this Act,
9 after a public comment period of not less than 60 days,
10 the Secretary shall issue rules to ensure that grants under
11 this section are made and administered in an accountable
12 fashion in order to prevent waste, fraud, and abuse. The
13 Secretary shall update such rules as necessary.

(i) DEADLINE TO BEGIN MAKING GRANTS.—The
Secretary shall begin making grants under this section not
later than 1 year after the date of the enactment of this
Act.

18 (j) REPORTS.—Not later than June 3 and December 19 31 of each year, the Inspector General of the Department 20 of Commerce and the Comptroller General of the United 21 States shall submit to the Committee on Energy and Com-22 merce of the House of Representatives and the Committee 23 on Commerce, Science, and Transportation of the Senate 24 a report that reviews the grant program established under 25 this section during the 6 months preceding the submission

of the report. Such report shall include any recommenda tions to address waste, fraud, and abuse in such program.
 (k) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There
 are authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section
 \$250,000,000, of which not more than 5 percent shall be
 available for the costs of administering the grant program
 established under this section, for each of the fiscal years

8 2018 through 2028.

9 SEC. 4. INNOVATION CORPS.

10 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—Not later than 1 year after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary shall 11 12 establish an Innovation Corps whereby recent college grad-13 uates may volunteer, in an education program for which an institution of higher education receives (or is eligible 14 15 to receive) a grant under section 3, to help retrain workers that have been displaced from their jobs by automation. 16 17 (b) STIPEND.—The Secretary shall pay a monthly stipend to each graduate volunteer in accordance with the 18 19 rules issued under subsection (c)(4).

(c) RULES.—Not later than 180 days after the date
of the enactment of this Act, after a public comment period of not less than 60 days, the Secretary shall issue
rules containing—

5	(4) the amount of a monthly stipend for grad-

10	(d) Authorization of Appropriations.—There
11	are authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section

3 (b) LOAN FORGIVENESS.—With respect to any bor4 rower of Federal student loans who completes 2 years of
5 volunteer service as a graduate volunteer in the Innovation
6 Corps established under section 4, the Secretary of Com7 merce shall repay, on behalf of such borrower, not more
8 than \$100,000 of the balance of principal and interest due
9 on such loans as of the date of completion of such service.

10 SEC. 6. DEFINITIONS.

11 In this Act:

12 (1) AUTOMATION.—The term "automation"
13 means the introduction of machinery into any enter14 prise that is intended to, or has the effect of, replac15 ing human labor.

16 (2) FEDERAL STUDENT LOAN.—The term
17 "Federal student loan" means a loan made under
18 part D of title IV of the Higher Education Act of
19 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1087a et seq.).

20 (3) INSTITUTION OF HIGHER EDUCATION.—The
21 term "institution of higher education" has the
22 meaning given such term in section 101 of the High23 er Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1001).

24 (4) GRADUATE VOLUNTEER.—The term "grad25 uate volunteer" means a recent college graduate who

volunteers in the Innovation Corps established under
 section 4.

3 (5) RECENT COLLEGE GRADUATE.—The term
4 "recent college graduate" means an individual who
5 has graduated from an institution of higher edu6 cation not more than 2 years before applying to be7 come a graduate volunteer in the Innovation Corps
8 established under section 4.

9 (6) SECRETARY.—The term "Secretary" means
10 the Secretary of Commerce.

11 (7) STEM FIELD.—The term "STEM field"
12 means science, technology, engineering, or mathe13 matics.

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
