AN ACT

- To establish an Anti-Bullying Roundtable to study bullying in elementary and secondary schools in the United States, and for other purposes.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

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1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE; FINDINGS.

2 (a) SHORT TITLE.—This Act may be cited as
3 "Danny's Law".

4 (b) FINDINGS.—The Congress finds the following:

5 (1) This Act is named in honor of Daniel
6 Fitzpatrick, who, in August 2016, when he was 13
7 years old, tragically took his own life as a direct re8 sult of bullying.

9 (2) According to the Centers for Disease Con-10 trol and Prevention, bullying is among the most 11 commonly reported discipline problems in public 12 schools.

13 (3) Potential effects of bullying include social
14 and emotional distress, physical injury, and in15 creased risk for lowering academic achievement.

16 SEC. 2. ANTI-BULLYING ROUNDTABLE.

17 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established an inde18 pendent commission to be known as the "Anti-Bullying
19 Roundtable" (in this Act referred to as the "Round20 table").

(b) DUTIES.—The duties of the Roundtable shall be
to study and report on bullying in elementary schools and
secondary schools in the United States by consulting with
State educational agencies and local educational agencies
regarding—

(1) current policies on bullying;

| 10 | local levels; and |
| 11 | (7) instances of cyberbullying and practices for |
| 12 | addressing cyberbullying. |
| 13 | (c) Membership.— |
| 14 | (1) IN GENERAL.—The Roundtable shall be |
| 15 | composed of 15 members, appointed as follows: |
| 16 | (A) Three members shall be appointed by |
| 17 | the Secretary of Education, and those three |
| 18 | members shall represent three different cat- |
| 19 | egories of stakeholders described in paragraph |
| 20 | (2). |
| 21 | (B) Six members shall be appointed by the |
| 22 | Speaker of the House of Representatives, three |
| 23 | of whom shall be appointed on the rec- |
| 24 | ommendation of the majority leader of the |
| 25 | House of Representatives, and three of whom |

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shall be appointed on the recommendation of the minority leader of the House of Representatives. The Speaker, the majority leader, and the minority leader of the House of Representatives shall each select individuals who represent at least three different categories of stakeholders described in paragraph (2).

8 (C) Six members shall be appointed by the 9 President pro tempore of the Senate, three of 10 whom shall be appointed on the recommenda-11 tion of the majority leader of the Senate, and 12 three of whom shall be appointed on the rec-13 ommendation of the minority leader of the Sen-14 ate. The President pro tempore, the majority 15 leader, and the minority leader of the Senate 16 shall each select individuals who represent at 17 least three different categories of stakeholders 18 described in paragraph (2).

(D) In appointing members of the Roundtable, the Secretary of Education, the Speaker
of the House of Representatives, and the President pro tempore of the Senate, to the extent
practicable, shall take into account all the other
nominees to the Roundtable to ensure as many

| 3 | (2) Representation.—The members of the |
| 4 | Roundtable shall include, to the extent practicable, |
| 5 | at least one representative of each of the following: |
| 6 | (A) Teachers. |
| 7 | (B) School leaders. |
| 8 | (C) Parents of schoolchildren. |
| 9 | (D) Individuals who are at least 16 years |
| 10 | of age and who have experienced bullying. |
| 11 | (E) Physicians. |
| 12 | (F) Child psychologists. |
| 13 | (G) Paraprofessionals. |
| 14 | (H) School resource officers or other ap- |
| 15 | propriate professionals responsible for school se- |
| 16 | curity. |
| 17 | (I) Specialized instructional support per- |
| 18 | sonnel. |
| 19 | (J) Other staff. |
| 20 | (K) Other individuals with expertise work- |
| 21 | ing with bullied youth. |
| 22 | (3) CHAIR.—The members of the Roundtable |
| 23 | shall elect one individual to serve as chair. |
| 24 | (4) TERMS.—Each member shall be appointed |
| 25 | for the duration of the existence of the Roundtable. |

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(5) VACANCIES.—A vacancy in the Roundtable

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2 shall be filled in the manner in which the original 3 appointment was made under paragraph (1) and in 4 accordance with the requirements of paragraph (2). (6) PAY.—Members of the Roundtable shall 5 6 serve without pay. 7 (d) TIME FRAME FOR FORMATION.—Not later than 8 180 days after the date of enactment of this Act, the des-9 ignated Members of Congress and the Secretary shall ap-10 point the members described in subsection (c)(1). 11 (e) POWERS OF ROUNDTABLE.— 12 (1) HEARINGS AND SESSIONS.—The Round-13 table may, for the purpose of carrying out this sec-14 tion, hold hearings, sit and act at times and places, 15 take testimony, and receive evidence as the Round-16 table considers appropriate. 17 (2) Obtaining official data.—Upon request 18 of the chair of the Roundtable, the Secretary of 19 Education shall work with the heads of appropriate 20 departments or agencies to furnish requested infor-21 mation to the Roundtable. (3) MAILS.—The Roundtable may use the 22 23 United States mails in the same manner and under 24 the same conditions as other departments and agen-25 cies of the United States.

(4) ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT SERVICES.—
 Upon request of the Roundtable, the Secretary of
 Education shall provide to the Roundtable the ad ministrative support services necessary for the
 Roundtable to carry out its responsibilities under
 this Act.

7 (f) Reports.—

8 (1) BEST PRACTICES REPORT.—Not later than 9 270 days after the date on which the Roundtable 10 has been formed, the Roundtable shall submit to the 11 Secretary of Education, and the Secretary shall 12 make public, a report on best practices concerning 13 bullying, including cyberbullying, in elementary 14 schools and secondary schools in the United States 15 that contains, among other items—

16 (A) recommendations for how to prevent17 bullying;

(B) recommendations for how to best educate educators, administrators, and all relevant
school staff on recognizing bullying;

21 (C) recommendations for how parents can
22 best address and discuss with their children the
23 early warning signs of bullying;

24 (D) recommendations for addressing un25 derlying causes of bullying behavior;

| 1 | (E) recommendations to address bullying |
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| 2 | of at-risk students, including students who are |
| 3 | at greater risk of self-harm; and |
| 4 | (F) examples of successful evidence-based |
| 5 | bullying prevention programming. |
| 6 | (2) FINAL REPORT.—Not later than 1 year |
| 7 | after the date on which the Roundtable has been |
| 8 | formed, the Roundtable shall transmit a final report |
| 9 | to the Secretary of Education and the Congress con- |
| 10 | taining— |
| 11 | (A) a detailed statement of the findings |
| 12 | and conclusions of the Roundtable; and |
| 13 | (B) recommendations for lawmakers re- |
| 14 | garding effective bullying prevention policies. |
| 15 | (g) TERMINATION.—The Roundtable shall terminate |
| 16 | upon submission of the final report pursuant to subsection |
| 17 | (f)(2). |
| 18 | (h) RULE OF CONSTRUCTION.—No data obtained |
| 19 | under this Act from State educational agencies, local edu- |
| 20 | cational agencies, Federal departments or agencies, or |
| 21 | other sources, including information described in sub- |
| 22 | section (e)(2), shall include or reveal personally identifi- |
| 23 | able information about any individual. |
| 24 | (i) DEFINITIONS.—In this Act, the terms "elemen- |
| 25 | tary school", "local educational agency", "paraprofes- |

sional", "parent", "other staff", "school leader", "sec ondary school", "Secretary", "specialized instructional
 support personnel", and "State educational agency" have
 the meaning given those terms, respectively, under section
 8101 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of
 1965 (20 U.S.C. 7801).
