Mrs. SHAHEEN (for herself, Ms. HASSAN, and Mr. MANCHIN) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions

## A BILL

To establish a grant program relating to the prevention of student and student athlete opioid misuse.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Student and Student
- 5 Athlete Opioid Misuse Prevention Act".

### 6 SEC. 2. GRANTS FOR OPIOID MISUSE PREVENTION.

- 7 Part A of title V of the Public Health Service Act
- 8 (42 U.S.C. 290aa et seq.) is amended by adding at the
- 9 end the following:

# "SEC. 506B. GRANTS FOR STUDENT AND STUDENT ATHLETE OPIOID MISUSE PREVENTION.

"(a) AUTHORITY.—The Assistant Secretary, in consultation with the Secretary of Education, may make
grants to, and enter into contracts and cooperative agreements with, public and nonprofit private entities, including
States and drug-free community coalitions, to enable such
entities—

9 "(1) to carry out school-based programs con-10 cerning the dangers of the misuse of and addiction 11 to prescription opioids, related drugs, and other pre-12 scribed drugs commonly used in pain management 13 or injury recovery, including initiatives that give stu-14 dents the responsibility to create their own anti-drug 15 abuse education programs for their schools;

"(2) to carry out community-based misuse and
addiction prevention programs relating to prescription opioids, related drugs, and other prescription
drugs commonly used in pain management or injury
recovery, including youth sports organizations; and

21 "(3) to carry out school, collegiate, and community-based engagement of youth, high school, or collegiate athletic and recreation programs and associations concerning the dangers of the misuse of and addiction to prescription opioids, related drugs, and other prescription drugs commonly used in pain management or injury recovery, including initiatives
 that give student athletes the responsibility to create
 their own anti-drug abuse education programs for
 their schools.

5 "(b) USE OF FUNDS.—Amounts made available 6 under a grant, contract, or cooperative agreement under 7 subsection (a) shall be used for planning, establishing, or 8 administering prevention programs relating to prescrip-9 tion opioid, related drugs, and other drugs commonly used 10 in pain management or injury recovery.

11 "(c) USE OF FUNDS.—Amounts provided to an entity
12 under this section may be used—

"(1) to carry out school-based programs that
are focused on school districts with high or increasing rates of misuse of and addiction to prescription
and nonprescription opioids, and targeted at populations that are most at risk to start misusing such
drugs;

"(2) to carry out community-based prevention
programs that are focused on populations within the
community that are most at risk for misuse of and
addiction to prescription and nonprescription
opioids;

24 "(3) to carry out school-based prevention pro-25 grams that are focused on student athletes and the

risk of misuse of and addiction to prescription and
 nonprescription opioids as part of injury recovery
 and pain management;

4 "(4) to carry out community-based programs 5 that are focused on youth athletes and the risk of 6 misuse of and addiction to prescription and non-7 prescription opioids as part of injury recovery and 8 pain management;

9 "(5) to carry out collegiate-based programs that 10 are focused on collegiate athletes, including club 11 sports and recreation sports, and the risk for misuse 12 of and addiction to prescription and nonprescription 13 opioids as part of injury recovery and pain manage-14 ment;

15 "(6) to assist local government entities to conduct appropriate prevention activities relating to youth and the risk for misuse of and addiction to prescription and nonprescription opioids as part of injury recovery and pain management; and

"(7) to train and educate State and local officials; youth athletics organizers and coaches; school administrators, teachers, athletic directors, coaches, and athletic trainers; collegiate administrators, athletic directors, directors of campus recreation, coaches, es, athletic trainers, and campus-based medical pro-

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viders, on the signs of misuse of prescription and
 nonprescription opioids and the options for treat ment and prevention of such misuse.

4 "(d) Allocation and Report.—

"(1) PREVENTION PROGRAM ALLOCATION.— 5 6 Not more than \$500,000 of the amount appro-7 priated in each fiscal year to carry out this section 8 shall be made available to the Assistant Secretary, 9 acting in consultation with other Federal agencies, 10 to support and conduct periodic analyses and evalua-11 tions of effective prevention programs for misuse of 12 and addiction to opioids, related drugs, and other 13 drugs commonly used for pain management and the 14 development of appropriate strategies for dissemi-15 nating information about and implementing such 16 programs.

17 "(2) REPORT.—The Assistant Secretary shall 18 annually prepare and submit to the Committee on 19 Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions, the Com-20 mittee on the Judiciary, and the Committee on Ap-21 propriations of the Senate, and the Committee on 22 Energy and Commerce, the Committee on the Judi-23 ciary, and the Committee on Appropriations of the 24 House of Representatives, a report on the prevention 25 programs and development of strategies described in

paragraph (1), containing, as appropriate, the re-1 2 sults of the analyses and evaluations conducted 3 under paragraph (1). "(e) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There 4 5 is authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section— "(1) \$10,000,000 for fiscal year 2021; and 6 "(2) such sums as may be necessary for each 7 succeeding fiscal year.". 8  $\bigcirc$
