3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "HYdropower Permit

5 Extension Act" or the "HYPE Act".

6 SEC. 2. EXTENSIONS OF PERIODS.

7 (a) PRELIMINARY PERMITS.—Section 5 of the Fed-

8 eral Power Act (16 U.S.C. 798) is amended—

1	(1) in subsection (a), by striking "three" and
2	inserting "four"; and
3	(2) in subsection (b)—
4	(A) by striking "Commission may extend
5	the period of a preliminary permit once for not
6	more than 2 additional years beyond the 3
7	years" and inserting the following: "Commis-
8	sion may—
9	"(1) extend the period of a preliminary permit
10	once for not more than four additional years beyond
11	the four years";
12	(B) by striking the period at the end and
13	inserting "; and"; and
14	(C) by adding at the end the following:
15	"(2) if the period of a preliminary permit is ex-
16	tended under paragraph (1), extend the period of
17	such preliminary permit once for not more than four
18	additional years beyond the extension period granted
19	under paragraph (1), if the Commission determines
20	that there are extraordinary circumstances that war-
21	rant such additional extension.".
22	(b) TIME LIMIT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF PROJECT
23	WORKS.—Section 13 of the Federal Power Act (16 U.S.C.
24	806) is amended in the second sentence by striking "once

1 but not longer than two additional years" and inserting

2 "for not more than eight additional years,".
