## **S. 1340**

### AN ACT

To authorize activities to combat the Ebola outbreak in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### 1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "Ebola Eradication Act3 of 2019".

#### 4 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

5 Congress makes the following findings:

6 (1) The current Ebola outbreak in the Demo-7 cratic Republic of the Congo, which began in August 8 2018 in eastern Congo, is the second largest in his-9 tory and has resulted in over 1,600 cases and 1,000 10 deaths.

(2) Despite the use of preventive tools and new
therapeutics, insecurity and community resistance to
response efforts remain major obstacles to ending
the current Ebola outbreak in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, and the outbreak continues to
spread.

17 (3) Hospitals, health clinics, and Ebola clinics18 have been repeatedly attacked by armed actors.

(4) On February 28, 2019, Doctors Without
Borders suspended its work in Ebola epicenters after
two treatment centers were attacked.

(5) On April 19, 2019, Dr. Richard Valery
Mouzoko Kiboung, an epidemiologist from Cameroon
deployed by the World Health Organization to eastern Congo to help stop the outbreak, was killed in
an attack on Butembo University Hospital.

(6) Healthcare workers responding to Ebola
 have expressed concerns about their ability to con tinue working on the response given the complex se curity situation.

5 (7) If the outbreak is not brought under con6 trol, it risks spreading across the border to neigh7 boring countries and endangering millions of people.

8 (8) The Administration released a November 9 29, 2018, Presidential Memorandum implementing 10 aid restrictions to most countries on Tier III of the 11 2018 Trafficking In Persons (TIP) report that fully 12 restricted non-humanitarian, non-trade related aid to 13 the Democratic Republic of the Congo.

(9) Paragraphs (4) and (5) of section 110(d) of
the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 (22
U.S.C. 7107(d)(4) and (5)) authorize the continuation of assistance in Tier III countries if such assistance is determined to be in the national interest
of the United States.

20 (10) Section 110(d)(5)(B) of the Trafficking 21 Victims Protection Act of 2000(22)U.S.C. 22 7107(d)(5)(B)) states, "The President shall exercise 23 the [waiver] authority under paragraph (4) when 24 necessary to avoid significant adverse effects on vul-25 nerable populations, including women and children.". (11) The President has not exercised the waiver
 authority provided for in section 110(d)(5)(B) of the
 Trafficking in Victims Protection Act of 2000 in re lation to health, education, or community outreach
 activities essential to the success of the Ebola re sponse in the Democratic Republic of the Congo.

7 (12) It is in the national interest of the United
8 States to help control and end the current Ebola
9 outbreak in the Democratic Republic of the Congo
10 before it spreads.

## 11SEC. 3. AUTHORIZATION TO ADDRESS THE EBOLA OUT-12BREAK IN THE DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF13THE CONGO.

14 (a) IN GENERAL.—Notwithstanding section 110 of 15 the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 (22 U.S.C. 16 7107), and subject to the availability of appropriations, 17 the Administrator of the United States Agency for Inter-18 national Development shall immediately provide assist-19 ance, including targeted foreign assistance under chapters 20 1 and 10 of part I of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 21 (22 U.S.C. 2151 et seq.; 22 U.S.C. 2293 et seq.) for global 22 health and activities necessary to respond to the threat 23 posed by Ebola, and under chapter 4 of part II of the 24 Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2346 et seq.), 25 to the Democratic Republic of the Congo, South Sudan,

and Burundi to effectively combat the Ebola outbreak that 1 2 began in August 2018, including water and sanitation infrastructure, global health activities, public messaging and 3 4 other critical activities necessary for ending the outbreak. 5 Such assistance shall be provided at levels commensurate 6 both to address the threat posed by the Ebola outbreak 7 and conduct activities necessary for an effective response. 8 Activities to expand and improve access to communities 9 heavily affected by the Ebola outbreak should be 10 prioritized under this section.

(b) REPORT TO CONGRESS.—Not later than 30 days
after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Administrator of the United States Agency for International Development shall submit to the Committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate and the Committee on Foreign Affairs
of the House of Representatives a report—

(1) describing the actions the Administrator has
taken and plans to take under section 3(a) to end
the Ebola outbreak in eastern Democratic Republic
of the Congo; and

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(2) proposing any additional legal authorities
 required to improve the response to the Ebola out break in eastern Democratic Republic of the Congo.
