Mrs. Shaheen introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs

A BILL

To provide protection for survivors of domestic violence or sexual assault under the Fair Housing Act.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Fair Housing for Do-
- 5 mestic Violence and Sexual Assault Survivors Act of
- 6 2019".
- 7 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 8 Congress makes the following findings:
- 9 (1) Cities, towns, and rural communities in the
- 10 United States continue to face enormous challenges

1	regarding domestic violence, sexual assault, dating
2	violence, stalking, and other forms of intimate part-
3	ner violence.
4	(2) One in 3 women have experienced rape,
5	physical violence, or stalking by an intimate partner
6	in their lifetime.
7	(3) Approximately 7,000,000 women are raped
8	or physically assaulted by a current or former inti-
9	mate partner each year.
10	(4) Each day, an average of 3 women are killed
11	by a current or former partner.
12	(5) Researchers estimate that domestic violence
13	costs employers up to $$13,000,000,000$ each year.
14	(6) A fundamental component of ending domes-
15	tic and sexual violence is securing safe and afford-
16	able housing for victims.
17	(7) Research indicates that—
18	(A) nearly 50 percent of all homeless
19	women report that domestic violence was the
20	immediate cause of their homelessness;
21	(B) 92 percent of homeless women report
22	having experienced severe physical or sexual vi-
23	olence at some point in their lives;
24	(C) victims become homeless as a result of
25	sexual assault, and once homeless, are vulner-

- able to further sexual victimization and exploitation;
 - (D) women of color in the lowest income category experience 6 times the rate of nonfatal intimate partner violence compared to White women in the highest income category;
 - (E) poor women of color, domestic violence victims, and women with children have a high risk of eviction; and
 - (F) approximately 38 percent of all victims of domestic violence become homeless at some point in their life.
 - (8) Surveys show that a majority of victims who experience a sexual assault in their home do not relocate to a safe environment because they do not have sufficient funds and are not aware of better options.
 - (9) Domestic and sexual violence victims often find themselves trapped in homes where they are further victimized by caregivers, parents, siblings, landlords, intimate partners, neighbors, or others in or near their home. Economic insecurity and the trauma that often follows sexual assault make it difficult, if not impossible, for many victims to access

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- 1 safe, affordable housing options for themselves and 2 their families.
 - (10) Domestic and sexual violence victims continue to face discrimination in securing and maintaining housing based on their status as victims and as a result of crimes committed against them.
 - (11) Research by the Attorney General of the State of New York found that 67 percent of domestic violence victims reported that discrimination by landlords is a significant obstacle in obtaining housing.
 - (12) Research also shows that victims of domestic violence or sexual assault are commonly denied housing opportunities if a previous residence of the victim was a domestic violence shelter, if the victim has secured a protective order, or if there is other evidence that the victim has experienced a previous domestic violence incident.
 - (13) Studies show that victims of domestic violence or sexual assault often face eviction based on a single domestic violence incident.
 - (14) It is in the public interest to ensure that victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, stalking, and other forms of intimate partner violence are not discriminated against, particu-

1	larly with respect to housing, based on their status
2	as victims or the crimes committed against them.
3	(15) Nothing in this Act should be interpreted
4	to limit the ability of victims of domestic violence or
5	sexual assault to recover for claims of discrimination
6	on the basis of sex or race under the Fair Housing
7	Act (42 U.S.C. 3601 et seq.), including with respect
8	to failure to conform to gender stereotypes or poli-
9	cies that disproportionately affect women.
10	SEC. 3. SURVIVORS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OR SEXUAL
11	ASSAULT AS PROTECTED CLASS UNDER THE
12	FAIR HOUSING ACT.
13	(a) In General.—The Fair Housing Act (42 U.S.C.
14	3601 et seq.) is amended—
15	(1) in section 802 (42 U.S.C. 3602), by adding
16	at the end the following:
17	"(p) 'Domestic violence'—
18	"(1) has the meaning given the term in section
19	40002(a) of the Violence Against Women Act of
20	1994 (34 U.S.C. 12291(a)); and
21	"(2) includes—
22	"(A) dating violence and stalking, as de-
23	fined in such section 40002(a); and
24	"(B) threatened domestic violence.
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1	"(1) has the meaning given the term in section
2	40002(a) of the Violence Against Women Act of
3	1994 (34 U.S.C. 12291(a)); and
4	"(2) includes threatened sexual assault.";
5	(2) in section 804 (42 U.S.C. 3604)—
6	(A) in subsection (a), by inserting ", or be-
7	cause the person is a survivor of domestic vio-
8	lence or sexual assault" before the period at the
9	end;
10	(B) in subsection (b), by inserting, ", or
11	because the person is a survivor of domestic vio-
12	lence or sexual assault" before the period at the
13	end;
14	(C) in subsection (c), by striking "or na-
15	tional origin" and inserting, "national origin, or
16	whether a person is a survivor of domestic vio-
17	lence or sexual assault";
18	(D) in subsection (d), by inserting ", or
19	because the person is a survivor of domestic vio-
20	lence or sexual assault," after "national origin";
21	and
22	(E) in subsection (e), by inserting ", or of
23	a person or persons who are survivors of domes-
24	tic violence or sexual assault" before the period
25	at the end;

1	(3) in section 805 (42 U.S.C. 3605)—
2	(A) in subsection (a), by inserting ", or be-
3	cause the person is a survivor of domestic vio-
4	lence or sexual assault" before the period at the
5	end; and
6	(B) in subsection (c), by striking "or fa-
7	milial status" and inserting "familial status, or
8	whether a person is a survivor of domestic vio-
9	lence or sexual assault";
10	(4) in section 806 (42 U.S.C. 3606), by striking
11	"or national origin" and inserting "national origin,
12	or whether a person is a survivor of domestic vio-
13	lence or sexual assault";
14	(5) in section 807 (42 U.S.C. 3607), by adding
15	at the end the following:
16	"(c) Nothing in this title shall prohibit Federal,
17	State, or local governmental or other assistance or a pref-
18	erence program designed to assist or benefit domestic vio-
19	lence or sexual assault survivors in seeking, securing, or
20	maintaining dwellings, shelters, or any other form of hous-
21	ing, including associated notices, statements, or advertise-
22	ments."; and
23	(6) in section 808(e)(6) (42 U.S.C. 3608(e)(6)),
24	by inserting "status as a survivor of domestic vio-
25	lence or sexual assault," after "handicap,".

1	(b) Prevention of Intimidation in Fair Hous-
2	ING CASES.—The Civil Rights Act of 1968 (42 U.S.C.
3	1301 et seq.) is amended—
4	(1) in section 901 (42 U.S.C. 3631)—
5	(A) in subsection (a), by inserting ", or be-
6	cause the person is a survivor of domestic vio-
7	lence or sexual assault," after "national origin";
8	(B) in subsection (b)(1), by inserting "or
9	because the person is a survivor of domestic vio-
10	lence or sexual assault," after "national ori-
11	gin,"; and
12	(C) in subsection (c), by inserting "or be-
13	cause the person is a survivor of domestic vio-
14	lence or sexual assault," after "national ori-
15	gin,"; and
16	(2) by inserting after section 901 the following:
17	"DEFINITIONS
18	"Sec. 902. In this title, the terms 'domestic violence'
19	and 'sexual assault' have the meanings given those terms
20	in section 802.".

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
