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8	POSTHUMOUSLY HONORING SHANDY WESLEY JONES ON HIS
9	MANY CONTRIBUTIONS AND EMINENCE AS A PROMINENT HISTORICAL
10	FIGURE IN ALABAMA HISTORY.
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12	WHEREAS, it is a tremendous privilege to
13	posthumously honor Shandy Wesley Jones for his many
14	contributions and eminence as a prominent historical figure in
15	Alabama history; and
16	WHEREAS, Shandy Wesley Jones was born December 20,
17	1816, on a Madison County plantation; on December 1, 1820, he
18	was emancipated, along with his mother Elizabeth, and two
19	older sisters, Ann and Evalina; he learned to read and write
20	and grew up as a free black man; and
21	WHEREAS, on December 5, 1837, Shandy Wesley Jones
22	united in Holy Matrimony with Georgia native Evalina Love in
23	Tuscaloosa, Alabama; during this time, he purchased and ran a
24	barbershop in a prime location, and by the 1860s, he emerged
25	as one of the richest black men in Alabama; and
26	WHEREAS, Shandy Wesley Jones was active in the
27	American Colonization Society and advocated free blacks moving

to the newly formed colony of Liberia in Africa; he was an abolitionist who served in the Alabama Legislature and held the utmost distinction of being Tuscaloosa's first elected black official; on May 21, 1866, he founded Hunter's Chapel, A.M.E. Zion Church in Tuscaloosa, Alabama, and, around this time, he also formed a nearby school for African Americans; and

WHEREAS, in 1869, Shandy Wesley Jones went into hiding in Moundville, Alabama, to escape the Ku Klux Klan; Shandy Jones later went to Mobile, where his family joined him; Evalina died shortly after moving to Mobile, and Shandy married his second wife, Lucinda Jones; and

WHEREAS, September 25, 1871, marks the date Shandy Wesley Jones was appointed to a position in the Mobile Custom House by President Ulysses S. Grant; Shandy Wesley Jones quickly rises to the position of inspector and serves in this esteemed role for 13 years; from 1883 until 1884, Shandy Wesley Jones serves as pastor of Little Zion A.M.E. Zion Church; he died of a heart condition on February 4, 1886, and planned his own funeral service held February 5, 1886; the February 19 issue of The Star of Zion hails him as being one of Zion's old pioneers; and

WHEREAS, a special dedication ceremony was held February 1, 2017, to unveil the new headstone for Shandy Wesley Jones' recently discovered gravesite in Mobile's Magnolia Cemetery; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH
HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That Shandy Wesley Jones is
posthumously honored and commended, and this resolution is
offered to his legacy in highest tribute, and it is directed
that his family receive a copy of this resolution in warmest
regards.
