- 11 (ii) may not be amended or revised in any way to cause the alteration 12 or repair to exceed [\$5,000] **\$50,000** in total costs, including labor and materials.
- 13 (5) Any building permit issued under this subsection that contains 14 technical submissions that fail to conform to the requirements of this subsection shall be 15 invalid.
- 16 (e) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (d) of this section, a code official
 17 may require that architectural documents for alterations or repairs of existing buildings or
 18 structures be signed and sealed by a licensed architect if the code official determines that
 19 the signature and seal of a licensed architect is necessary to provide conformity with the
 20 Maryland Building Performance Standards or to otherwise provide for the health and
 21 safety of the public.
- SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect October 1, 2020.
