Mr. GARDNER (for himself, Mr. JONES, Mrs. CAPITO, Mr. COONS, Ms. HAS-SAN, Mr. BLUMENTHAL, and Mr. CORNYN) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions

A BILL

- To amend the Public Health Service Act to provide best practices on student suicide awareness and prevention training and condition State educational agencies, local educational agencies, and tribal educational agencies receiving funds under section 520A of such Act to establish and implement a school-based student suicide awareness and prevention training policy.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "Suicide Training and
3 Awareness Nationally Delivered for Universal Prevention
4 Act of 2019" or the "STANDUP Act of 2019".

5 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

6 The Congress finds as follows:

7 (1) Since 2010, suicide has been the second8 leading cause of death for young people ages 10-24.
9 In 2016, 6,159 young people ages 10-24 died by
10 suicide.

(2) Based on the 2017 Youth Risk Behavior
Survey of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (in this section referred to as "CDC"), 7.4
percent of youth in grades 9–12 reported that they
made at least one suicide attempt in the past 12
months.

17 (3) While there is no complete count of suicide
18 attempts in the United States, CDC data suggests
19 that for every reported suicide death, approximately
20 11.4 people visit a hospital for self-harm-related in21 juries.

(4) In 2016, suicide was the 10th-leading cause
of death overall in the United States, with over
44,000 people dying by suicide, and there were more
than twice as many suicides in the United States as
there were homicides.

(5) Youth often display warning signs and sig nals before harming themselves or others. Research
 shows that 70 percent of those who die by suicide
 tell someone of their plans or give another warning
 sign.

6 (6) According to the CDC, the rates of suicide 7 among American Indians and Alaska Natives have 8 been increasing since 2003 and are the highest of 9 any racial or ethnic group in the United States. In 10 addition, recent studies of CDC data from 2001 11 through 2015 show that suicide rates for Black chil-12 dren ages 5 through 12 were roughly two times 13 higher than those of similarly aged White children. 14 SEC. 3. STUDENT SUICIDE AWARENESS AND PREVENTION 15 TRAINING.

16 (a) IN GENERAL.—Title V of the Public Health Serv17 ice Act is amended by inserting after section 520A of such
18 Act (42 U.S.C. 290bb–32) the following:

19 "SEC. 520B. STUDENT SUICIDE AWARENESS AND PREVEN20 TION TRAINING POLICIES.

"(a) IN GENERAL.—As a condition on receipt of
funds under section 520A, each State educational agency,
local educational agency, and tribal educational agency
that receives such funds, directly or through a State or
Indian Tribe, for activities to be performed within elemen-

tary and secondary schools, including the Project AWARE
 State Education Agency Grant Program, shall—

3 "(1) establish and implement a school-based
4 student suicide awareness and prevention training
5 policy;

6 "(2) consult with stakeholders (including prin7 cipals, teachers, parents, other school leaders) in the
8 development of the policy under subsection (a)(1);
9 and

10 "(3) collect and report information in accord-11 ance with subsection (c).

12 "(b) SCHOOL-BASED STUDENT SUICIDE AWARENESS
13 AND PREVENTION TRAINING POLICY.—A school-based
14 student suicide awareness and prevention training policy
15 implemented pursuant to subsection (a)—

16 "(1) shall be evidence-based;

"(2) shall provide evidence-based training to
students in grades 6 through 12, in coordination
with school-based mental health service providers as
defined in section 4102(6) of the Elementary and
Secondary Education Act of 1965, if applicable, regarding—

23 "(A) suicide education and awareness, in24 cluding warning signs of self-harm or suicidal
25 ideation;

1	"(B) methods that students can use to
2	seek help for themselves and others; and
3	"(C) student resources for suicide aware-
4	ness and prevention;
5	"(3) shall provide for retraining of such stu-
6	dents every school year;
7	"(4) may last for such period as the State edu-
8	cational agency, local educational agency, or tribal
9	educational agency involved determines to be appro-
10	priate; and
11	((5) may be implemented through any delivery
12	method, including in-person trainings, digital
13	trainings, or train-the-trainer models.
14	"(c) Collection of Information and Report-
15	ING.—Each State educational agency, local educational
16	agency, and tribal educational agency that receives funds
17	under section 520A shall, with respect to each school
18	served by the agency, collect and report to the Secretary
19	the following information:
20	"(1) The number of student trainings con-
21	ducted.
22	"(2) The number of students trained,
23	disaggregated by age and grade level.
24	"(3) The number of help-seeking reports made
25	by students after implementation of such policy.

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1 "(d) EVIDENCE-BASED PROGRAM LISTING.—The 2 Secretary of Health and Human Services shall coordinate 3 with the Secretary of Education to make publicly available 4 the policies established by State educational agencies, local 5 educational agencies, and tribal educational agencies pur-6 suant to this section and the training that is available to 7 students and teams pursuant to such policies, including 8 identification of whether such training is available to trainees at no cost. 9

10 "(e) IMPLEMENTATION TIMELINE.—A State edu-11 cational agency, local educational agency, or tribal edu-12 cational agency shall establish and begin implementation 13 of the policies required by subsection (a)(1) not later than 14 the beginning of the third fiscal year following the date 15 of enactment of this section for which the agency receives 16 funds under section 520A.

17 "(f) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

18 "(1) The term 'evidence-based' has the meaning
19 given to such term in section 8101 of the Elemen20 tary and Secondary Education Act of 1965.

"(2) The term 'local education agency' has the
meaning given to such term in section 8101 of the
Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965.
"(3) The term 'State educational agency' has
the meaning given to such term in section 8101 of

the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of

2	1965.
3	"(4) The term 'tribal educational agency' has
4	the meaning given to such term in section 6132 of
5	the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of
6	1965.
7	"SEC. 520B-1. BEST PRACTICES FOR STUDENT SUICIDE
8	AWARENESS AND PREVENTION TRAINING.
9	"The Secretary of Health and Human Services, act-
10	ing through the Assistant Secretary of the Substance
11	Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, in co-
12	ordination with the Secretary of Education, shall—
13	((1) publish best practices for school-based stu-
14	dent suicide awareness and prevention training, pur-
15	suant to section 520B, that are based on—
16	"(A) evidence-based practices; and
17	"(B) input from relevant Federal agencies,
18	national organizations, and related stake-
19	holders;
20	"(2) publish guidance, based on the best prac-

tices under paragraph (1), to provide State educational agencies, local educational agencies, and tribal educational agencies with information on student suicide awareness and prevention best prac-

25 tices;

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"(3) disseminate such best practices to State
 educational agencies, local educational agencies, and
 tribal educational agencies; and

4 "(4) provide technical assistance to State edu5 cational agencies, local educational agencies, and
6 tribal educational agencies.".

7 SEC. 4. EFFECTIVE DATE.

8 The amendments made by this Act shall only apply 9 with respect to applications for assistance under section 10 520A of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. 290bb– 11 32) that are submitted after the date of enactment of this 12 Act.

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
