A BILL

To provide discretionary authority to an immigration judge to determine that an alien parent of a United States citizen child should not be ordered removed, deported, or excluded from the United States.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Child Citizen Protec-
- 5 tion Act".

1	SEC. 2. DISCRETIONARY AUTHORITY WITH RESPECT TO RE-
2	MOVAL, DEPORTATION, OR EXCLUSION OF
3	PARENTS OF CITIZEN CHILDREN.
4	Section 240(c)(4) of the Immigration and Nationality
5	Act (8 U.S.C. 1229a(c)(4)) is amended by adding at the
6	end the following:
7	"(D) DISCRETION OF JUDGE IN CASE OF
8	CITIZEN CHILD.—In the case of an alien subject
9	to removal, deportation, or exclusion who is the
10	parent of a child who is a citizen of the United
11	States, the immigration judge may exercise dis-
12	cretion to decline to order the alien removed,
13	deported or excluded from the United States if
14	the judge determines that such removal, depor-
15	tation, or exclusion is clearly against the best
16	interests of the child, except that this subpara-
17	graph shall not apply to any alien who the
18	judge determines—
19	"(i) is described in section 212(a)(3)
20	or $237(a)(4)$; or
21	"(ii) has engaged in conduct described
22	in paragraph (9) or (10) of section 103 of
23	the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of
24	2000 (22 U.S.C. 7102).".
